Extend Line by Snappy Attack Rev. Father Power Sends Full Report to General of Order For World, Who Will in Turn Lay Matter Before -Verdict of Courts May Also Be Sought.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Toronto, June 26.—If the pope rules that the honor of the Jesuit Order is at stake as a result of the recent raid on the novitiate at Guelph a letter of remonstrance may be sent by him to Great Britain.

The matter has now assumed an international aspect owing to the fact that a full report has been sent by Father Power superior general of the order in Canada, to Father Aledo Chowski at Rome, general of the Jesuits throughout the world, who in turn will take the matter up with the head of the Roman Catholic Church.

Such was intimated by Father Power last night when interviewed on a train on his way to Montreal, where today he will consuit Jesuit fathers and consider the question of taking legal action as a sequel to statements arising out of the raid on June 8.

"Will you give for publication the contents of the report you have furnished Father Chowski?" he was asked. "I may say that it is a brief statement of the incident at Guelph, and also a statement that the highest authorities had made ample reparation to us and that further details would follow," was his reply.

"Have you sent any communication to the pope?"
"Not yet."

"If Father Chowski takes up the matter with the head of the church, with Great Britain, as the premier of Canada is there?"

"It is possible that the result would be a lefter of remonstrance. It will depend whether it is thought the honor of the order is at stake. We do not as a rule have anything to say publicly about our affairs. The incident at Guelph, however, will be a historic one."







CANADA GOES ON WAR BREAD DOMINION DAY

Corn, Oats, Barley, Rice, Potatoes, Etc., Must Be Mixed With White or Standard Flour-One Pound to Nine Till July 15, Then One Pound to Four.

OTTAWA, June 25 .- Compulsory use by bakers, confectioners, public eating houses and private households of substitutes for wheat flour are prescribed in an order issued today by the Canada food board.

In making this measure public, Mr. Thomson emphasized the absolute necessity for conserving our stock of wheat, in order that we may share it with our allies, especially during the next few months, when their food situation will be extremely difficult.

The order defines as substitutes for wheat flour "pure and wholesor corn, oats, barley, rice, rye, buckwheat, taploca or potato flour; bran, shorts, oatmeal, rolled oats, cornmeal, cornstarch, hominy, corn grits, rye meal, or any mixture of same and potatoes." Four pounds of potatoes will be considered equivalent to one pound of the other substitutes.

IN EFFECT JULY 1.

The order provides that on and after July 1, bakers, confectioners and public-eating places, in making any bakery products in which the use of substitutes in certain definite proportions is not prescribed by previous orders of the food board, must use one pound of substitutes to every nine pounds of standard wheat flour.

Similarly, persons haking for relyest consumeters are released.

Similarly, persons baking for private consumption any product in which white or standard flour is used, must use not less than one pound of substitutes to every nine pounds of white or standard wheat flour.

On and after July 15, this proportion, so far as places east of Port

On and after July 15, this proportion, so far as places east of Port Arthur are concerned, must be increased to one pound of substitutes to every four pounds of white or standard flour.

The quantities of substitutes available west of Port Arthur are at present too uncertain to allow a date being named for an increase equal to that required for Eastern Canada, but such increase will be made just as soon as the available supply of substitutes in Western Canada warrants.

On and after July 15 no licensed dealer may legally have in his possession for sale any wheat or standard flour, unless he also has at all times a sufficient stock of substitutes to meet the demands of his cusomers at reasonable prices.

On and after July 15 every baker must place on each loaf of bread a label or sticker bearing his name and address and the words "Victory Bread." The latter explanation will be a guarantee that the prescribed amount of substitute for standard wheat flour required by the Canada food board has been used in making the loaf. Bread which does not bear such label or sticker may be selzed and forfeited to his majesty.

The penalty for violation of the new regulation is a fine of not less than \$100 and up to \$1,000, or imprisonment for a period of three months, or both fine and imprisonment.

COL. MACHIN'S CHARGES.

There is evidence that a powerful cabal exists at Ottawa against the minister of justice, which showed its hand last week in the disgraceful and brutal raid on the Jesuit College of Guelph. The greatest menace to the Province of Ontario is the Methodist Church, which seems to make us in Ohtario the most hypocritical body or class of people in the Dominion of Canada."-Lieut-Col. Machin, director of the military service act branch of the ministry of justice.

ID THE colonel's condemnation of the Methodist Church in Ontario come by itself, it would not be more worthy of consideration or discussion than the opinion expressed by any man on the street; it would be interpreted as sectarian bitterness to be passed by without notice. Coming as it does in direct connection with the charge of a cabal at Ottawa and specifying Ontario as the one province in which the influence is malignant, there is reason to look for some explanation of the outburst. The Methodist Church of Canada is not mentioned, therefore it is natural to look for something in this province which does not exist in the others. At once it seems probable that Col. Machin is hitting not at the church itself, but at certain outstanding members and that he, being in an official position to learn facts, sees with a clearness impossible to outsiders, the direct connection between this Methodist influence and the Ottawa cabal.

It is patent to all that the Methodist Church ernment and among those who appear to wield an | paid. immense influence over the Government. There are cabinet ministers and heads of huge industries who make capital of their Methodism and who lose no opportunity of identifying themselves publicly with the work of the church, either by speechifying or assisting financially. To such an extent have they affiliated themselves with the church that, in many quarters, they are better known in this connection than the clerical leaders. Moreover, Col. Machin says this Methodist "Church" is what "seems to make us in Ontario the most hypocritical body or class." This reference to hypocrisy is illuminating and makes it more probable that he speaks of representatives, not the church itself.

When Col. Machin charges a cabal against the minister of justice he speaks with inside knowledge. If he is stating what is untrue, he ought to be called to account and asked to prove his assertion before the nation. If his charge "Union" Government existing with the heads of one or more departments plotting the overthrow of another! What a mockery this would be! The Borden Government must clear itself or be discredited. Formed on the promise to show a united cabinet and country to the world, Col. Machin asserts it is divided in itself. There never has been more pressing need for full, open and complete investigation.

SINN FEINERS GIVE PROOF.

C INN FEINERS are going to do what the Britsh Government failed to do-satisfy everyone that the arrest of those accused of conspiring with the enemy was justified and in the best interests of the empire. In spite of all state ments to this effect by Government representatives, there were some persons in England as well as in Ireland who demanded proof of the offences charged and were inclined, lacking this proof, to look with suspicion on the Government's action.

The seizure of 40,000 rounds of ammunition in Dublin, which is described as an incident in an attempt to smuggle arms and ammunition into Ireland on a large scale, will convince any skeptic who is open to reason that there was need for determined action by the authorities in Ireland, especially when seizures of smaller quantities were made in other parts of Erin and the consignee is known as the brother of one of the arrested and interned Sinn Feiners.

It may be maintained by bigots that even these discoveries of Sinn Fein activities do not prove conspiracy with Germany. There is little possibility of this cargo of war material having left an English or Scottish port, and there is every probability that it came from German agents in some other country.

That part, however, is not important. Any lot which has as its object an armed attack on British authority in Ireland is pro-German and calculated to hinder the Allies' prosecution of the war against the Teutons. Every Sinn Feiner, however ignorant, realizes that the killing or wounding of one British soldier or working civilian is giving direct aid to the enemy and if he countenances such an act he is a pro-German and conspiring with Germany.

The former spells equal suffering or worse for countless babies in France, in Italy; yes, in Britain, and perhaps Canada. The latter means relief for all. The Teutons would not try to help the little ones of a defeated nation, but would rather stand by and enjoy their sufferings; the Allies could not bear to see the young of their beaten foes hungry for one moment longer than is unavoidable.

The Allies are fighting the cause of these children of Austria and of Germany. The way to show pity and sympathy for these shadow-thin waifs is to do everything possible to back up the men who are fighting their battle and to prevent the war lasting one day longer than necessity

While the War Lasts Registration is to be Continuous

PERSONS ATTAINING AGE OF SIXTEEN

HE Registration Regulations provide that every resident of Canada, male or female, British or alien, who shall after June 22nd, 1918, attain his or her 16th birthday, shall within 30 days of said birthday attend at one of the post-offices and answer the questions upon the registration card. The postmaster will issue an interim receipt, which for 60 days will have the force of a registration certificate. The regular certificate will be issued from Ottawa and mailed to the registrant at the address given on the card.

THOSE DISCHARGED FROM ACTIVE

While persons upon active service with any of His Majesty's naval or military forces (commissioned nurses included) are not required to register, they must do so within 30 days of the time they cease to be on active service. The procedure of registration in their cases is the same as above.

THOSE WHO FAIL TO REGISTER ON JUNE 22ND.

Any person who by reason of illness, accident, absence from the country, or other sufficient cause beyond his or her control, was prevented from registering on June 22nd, must register with a postmaster as soon as reasonably possible. Upon attending for registration, each such person must truthfully declare to the reason for failure to register upon the day appointed.

PENALTIES PROVIDED

Any person required to register as above, who without lawful excuse fails to do so, is liable to a fine not exceeding \$100, imprisonment for a period not exceeding one month, and a further penalty of \$10 for each day he or she continues to be unregistered after the day when he or she should have

NOTICE OF MARRIAGE

Any person registered, who afterwards marries, must within 14 days notify the Central Registrar, Ottawa, of the date of the marriage, and the name and place of residence of the party he or she has married. In sending this notice the serial number of each registrant should be quoted. The penalty for non-compliance is a fine not exceeding \$50.

NOTICE OF CHANGE OF ADDRESS

Any person registered who afterwards changes his or her place of residence or postal address must notify the Central Registrar, Ottawa, of the address to which he or she has removed, quoting at the same time his or her serial number. The penalty for noncompliance is a fine not exceeding \$50.

LOST OR WORN-OUT CERTIFICATES

Any person whose registration certificate has been lost, destroyed, worn-out or defaced may, upon establishing that fact to the satisfaction of the Central Registrar, Ottawa, obtain a new certificate. Every application for a new certificate should state the registrant's serial number.

All registrants likely to be affected by above regulations are recommended to clip and file this announcement for future reference as it will not appear again.



1. The only recipe I can locate calls for sound, firm peppers; cut off the tops and extract the seeds (or some find it handler to make a slit in the side). Soak in strong brine-24 hours. Drain, wipe and fill with a stuffing made of green tomatoes and cabbage chopped fine, ground cloves, mustand seed and salt to suit taste; mix well before stuffing. Sew on the tops and cover with strong, hot vinegar, containing brown sugar. Repeat for four mornings and seal up.

Perhaps this is the method you wish for keeping the tomatoes; Fill a large stone lar with ripe tomatoes, then add a few whole cloves and a little singar; cover well with one-half cold winegar and one-half water; place a piece of flannel over the jar well down into the vinegar, then tie down with paper. Should mildew collect on the flannel it will not injure the tomatoes in the least.




