The fact having become public it will now behoove its friends to keep a sharp watch out for hayfork peddlars and pea shell manipulators. The prices trun from \$2.75 to \$3.50 per bbl. Good stock is hard to get, as the best qualities are scarce this secson.

Lloyd's Weekly.

There is just now a great cry against the Metropolitan police because they have not adopted telephonic communication; but a chief superintendent of one of the busiest districts pointed out, yesterday, to a Lloyd's representative, me excellent reasons for not introduing the telephone in police stations. In the first place, the police of London possess the most perfect telegraphic system in the world. The superintendent pointed out that if, as the telephone advocates wish, the instruments now used were replaced by telephones, only one station at a time could be communicated with. 



To prevent the engines of a vescel from "racing" when the screw rises above the water, Signor E. Putalo has invented an electrical regulator. The contrivance, according to Industries and Iron, consists of two vessels of mercury, connected at the bottom by a tube and mounted fore and aft in the ship. The vessels are shout half full at normal depth. #### NOT FOR REVENGE Will the Czar Fight France' Battles.

Curious Story About the Signing of

a Recent Treaty Between the Two Countries.

London, January 9.-The Paris con respondent of the Times, M. de Blo-witz, reviewing affairs in France and in the sphere of French influence durin the sphere of French interest was and in-teresting details as to the Franco-Russian treaty negotiations at St. Petersburg. He says: "The first article of the draft treaty declared that recessory. The second processory article of the draft treaty declared that it had not for its object any modification of the European territorial status quo. M. Hanotaux refused to countersign such a treaty, exclaiming: 'Why it is a repetition of the Frankfort treaty.' Count Muravieff responded: 'You will never induce the Czar to sign a revenge treaty.' Neither M. Hanotaux nor Count Muravieff would yield. The problem seemed insoluble, when Court Muravieff, had a conference with President Faure, who yielded, admitting that it was undesirable to have such an article, but that, on the other hand, it would be impossible for him to return to France without a treaty. Accordingly the treaty was signed, Count Muravieff having declared that Emperior Nicholas would not hesitate to fight for France if she were ever unjustly attacked by anyone, but would not intervene in a mere war of revenge."
