A very stubborn fire did nearly \$70,000 damage on Saturday evening to the warehouse of Forsythe, Fraser & Weir; to the plant of H. T. Reason Co., and to the warehouse of Mc-Mahen & Granger. The whole block was threatened at one time, and it ooked as if a very serious fire would

After nearly 7 hours' hard work in zero weather, the brigade finally got the best of the flames.

Two firemen were injured, Captain John Mitchell of No. 5 company had his ankle sprained, and Fireman Bryan of the central station had one hand crushed under a ladder. Neither ac-cident is serious, but it will lay both men up for a few days.

#### DISCOVERY OF THE FIRE.

The fire was discovered by Mr. Archie McMahen. He was in the warehouse of McMahen & Granger, and noticing a light at the rear, he went back to investigate. At that moment the flames burst out of the rear of Forsythe, Fraser & Weir's establish-Fire Chief Aitken had noticed a bright light at the rear of the block, was about to investigate when the alarm was turned in. year.

Rates Are Absurd. "It is absurd for us to be charging such rates then," said Commissioner "If Berlin can put in meters and maintain them at no loss at \$1 a year, we can certainly make a subtantial reduction in our rates." He moved that the engineer furnish

the commission with data regarding the matter at once. A letter was read from Mr. George Burroughs, of 140 Adelaide street, who recently built a new house, stating that he did not want a meter put in. Secretary Ellwood stated that it had been the custom to install a meter in new house in which there is closet.

Commissioner Pocock asked what the total water rates on the place would be, and the secretary thought about \$7 or \$8 a year.

Ridiculous Again. "It seems ridiculous to be charging a man who pays that small mount \$4

or a meter," said Mr. Pocock. "There is no question about it, our rates are ridiculous," said Commissioner Darch. "We will have to use a ittle judgment until we arrive at a policy to pursue. I move that in small nouses the question of putting in a meter be left to the discretion of the engineer. Where the flat rate is less than the minimum meter rate, the neter should not be put in.'





How It Spread. A history of the spread of rabies from Queenston after the visit of the dog which did the mischief, nearly three years ago, shows the rapid way in which the disease has extended from one county to another. peculiarity of the discase is that as soon as rabies develops the dog starts out to roam the country, biting and infecting other dogs or cattle, and frequently carrying the disease 30 or 40 miles away before it dies. From land, Lincoln, Haldimand and Brant counties by June, 1908. In the following months outbreaks were reported in Norfolk and Oxford. Early last year cases were reported from Waterloo, Wentworth and Perth counties and by July infected dogs had gone as far west as Clinton, in Huron county During the past few weeks cases have been reported from Simcoe and York counties, and from nearly every county in the whole of the western peninsula New cases, often from widely separated districts, are now being reported with alarming frequency. In Galt and Paris over 60 dogs have been killed. and a few days ago a case of rabies was reported from Toronto.

Dr. Rutherford states that there must now be scores of mad dogs scattered throughout the infected districts, and every dog running loose s exposed to the disease.
