Influenza Epidemic in Paris.

Paris, April 13 .- An epidemic of influenza has broken cut among the employes of one of the departments of the postoffice. One force of the staff has been affected. One hundred and twenty men were medically examined and exempted from duty. The attack of influenza from which Freyeinet is suffering is confined to the threat, which is seriously affected. His doctors will not allow him to see any friends for fear that the malady might be aggravated by talking. of one of the departments of the postoffice.

Free Trade First and Last.

London, April 13 .- Mr. Gladstone was waited on to-day by a large deputation of the Imperial Federation League with rethe Imperial Federation League with regard to "preferential trade." Mr. Gladstone said the Government did not question the action of the colonies in the matter of their tariffs and general fiscal policy—they were free to choose between protection, noderate or immoderate, and free trade; that was their own affair. "But my Government can hold out no hope that Great Britain will ever abandon free trade." He said his Government desired to jurther imperial unity in the matter of defense of the rial unity in the matter of defense of the perial unity in the matter of defense of the empire. He approved of the principles, but not of the details of the league's proposal. The present moment was not an apportune one, as the league has admitted, for the conference. Mr. Gladstone lately refused to receive a deputation of the United Empire Trade League on the graund that his Government was opposed to the preferential trade proposal.

BERLIN, April 13 .- The first attempt to demolish the tower of the old cathedral opposite the royal castle by dynamite having failed on Saturday morning, another attempt was made to accomplish that end Tuesday, but with the same negative result. The Emperor, the Empress and some of the children assembled on the gilded balcony of the castle to witness the spectacle, while all the approaches to the Lustgarten, where the cathedral is situated, were guarded by the police and military. Major Gearding, while smarting under the rebuke administered by the Kaiser, went deliberately to work and had the mines reloaded with an immense quantity of dynamite later in the afternoon. After doing this he informed the Kaiser that the tower would be demolished beyond doubt, and that he would set off the batteries if his Majesty would promise not to appear on the balcony, as it was decidedly dangerous to do so. The Kaiser promised, and the Lustgarden and the adjoining streets were snee more closed to the public and traffic stopped. Then the major touched his batteries and the tower was torn from its anchorage and completely demolished. Not ten feet of stone or masonry remained together. Nobody was hurt by the explosion.

The Home Rule Debate.

London, April 13.—The debate on the second reading of the Home Rule Bill was second reading of the Hone Rule Bill was continued in the Hone of Commons to-day. The Rt. Hon. Henry Chaplin, who was President of the Board of Agriculture in Lord Salisbury's last Cabinet, dissected the bill from the Conservative point of view and pointed out what he deemed its many flaws. He said that the retention of the Irish members in the Imperial Parliament as provided for in the bill would prove the beginning of a system of danger and invitions.

Mr. John Edward Redmond (Parnellite M. P. for Waterford city) followed Mr. Chaplin, Mr. Redmond declared that the speech made by Mr. Chaplin was "stale, flat and unprofitable." The former President of the Board of Agriculture, Mr. Redmond said, was a type of the governors who

had made Ireland disaffected and the concession of home rule to that country inevitable. Mr. Redmond said that he would not have intruded in the debate, but he had found that his silence had been misunderstood, and he desired now to make his position clear. The bill had been offered and accepted as a compromise measure. The right honorable member for birmingham (Mr. Joseph Chamberlain) had complained that the Irish members of the House did not accept the bill as final. What right had he to expect such a guarantee? He agreed with Mr. Chamberlain that the final settlement would be found in the direction of a federalism. He believed that the new constitution would be a success and that in the future the bounds of freedom would be widened with the consent of all parties in England. He had never said that Ireland would repudiate Imperial supremacy, as had been charged. What he find said that any interference with Ireland's free exercise of her new privileges would not be consistent with the trust England was about to place in Ireland. He was convinced that necessity for interference would not arise because rash or oppressive acts, should they be adopted by the new Parliament, would be so many nails in the coffin of the constitution. Mr. Redmond made a lengthy review of the historic basis of Ireland's demands for home rule.

BRUSSELS, April 13.—The strike inaugurated by the labor leaders as a protest against the rejection by the Chamber of Deputies of the Universal Suffrage Bill is still spreading. In the vicinity of Mons 15,000 men are on strike. Fifteen mines and two factories in the central district are idle. At Verviers 65 factories have closed in consequence of the exodus of employes. There was a large and excited mob around the Chamber of Representatives to-day when the session was resumed. MR. MEREDITH DINES.

Mr. Meredith manifests the mental disqualification which has all along caused his non-success as a public man. With many amiable characteristics, he has no positive policy on anything. He lets I dare not wait upon I would. He goes far enough to offend some, but not far enough to attract

A SIGNIFICANT DEMONSTRATION. Whatever differences of opinion there may be in regard to the strength of Mr. McCarthy's following in the country, there cannot be a doubt that the demonstration in his favor in Toronto was a pronounced success. He and his friends are apparently determined to conduct their section of the Conservative party on entirely different lines from that laid down by their one-time eaders at Ottawa.

The one point that stands out prominenty in the McCarthy movement is the fact that those who follow Mr. McCarthy do so because they have lost faith in the men in power at Ottawa. The farcical maneuver-ing of the Administration in regard to the Manitoba school question, in order to avoid the responsibility of simply doing their duty must be condemned by all right thinking citizens. No matter what our views may be regarding the action of the Manitoba authorities, the fact is established that the Privy Council of Great Britain says the Government of that Province has acted within its rights, and that should have been sufficient for the Administration at Ottawa. The rights of the Provinces must be respected in all matters not included in the Confederation compromise which only

affects Ontario and Quebec.

Mr. McCarthy's attitude on the trade question should set every Canadian Con-servative thinking. Here is a man who aided in establishing the high tax policy in 1878, who for years assisted in its per-petuation, who was the leader of the party in Ontario that indorsed it in all its details. Surely when he is compelled to protest against the perpetuation of the system that takes the earnings of the many and, by force of law, hands them over to a few, an instructive spectacle is presented.

We do not exactly see eye to eye with Mr. McCarthy on the question of how this country can best get away from the in-iquitous system that is responsible for so such of the rascality which has characterized the administration of public affairs at Ottawa, as scathingly denounced by Col. O'Brien in his Toronto address. What we do say is that Mr. McCarthy's refusal to longer indorse the wholesale legalized plundering of the people ought to convince many skeptical Conservatives that radical tariff reform, as proposed by the Liberal leaders, is a necessity, and cannot e postponed.

Mr. McCarthy says that with regard

to tariff reduction, he would begin by taking off those taxes which most affect British industries. We have no objection to that. Canadian products are admitted duty into Great Britain. Why should Canadians discourage British buyers by fining themselves before they accept payment for what they have sold? Mr. McCarthy further tells us that he would not reduce taxes on United States goods, unless the United States authorities reduce their taxes on imports, and he tells us that man for man Canadians can hold their own in competition with the people of the United States. We fully believe that Canadian workmen have nothing to lear from competition in producing any class of goods for which this country is adapted. But so far as we are oncerned we would go a step further than Mr. McCarthy and take off taxes wheresoever they are found to be too high without regard to the action of other countries. Sir Robert Peel set us a good example when he threw off taxes on British trade, not in a artering arrangement with other nations, but because he wished to benefit the British

Prominent Men.

Different Ideas as to the Best Methods of Dealing With the Evil-the Destrability of Women's Franchise Discussed.

Appended are a number of replies from persons of note, clerical and lay, which continue to come in answer to the following circular sent out by the ADVERTISER:

circular sent out by the ADVERTISER:

"Dear Sir—There is a sufficiently strong sentiment in Canada in favor of either prohibition or restriction of the liquor traffic to effect the object desired, if that sentiment, now somewhat at loose-ends, can be properly combined. Will you give us briefly your views (either affixing your name, which we prefer, or not, as you choose) on the enclosed postal card, on the following points:

"1. Is the country rips for prohibition? That is, if prohibition were passed, is there a sufficient public opinion in its favor to make it a workable enactment?

"2. If it be assumed, for the sake of argument, that there is a sufficiency of favorable public opinion, but a public opinion at present comparatively ineffective because uncombined, in what way can it be effectively combined?

"3. In the Canadian House of Commons there are 215 members, the great proportion of whom are, well, not exactly hostile, but indifferent to the question of prohibition. The same state of affairs exisits in the legislative bodies of the United States. In what way can the adverse or indifferent majority be turned into a majority favorable to our views?

"4. Would giving the franchise to women help?"

Doesn't Like the Plebiscite.

The licensing and deriving a revenue from the liquor traffic is a national sin, on a par with prostitution, gambling or human the liquor traffic is a national sin, on a slavery. Restriction by licensing is false in principle and a failure in practice. Morally, i. c., sentimentally, the country is ripe for prohibition. Politically, i. c., so as to secure enforcement of law, no. What is the remedy? Ministers, editors, teachers, writers, all leaders of public opinion and of the people must insist on having all places of public trust filled by men of Christian character and life. "Be ye clean that bear the vessels of the Lord"—Isaiah, lii., 11. "The wicked walk on every side when the vilest men are exalted"—Psalms, xii., 8. When Christians and temperance men unite in making the suppression of the liquor traffic by law provincial and national, the vital and dominant test of every candidate's claim for this support, and cast their ballots only for such men, then, and only then, shall we be politically ripe for prohibition. The plebiscite is worse than useless as such a test. The pledge of the advanced prohibitionist is the nearest we have got. Woman suffrage would help.

Afraid of the Drinkers. From an Old Campaigner.

I am pleased to see the effort you are making to ascertain more accurately the condition of public opinion on the question condition of public opinion on the question of prohibition. I do not believe myself that prohibitory legislation at the present moment would be enective. If you look at statistics in the report of the Inland Revenue Department setting forth the quantity of liquor consumed you will see that a great many people. I fear the majority are not at the property people. of liquor consumed you will see that a great many people, I fear the majority, are not abstainers, perhaps not even very moderate drinkers. Whether this habit is a matter of conviction or usage is of little consequence. To withdraw from such persons their allowance of grog would be irritating to them, and, as in the case of the Scott Act, would lead them to adopt means to subvert the operation of the law. I think the experience of the Scott Act shows that the temperance sentiment of the community must represent more than the bare majority to be effective in suppressing the liquor traffic. There is no doubt if the franchise were extended to women that the ranchise were extended to women that the numerical majority in a vote would be very largely increased. Query, would the power necessary to the efficiency of the legislation be any greater?

Country Ripe for Prohibition.

From ex Ald. J. W. Jones, Hamilton. The country is ripe for prohibition. Quebec and the Maritime Provinces are to Quebec and the Maritime Provinces are to a great extent under local option. The recent plebiscite in Manitoba is an index as to the feeling there. Ontario, in most constituencies, by carrying the Scott Act, evidenced the desire for prohibition, Recent local option contests bear this out. Public opinion may be crystallized by making the question an issue both in Dominion and Provincial politics; in the latter, so far as Provincial power exists. Giving the franchise to women would be a great advantage to the cause of prohibition, and would, I think, hasten the outlawry of the traffic. I would suggest that at the present time all influential prohibitionists in the Province communicate with their representatives in the Legislative Assembly, urging them to support Mr. Marter's bill striking out the licensing clauses in the Liquor License Act, also Mr. Waters' bill extending the franchise to women.

If these nineteen could be taught to buy what they use as well as

much. A "Grit" or "Tory" prohibitionist is a "rare bird" during an election, and even after election when the "goal" (Parliament) is attained, those who are pietty good temperance men at home either from choice or obligation drop temperance and take up "party."

The firm was censured for their action.







Estimates Ciphered Out by the Board of Works. VANDERLIP'S

An Advance of \$7,000 on Last Year's Figures-The Use of Victoria Park Granted to the Salvation Army Twice a Week.

The estimates for No. 2 committee were brought up last night. The engineer had all the wards completed with the exception of No. 6, the figures of which he had finished late in the day and would alter somewhat. The estimates of last year amounted to \$45,000, while this year the improvements called for the expenditure of \$52,827, made up as follows:

No. 6, were referred to the council for con sideration next Monday night.
Ald. Taylor said they should not go to any such expense this year. It only amounted to \$45,000 last year, and \$52,000 is too myst.

Ald. Garratt thought it was not too much. The work done last year was not very great and \$7,000 difference this year was not large compared with the extent of work needed.

The engineer said there were a few items that could be struck off. The repairing of the fair buildings could be thrown out, which amounted to \$700. In his opinion it was not the city's place to do this work, as the buildings were the property of the Fair Association. Another item which could be deducted was the grant of \$600 to the militia camp, as it was not yet decided upon whether or not the city should get the camp every year. Other smaller amounts could be omitted which together would amount to about \$4,000. The Board of Education, he said, was too costly, as last year there had been erected several schools which were not necessary, and their getting such large grants deprived the committees of needed funds for really necessary work.

In reference to the sewer on Wortley road, from Bruce street to Stanley street, the opinion of the city solicitor was that the drain could not be run across private

property.
