NOT AGREED ON BRYAN

Several Organizations Refuse to Follow Gompers' Advice.

Chicago, Sept. 7. - While Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, is touring the country urging the election of Byran. t is becoming evident that all is not harmony in the ranks of organized labor on the policy advocated by the leader. It has been brought to the attention of the Republican managers at the national headquarters that several large labor organizations have refused to follow Gompers in his support of Bryan.

This repudiataion of Gompers in the case of the railroad trainmen was made the subject of a statement which was issued yesterday by National Committeeman Victor Rosewater of Nebraska, who is chairman of the literary committee.

Gives Out Labor Statement.

"That the position of the different labor organizations and different labor leaders is by no means in harmony with that of Samuel Gompers, who is trying to execute a contract to deliver the labor vote to the democratic ticket, is shown by the official statement made by P. H. Morrisey, grand master of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen," said Mr. Rosewater. In his latest circular and instructions No. 127 issued to all lodges and members under date of Cleveand, Aug. 26. Mr. Morrisey says:





New York, Sept, 7 .- An attempt was made today to turn a meeting of unemployed workingmen into an anarchist demonstration, and for half an hour the big meeting hall in Cooper Union, where the meeting took place, was the scene of wild excitement, during which red flags were raised, the police were denounced, and incendiary speeches were made. Alexander Berkman, the anarchist, who some years ago shot Henry C. Frick, a steel company official, during the Homestead strike in Pennsylvania, was dragged from the hall by the police and locked up. A young woman, who gave her name as Mary Smith, and who stood by Berkman, was also arrested, and Emma Goldman, the recognized leader of the Reds in this country, was made to leave the hall.



The following is substituted for Sec. tion 262, respecting payments other than through the authorized agent of the candidate:

"Every person, including the candidate, and every partnership, firm, assuch candidate."

Use of Rigs Forbidden.

The provisions of the Election Act in regard to the hiring of rigs for the conveyance of voters to the polls are therefor:

"270. The hiring or paying for or promising to pay for any horse, team, carriage, cab, cart, wagon, sleigh, or other conveyance, or any boat, steamboat, or other vessel, by any candidate or his agent, or by any person on behalf of any candidate for the purpose of conveying any voter or voters to or from the poll or to or from the neighborhood thereof at any election, or the payment by any candidate or his agent, or by any person on behalf of any candidate, of the traveling or other expenses of any voter in going to or re-

"2. Every candidate or other person so offending shall, ipso facto, pe disqualified from voting at such election. and for every such offence shall forfeit the sum of one hundred dollars to any person who sues therefor.

"271. Every person letting to hire or demanding or receiving from any candidate or his agent or other person on behalf of any candidate payment for the use of, any horse, team, carriage, cab, cart, wagon, sleigh, or other conveyance, or any boat, steamboat, or other vessel, for the purpose of conveying any voter or voters to or from the poll or to or from the neighborhood thereof at any election is guilty of an unlawful act and shall, ipso facto. be disqualified from voting at such election, and for every such offence shall forfeit the sum of one hundred dollars to any person who sues therefor: Provided always that nothing in this or the next preceding section contained shall be construed as forbidding or making it unlawful that a voter should bona fide pay the usual fare or a reasonable charge for being conveyed to or from the poll."


