The Midland Railway.

Now that the railway is about completed between Windsor and South Maitland, it behooves the business men of this town to be on the alert to secure from it every possible advantage. The concessions asked by the Railway Company are small, when compared to the benefits to be derived from the early completion of the road. The statement has been made officially, that within 30 days from the time the abattoir is built, trains will run into Windsor. The work on the abattoir should be pushed forward with vigor, as it is of the utmost importance that the railway should be in operation in a short time.

How important this question is to Windsor is easily apparent. With the completion of the line to Truro, the enterprising merchants of that place will leave no stone unturned to capture the trade of the districts through which the Midland runs. In the meantime every inducement should be held out to bring the trade in this direction. With a few months start, Windsor should be more than able to hold its own, as this town, from its central position and splendid facilities for business, should be able to hold out sufficient inducements to keep the tide of business flowing in this direction. If buyers once find their way here, and are treated right, they are more than liable to continue coming, to the mutual benefit of both town and county. The matter is one which calls for most serious consideration on the part of our merchants, and should be carried forward with energy. The abattoir should be completed at once, and every effort made to make Windsor a more important business centre than at present. There is an old saying that "He who hesitates is lost," and in this case, what Windsor loses Truro gains. The present good fortune should be made the most of by our town.

BORN IN THE ROYAL PURPLE.

A Handsome Jersey Bull.

One of the finest young Jersey bulls that ever came to Nova Scotia, has just arrived by American Express, to head the Hillsdale herd of Jerseys at Brookfield, Colchester Co., owned by our enterprising breeder on Park street, Truro.

This famous young prize bull "Monarch's Sunbeam Golden Lad," was purchased from the Brampton Jersey herd near Toronto, and is about one year old.

His famous sire, "Brampton's Monarch Imported," was bred in the Island of Jersey, and is sired by "Castor's Pride," and he by the famous "Golden Lad." "Castor's Pride" won the Queen's gold medal at the Royal Windsor, and "Brampton's Monarch" is out of the famous "Canada's Queen, Imported," that won first prize at the Island of Jersey before imported, and has since won the sweepstakes in Toronto twice, with the best Canadian and American herds competing. "Brampton's Monarch, Imported" was also winner of the male sweepstakes in Toronto, with over 50 bulls competing; his bull calf won first, second and third at Toronto this year, and his heifer calves first and second. They also won first and third on heifer calves first on bull calf, and first on herd of calves at London, Ont., this year, and nearly all firsts, seconds and thirds at Ottawa Fair.

Now this young bull's dam is the famous "Sunbeam of Brampton," possibly the most famous Jersey cow in Canada today. She won first prize in 1896, being first everywhere shown, including Toronto and London; and in 1897 she won first prize, was in the first prize herd, and won the female sweepstakes in Montreal; and first prize in herd, and first in the great milk test open to all ages and breeds, all breeds competing. Her first calf was a heifer, which won first prize, and first in a herd at Toronto, and won over \$50. prize money before a year old.

Sunbeam's second was a bull, "Sir Brier of Brampton," that won in Toronto, London, St. Thomas and Brantford in the calf class; also first in Montreal, and the sweepstakes, as the best bull of any age, and was there sold at a very high figure. And now comes this famous young bull, "Monarch's Sunbeam Golden Lad," which is to head the Hillsdale herd at Brookfield, Colchester Co. He inherits his exceptional finish from his dam as well as his sire, his sire being strong in the Golden Lad blood, and most noted families of slow cattle, and the grandest dairy cattle the world has ever known, and is a great credit to the Province of Nova Scotia.

When the stock farm at Milford was sold to Mr. H. B. McCallum, the proprietor reserved all the butter producing cows, and among them some of the finest St. Lambert bred animals, now some 20 in number, in Canada. This new importation, that we have mentioned above, "Monarch's Sunbeam Golden Lad," is to head this herd.

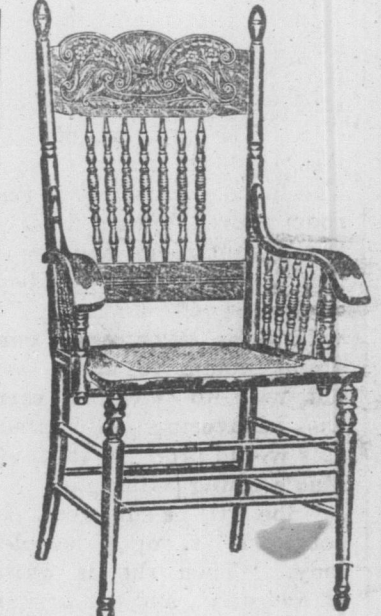

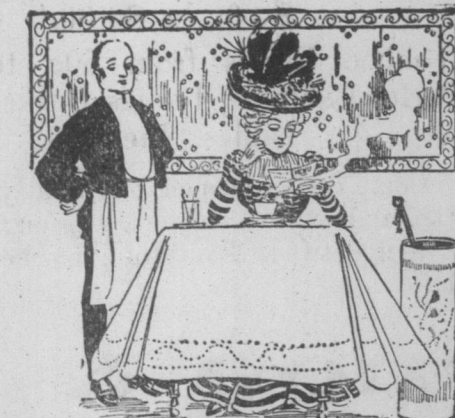

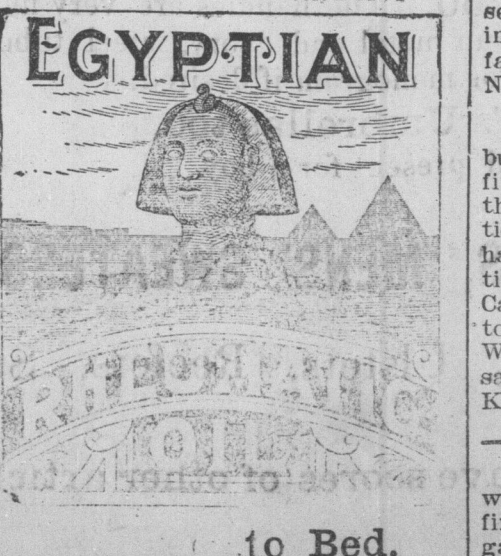
