BIRNAM WOOD TRAGEDY

Mobile, Ala., Dec. 5.—The examination into the tragedy of November 18th, when Captain C. M. Morris, master of the British bark Birnam Wood, shot and killed the steward, Charles Jeffries, and three days later jumped overboard and was drowned, has ended. The affair took place as described by the mate on the craft's arrival at Mobile. Suspicion was entertained that there had been foul play, resulting in the murder of the captain and steward, but this has been set at rest by the following letter in Captain Morris's handwriting:

"Bark Birnam Wood, Nov. 20, 1901

"To whom it may concern: This is to certify that I have shot and killed the steward, Charles Jeffries, and I shall pay the penalty at my own hand. Let no man censure me too badly, but pray God that he may never be placed Minard's Liniment Cures Colds etc.

Mr. Tarte was evidently better informed than the Minister of Militia as to the conditions upon which the Third Canadian Contingent was to be dispatched to South Africa. Those conditions will be fair and proper subject for discussion later on. Meanwhile it is only due to Mr. Tarte to acknowledge that his paper was strictly correct, the Christmas box goes all right but the bill goes with it C.O.D. In justice to Dr. Borden it is fair to assume that at the time he spoke Mr. Tarte had not decided upon what terms the Third Contingent would be permitted to go.

Despatches the past few weeks have brought to light many gunning accidents and now the season of the year is at hand when we hear of so many drowning accidents. Most of the latter are caused by getting on the ice a little too early. It is painful to reflect how many lives are lost yearly and how much lasting sorrow is inflicted on the living by a certain recklessness in seeking pleasure. In summer we have reckless boating and bathing, in the fall reckless shooting and in the winter the adventuring on unsafe ice. It was only last Friday that two of Ottawa's young society people met their death in this manner. We would advise all our adventurous people not to make any adventure on any pond or lake until it is perfectly safe, for if you do you are taking enjoyment at the risk of a miserable death.

The reception tendered to the Prince and Princess of Wales in London last week was a brilliant affair. No foreign diplomats were invited and the occasion was made to emphasize the loyalty of the colonies and their devotion to Great Britain. In a statesman like speech the Prince spoke on the relations between the motherland and the colonies. He spoke in warm terms of the loyalty, affection and enthusiasm which in variably characterized the welcome extended to the Princess and himself throughout their tour of the British domains of 45,000 miles. He referred to the journey across Canada which enabled them to see something of the matchless scenery of our vast territory, the richness of its soil and its boundless prosperity.

After appreciation of the military services rendered to the empire by the colonies the Prince pointed out that if Great Britain wished to hold her own against the foreigner in the commerce of the world she must take advantage of the mineral wealth and vast expanse of virgin soil in the colonies and send the surplus population of her cities to live there under healthy conditions, liberal laws and free institutions.

SUGAR BEET INDUSTRY

Through the energy of Augustine Callaghan, P. E. I., Registry Officer, the adaptability of the soil of our neighbors across the gulf for profitable growing sugar beet seems about to be fully proven. He had twenty four packages of seeds sown at different points last spring on the Island, and as a result has had shipped to Prof. Shutt, a list of the Ottawa Experimental Farm, for the purpose of having tested the per centage of sugar which they contain. Several of the beets grown from the seed were 15 inches in length by 14 inches in circumference. Should the analysis prove to be all that is expected, a wealthy company will erect a beet sugar factory, and prosecute the industry of manufacturing sugar. The factory will employ 300 hands and the farmers will get five dollars a ton for the beet, which would yield about \$100 an acre. Great credit is due to the intelligent energy and perseverance of Mr. Callaghan, whose efforts in this direction are well worth noting, because, should he succeed, a similar industry might be tried in Cape Breton parts of the soil of which are, doubtless, suited for the growing of sugar beet.—C. B. paper.

Halifax Memorial From the New York Herald In New York, at the Quarry of the Henry Bonnard Bronze Company, in West Sixty-ninth street, there has been cast a bronze statue, thirteen feet high, after a model by Hamilton MacCarthy of Ottawa, Canada, to commemorate the deeds of Nova Scotians who fell in the Boer war.

When completed, the figure, which symbolizes Canadian industry in the attitude of signalling "Enemy in sight," will be shipped to Halifax, where it will surmount a memorial monument on the corner stone of which was laid by the Duke of York. Nova Scotia made generous response to the call for volunteers at the beginning of the war in South Africa, and the Halifax regiment returned battle-scarred and greatly reduced in numbers. "I paid duty at the rate of thirty-five per cent. ad valorem," Mr. MacCarthy said yesterday, "to bring the plaster model of the statue to New York. I might have had the bronze figure cast in England without paying duty, but the city of Halifax demanded the best work to be had, and I came here. I am well-satisfied with the work, as far as it has gone, and my only regret is that the United States should place such a tax on American art." It is the intention to unveil the statue on May 24, 1902, the anniversary of the Queen's birthday.
