# WM. O. JENKINS. U. S. CONSULAR AGENT, IS FREED

American Embassy At Mexico City So Notifies State Department.

RELEASED ON THURSDAY

Dispatch From Puebla To Mexico City First Announcement of Action.

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 5 .- William O. Fenkins, the American consular agent at Puebla, was released at 10 o'clock Thursday night by order of the judge at Puebla, according to a dispatch from that city filed there at 2:30 o'clock this morning. Mr. Jenkins retired immediately to his home, the message stated.

The embassy's dispatch reached the state department coincident with the irrival at the White House of Senators Fall and Hitchcock, who were instructed by the Senate foreign relations committee to discuss with the president pending resolutions proposing that the president be requested to sever liplomatic relations with the Carranza lovernment.

It was announced at the state de It was announced at the state de-partment that the advices from the embassy said that Jenkins was liber-sted last night from the penitentiary, where he had been held pending trial on charges of giving false information regarding his abduction by Mexican bandits in October.

#### WILSON QUITE CAPABLE OF DEALING WITH THE MEXICAN SITUATION

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—Two sena-tors, delegated by the foreign relations committee to confer with President Wilson on the Mexican crisis and re-port whether in their opinion the president, by reason of his illness, was un-able to exercise his functions, left the White House after a conference of three-quarters of an hour with him today agreeing that he was in touch with recent developments and was mentally keen enough to form judgments on the questions confronting the nation. In the midst of the conference, while New Mexico, was outlining the evidence on which he is urging a break of diplomatic relations, the president and his callers were informed that William O. Jenkins, the American consular agent failed at Puebla, had been released. The advices left some doubt as to the ircumstances, but the development was accepted generally as relieving some-what the relations between the two

countries.

The discussion with the president produced no definite conclusion as to Mexican relations, but it was regarded verywhere as bearing on a subject of everywhere as bearing on a subject of endless speculation in congressional circles, namely, the extent to which the long illness of the chief executive has rendered his physically incapable of the duties of the presidency.

With a right hand and arm free above the bed covers, the senators said he shock hands with them snd took up and read papers which were on the table beside him. He was described as weak and nervous, but it was stated that he jested about exaggerated reports of his illness, and promised within a few days to give Congress his advice on what it should do about Mexico.

"He appeared to be a sick man," said Senator Fall afterward, "but mentally alert and perfectly able to cope with any question with which he might have to deal. He appeared to me certainly in ar good mental condition as any man could be after being ill for nine or ten weeks."

The other delegate of the committee. Senator Hitchcock (Democrat, Nebraska), said that the president seemed greatly improved since he saw him last, two weeks ago.

A Pretty Good Idea.

"My opinion is that he has been a very sick man, but is improving," said Senator Hitchcock. "He has a pretty good idea of the Mexican situation, and although he did not give a final decision on the subject, he indicated that too many serious considerations were involved to warrant any hasty action." Senator Fall gave the president a copy of his resolution asking that diplomatic recognition of Carranza be with drawn. This resolution now is before the foreign relations committee, which meets again Monday to act upon it. It was said that the president expressed no final judgment regarding it, but indicated that he would give his advice to the committee or to Congress by the end of the week.

#### MILLIONS SPENT BY FRENCH PEOPLE FOR THEATRE PURPOSES

Paris. Dec. 6.—Figures on the high cost. of living published here today show that theatres, moving picture shows and music halls will take in 165.—000,000 francs during the year if the average of the first ten months is maintained. This is an increase of 50 per cent over the figures for 1913. At the race tracks in Paris and thereabout 510,000,000 francs were spent between May 15 and November 30. In 1913 during the same period the mutuel betting machines took in only 240,000,000 francs. At the municipal pawn shops it was declared today that the number of articles pawned in 1919 was about 30 per cent less than in 1913.

## Millions in Central Europe Diseased and Facing Hunger

London, Dec. 6.-A review of conditions in Central Europe was given today by Sir William Goode, British director of relief in Europe, who has just returned from a sojourn there.

Czecho-Slovakia, Poland, Hungary and Austria, according to Sir William, are all confronted with great food shortages. In the case of Hungary, he estimated the shortage before the next harvest would reach a million tons. He said he found half a million of fatherless children in Serbia suffering from malnutrition, and learned that 35 per cent of the population had tuberculosis. More than 2,500,000 tons of foodstuffs, costing nearly \$500,000,000, declared Sir William, had been delivered for European relief since the armistice was signed. He laid special stress on extension of credit to Central Europe by the United States, in co-operation with Great Britain, saying that unless this was done Central Europe would become a desolate waste.



Paris, Dec. 6.—In a note drafted by the supreme council today, it is demanded that Germany sign the protocol providing for the carrying out of the peace terms, failing which the Allies, it is set forth, will be obliged to have recourse to military measures.

Paris, Dec. 6.—Germany will be called upon, in a rigorous note which the supreme council of the peace conference will complete today, to yield immediately to the Allied demand that the protocol of the Versailles treaty be signed, according to the Excelsior. 

was one asking permission for the utilities commission to raise \$100.000 to build a huge reservoir on Tunk's Hill, near Springbank. The need for such a reservoir and the plans adopted after expert advice from many engineers, was told by Philip Pocock and E. V. Buchanan of the public utilities commission

# Alderman Little's Mayoralty Platform





# REV. KNOX DEPLORES FACT THAT CANADIAN LABOR HAD NO PLACE IN BIG EDUCATIONAL CONFERENCE

Dean Fox and Rev. W. J. Kno x Discuss Winnipeg Convention at Women's Canadian Club-Say Conference of Greatest Significance in National Life.

"The Winnipeg Conference on Education for Canadian Citizenship" was the subject presented at the Women's Canadian Club yesterday afternoon by Dean Sherwood Fox of Western University and the Rev. W. J. Knox, both delegates to the convention held last delegates to the convention held last

"This convention, in national sigmificance, comes directly after the con-federation of the provinces in 1867," declared Dean Fox, who was the first apeaker. "Its representation came not only from every province in the Dominion, but from the United States as well, and from every profession and industry. What is the result? Toda; there is not a college or university in Canada which is not crowded to its doors. The Canadian people have realized a need for spiritual education-spiritual meaning all that is high in physical, intellectual and moral

Dean Fox told how for a day and a half of the conference, it consisted merely of talking. "Then Peter Wright, the great English labor representative, the great engine a realization shook the conference in a realization shock the conference in a realization that this conference must be different from all other conferences, that it must do something practical. And resolutions began to be formed, suggesting means to bring about an educational system which would aim at producing a higher type of citizen. ### DEATH SENTENCE ON WOMAN COMMUTED TO LIFE IN PRISON

Same Scale As For Men Who Woman Who Murdered Her Babe Receives the Good News Quietly.

> KINGSTON, Ont., Dec. 5 .- The sentence of Mrs. Lovica Thompson, whe was to have been hanged on Decembe 17 for the death of her infant last March, has been commuted to life im prisonment. Sheriff Dawson recedived word to this effect from the department of justice this afternoon, and early this evening he imparted the news to the condemned woman. She received it quietly and without betraying any emotion

duietly and without betraying any emotion.

She was sentenced for the murder of her child, to which she had given birth in the general hospital here last February. The dead body of the infant was found on March 1 lying along the railway track, about 1,500 feet west of Sharbot Lake station. A rag was in the mouth of the infant and medican investigation showed that death was due to suffocation.

A largely signed petition for a commutation of Mrs. Thompson's sentence was sent to the department of justice at Ottawa.

# CROSSES FOR BOTH WIDOWS

"An order-in-council has been passed authorizing the payment of war service gratuity as provided for in the regulations applicable to the Canadian Expeditionary Forces to certain exmembers of H. M. imperial forces who were bona fide domiciled in Canada at the outh-eak of the war, who returned to Canada after discharge from such forces and who are bona fide domiciled and resident in Canada at the date of application for gratuity.

"The expression who returned to Canada after discharge is extended to include officers, warrant officers and men who heieafter return to Canada, who did not leave Canada or who returned to Canada before discharge.

Before July, 1920.

"The main purpose of the regulation is to place Canadians who served in the imperial forces in the same position as regards war service gratuity as they would have been if the whole of their service had been in the Canadian forces. Applications of those entitled under these regulations must be submitted before the end of July, 1920.



### COL. COLES OFFERED COMMAND OF NEW MACHINE GUN BGDE.

Newly-Organized Unit Known As Second Brigade to Perpetuate Second Battalion C. M. G. C.

Practically the final details in the organization of the 2nd Machine Gun Brigade, Canadian Militia, were completed at a conference of ex-machine gun officers held at Military District No. 1 headquarters yesterday afternoon, marking practically the first actual step in the reorganization of the district to the new peace establishment. Gen. Panet, C.M.G., D.S.O. D.O.C. M.D. No. 1, Col. Walker, D.S.O., M.C., director of Machine Gun Services, Lieut.-Col. W. J. Brown and Major Corrigal presided at the conference, which progressed at the conter-ence, which progressed as far as pos-sible with tentative plans which will put the skeleton of a brigade into working order within a short time. The command of the new unit has been offered Lieut.-Col. W. G. Coles, and while he has not accepted definitely, it is altogether possible that he will and while he has not accepted definitely, it is altogether possible that he will announce his acceptance within a few days. The choice of a commanding officer is a particularly happy one, in that the new unit will have at its head one of the best-known overseas and old militia officers in the district, and was unanimously indorsed by the officers present at the conference.

The local brigade will perpetuate the memory of the 2nd C.M.G. Battalion, in which unit in France many Western Ontario men served. Owing to the Ontario men served. Owing to the scattered personnel of the machine gun units in France, it was found impossible to more than approximately reorganize old units in the districts which formed the main sources of these units in men, but where possible it was carried out.

in men, but where possible it was carried out.

The establishment of the brigade calls for a headquarters and three companies of three batteries each. The proposal in regard to the 2nd Brigade is to establish headquarters and one company in London, with the other two companies distributed through the district.

Approximately 40 officers and 400 men.

companies distributed through the district.

Approximately 40 officers and 400 men form the personnel of the new establishment, and of the number of officers needed, there are almost half available, according to records, now resident in the district alone. London will be made the headquarters during the winter of a school, the cadre of which will be drawn from the permanent machine gun forces, and an officers' training course for ex-M.G. noncommissioned officers is planned.

At the close of the war, with the exception of the air force, probably no arm of the service throughout the whole Allied army found itself in the expanded state of the machine gun service. Through the work of the machine guns under modern warfare conditions, the war office early recognized their value, and they became a separate branch of the service, and in the process underwent a revolutionization with little or no relation to a former standing. Fact and record ascribes to the Canadian Machine Gun Corps, from its earliest inception, the lead in all new methods out of which had been evolved at the end of the war an arm of the service considered the most efficient of any army.

# Last Century Estimates and Street Railway Facts Today

HAT man can look back to his cost of living figures of twenty-five years ago and say they would meet his expenses today?

If he rents a house now, is his rental the same as it was then? Does he pay the same price for clothing, butter, eggs, bread or meat? How far would his wages of 25 years since go toward his absolutely necessary expenses of today? Every man knows the answer, whether he be clerk or carpenter, banker or baker, manufacturer or street railway employee.

When the present street railway fares were fixed back in 1895 costs of operation were taken as a basis upon which to work. Then the men were paid from 121/2 to 15 cents per hour. Street cars, rails and other things, as well as labor, were cheap in those days. And the mayor and council of the time procured a ride for the citizens at any time for about three and a half cents, and during limited hours for about two and three-quarter cents.

These are the seven or nine tickets sold for a quarter today. They were extremely low fares in 1895. Today they are inadequate to meet the costs of operation, including a decent wage for the employees.

From  $12\frac{1}{2}$  to 15 cents per hour the wages have gone up to as high as 44 cents per hour. Everything a street railway has to buy has soared in price, as has the cost of living of the workingman. Calculations made in 1895 do not fit any case today. They were honest enough then, but they have been shelved by the march of events.

Street railway affairs, like those of the individual, must be revised to meet the present needs. If the employees of the London Street Railway are to receive the fair wages to which they are entitled, and if the people are to have an efficient street car service, the rates must be readjusted.

Measure the street railway's position by the rule you apply to your own affairs, and then
