## RUSSIAN MINISTER M. DE PLEHVE ASSASSINATED AT ST. PETERSBURG

Minister of the Interior and His Coachman Were Blown to Pieces by a Bomb.

## Wild Excitement in the Russian Capital—Perpetrator Arrested -Czar Greatly Affected.

St. Petersburg, July 28, 10:55 a.m. Minister of the Interior de Plehve was assassinated this morning while driving to the Baltic station to visit the Emperor at the Peterhof Palace.

A bomb was thrown under the minister's carriage, completely shattering it. M. de Plehve was terribly mangled. The crime was committed at 19 o'clock. The assassin was arrested. A report is current here that the assassin of Minister de Plehve is a wo-

The coachman was killed and the wounded and maddened horses dashed wildly away with the front wheels of the carriage, the only portion of the vehicle remaining intact. Immediately Police and gendarmes hurried up from every direction, and vast crowds gathered about the spot where the body of the minister lay.

## The Emperor Affected.

When the Associated Press correspondent arrived at the telegraph office fifteen minutes after the tragedy ocurred, the director of telegraphs had already been informed of the assassination and instructions had been given. The utmost confusion prevailed and the reports of the occurrence were con-

## M. De Plehve's Record.

St. Petersburg, July 28. - De Plehve was appointed minister of the interior on April 18, 1902, succeeding M. Sipiahad been formerly director of the department of police. Plehve conducted the prosecution of the assassins of Alexander II. in 1881, and from that time on his power increased, until it became only second in importance to that of the Emperor. Several plots to nurder him have, according to reports, been discovered during the past two years. The educated youths of Russia are said to have been bitterly opposed to M. Plehve owing, it has been claimed, to his turning on his own people, and to the radical changes which he

inaugurated and advocated. He is said to have regarded the common people as either dangerous crim-Finnish blood, yet, it is alleged, no man in Russia has so signalized him-M. Plehve. He was regarded as in many ways being the power behind the throne, and was dreaded on account of his control of the third (secret) section of the police, and also to the fact that he controlled the press of Russia through the censors, who, it has been understood, did M. Plehve's bidding. without question.

What part, if any, M. de Plehve act ually played in the Kishineff massacres will probably never be known; but his enemies have claimed that he actually planned the massacres through his political friend and agent, Kroushevan. He was known as the most extreme anti-Semite in Russia, and proprietor of the Bessarabelz, a newspaper of Kishineff. It should be added that the allegations against Plehve have never been proved. 


