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## GENERAL RULES AND REGULATI NS.

Intepaligs Exhlbitors and Visttors are particularly requosted to read carofully and constider the following Rules and Regulations governing the Exhibition, which will in all casos be strictly enforced. Intending Exhlbitors should sond in tholr entries as early as posalble. Entry Peas must accompany all Entries.

## FQUALIEATION OF FRHIGHT.

Freight on Exhibits at this Exhibition, within 100 miles of Halfiax; to be paid by Exhibitors; the excess of freight over 100 miles 'o or from Halifax will be paid by the Commission.

Transportation charges on Exhibits (sent by freight) will be refunded, provided that the entire Exhibit be returned to the original shipping point within ten days after tine close of the Fair, without cliange of owners.

These payments will be made only or production of the freight bills ind certsicate of the Siation Agent, that ne Exhibits have been returned to place of shipment intact.

This applies only to shipments originating, and to goods manufactured, in Canada.

The regular onoway rate must be prepaid on all Exhibits.

## GMNFRAL ARRATGMMENTS.

1. The Exhibition will be open to the public on Saturday, 22nd September, at 10 a. m.. and continue open each day and evening, (Sundeys excepted), to $10 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$.
2. The Exhibition will be closed on Friday, October 5tll, at 10 p. m.
3. The Grounds and Buildings will be open for Exhibitors and thei: assistants from Saturdry, September 1st, to Finuay, Neptember 21 st, from 7 2. m. to $6 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$., to make preparations and to place their exhibits in position.
4. A numher of special attractions, of which particulars will be subsequently given, will be provided for the enjoyment of visitors, in addition to the regular Exhuvition.
5. Every facility will be forded and every courtesy extended to exhioitors, but no responsibility for transportation, damages, accidents, or loss of any kind will be assunied by the Exhibition Commission.

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6. No removale of any had will bo allowed before the close of the Exhibition, excopt by apecial perraission, with the sxeeption of Live Stock, which may be allowed to be removed after $6 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. on inursday, Sth October.
7. The Superintendents will give all information required in their reapective Departments.
8. All otticers will be designated by proper badges.

9. Gates open at 8 a. m. each day.

The names of all attendants must be given on the tickets, and no ticket will be issued until the name of such attendant is furnished, and unless the Exhibitor on chose behalf it is issued shall have paid not less than $\$ 1.00$ in ewtranoa fees, but such Ewhib'tor may purchase an Ewhibitor's tioket for use of, attendant. These passes will only admit the holder three, times each day of the Exhibition.
12. No attendants' tickets will be issued for the use of exhibitors themselves.

14. '1ae entry tickets upon animals or articles will admit the person bringing them to the Show Grunds for Exhibition, along with auch animals or artiden, without the use of any other ticket. Afterwards, such parties nust be provided with regular passes as stated, or they will have to pay the regular admission fee.

## gKEIDITORA.

15. All competitions are open to the Dominion of Canada, except where otherwise stated.
16. Live Stock, Poultry, Plants and Cut Flowers, must be on the ground at $\varepsilon$ a. m. on Saturday, 22 September. All other exhibits must be on the grounds and in position by 6 p. m. on Friday, 2lat September, excepting Fruit, which must be on the grousids and in position at $8 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. Saturday 29th september. Any animals or articles arriving after the above dates will be excluded from competing.
17. SPFOIAF MOTICE-As it is intended to have the various departments of the Exhibition fully opened to ${ }^{2}$ : pibl He at the time mamed, exhibitors are apecially motiled that artioles or animala arriving after the above dates and hoses will mot be allowed ? exhibit. Exhibitors of Machimory and other heavy articles are expected to have them on the Grounds and placed in powition the day preeeding the opening of the Exchibition.
18. All boxes, wrapping and orher packing material must be cleared away, and everything be in proper order, before $60^{\prime}$ clock p . m. on Friday, the 21st of September.
19. Exhibitors must provide for the delivery of their articles upon the Exhibition Grounds. The Commission will not, in any case, make provision for their transportation or be subjected to any expense therefor, either on their delivery at or return from the grounds. All eqpense connected nuerewith must be provided for by the exhibitors themselves, and all express and cartage charges must have been prepaid.
20. Articles not accompanied by their owners may be addressed to the Superintendent of the Department in which they are to be exhibited, who will receive them on their being delivered at the grounds, if all cartage and all other charges on the same have been prepaid: Exhibitors on

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arriving with their articles, should apply to the Superintendent of Depart. meat, when they will be informed whase the articlea are to be placed.
21. Exhibitors are not allowed to attach to any animal or article prise tickets, carris or other awards received at previous exhibitions until the Judges have examined and duly passed upon the exhibits in their respective clagses.
22. It chall te obligatory on exhibitors to display the prize tickete and ribbons awarded by the Judges at this Fair, and anyone refuaing to do so thall incur the forfeiture of his premiums.
23. Exhaviors shall give all necessary attention to their exhibits, and at the close of the Exhibition immediately take charge of the same.
24. Exhibitors of animals, machinery in motion, and other exhibite liable to occasion accidenta, injujry or damage to persons coming in contact with them, shall guard their exhibits and protect the publie from comang in contact t.serewith, and every such exhibitor shall indemnify the Commission from and against all claims and demands, costs, charges and expense which it may occur, suffer, or be put to by reason of any aceident, or by any person heing inju.. 1 or suffering damages through or by reason of any such exmust not teing properly protected, or the public not being properly guarded therefrom.
25. Exhibitors of perishable articles, such as Fruits, Flowers and Vegetables, will be allowed the privilege (after the Judges have made their awards), of replacing any articles which may have deteriorated or wilted.
26. All reasonable latitude will be alkowed exmbitors in the taking of orders and the sale of articles on exhibition; but delivery of any article will not be permitted until the close of the Exhibition.
27. The Commission reserve tne right to prescribe and regulate all matters pertaining to we harmony and attractiveness of ' ibition, and the arrangement of and allotment of space for exhibi! in : departments.
28. Cotton signs and advertising cards which obstruct the view, and light, are not permitted. Banners are much more handsome and businesslike.
29. The wholesale aistribution of handbills or other advertising matter tuat may cause a nuisance, is not allowed.
30. While the Commission agree to take every reasonable precaution to ensure the safety of animals and articles sent to Exnibition, yet it must be distinctly understood that the owners are required to assume all risks; and should any animal or article he accidentally injured, lost or

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stolen, the Commiamion will render all the asaistance in its power for the recovery of the same, but will not recognice any clalm for payment of the value of any portion thereof.
31. Any artlele or fixtures left in the buildings or grounds at the clowe of the Exhlbitical will be at the riok of tue owners.

34. Exhibitors will take Lostice that it is absolutely required that the entries be made on or before the dates mentioned, in order to athord suffcient time to examine we entry papers, apportion space, forward entry tickets, and to correspond with parties, when necessary. In view also of the issue of the live stock cataloyue and the time necessary for that purpose after the receipt of all entries, this rule is imperative.
35. Thi Entry Fee must, in all cases, be forwarded with the entry. No entry will to accepted unless this is done. Fees should be sent, by Post Office order, postal note, or bills in registered letters. Postage stamps will not be accepted. Postal notes for any amount can be obtained at all Post Offices. When fees are remitted by check payable outside of Halifax, 25 cents must be added for exchange.
30. Exhibits in each department shall pay a separate entrance fee, and there shall be no smaller charge than 25 cents in any department.
37. No changes will be allowed any Exhibitor after entries are closed.
38. When entries are made, great care should be observed to have the name of the exhibitor and address in full.
39. After entering each animal or article, exhibitors will be supplied with a card apecifying the class, section and number of entry, which card $m u s t$ remain attached to the animal or article during the Exhibition.

40. No person will be allowed to enter for exhibition more than one specimen in any one section of a class. This rule does not apply to animals, but to all kinds of grain, vegetable products, etc., in which each additional article would necessarily be similar to the rest.
41. In the Horse, Cattle, Sheep, Swine and Poultry classes, the entry must in every instance be made in the name of the bona fide owner, and unless this rule be observed, no premium will be awarded, or, if awarded, will be withheld. If any person shall exhibit any animal or bird of which he is not the bona fide owner, except where sire and his get are shown, or under false entry as to age or otherwise, he will forfeit any premium which may be ađarded him, and be precluded from exhibiting in the future.
42. Exhibitors intending to compete for "Special Yrizes," herd or pen prizes offered, must enter in regular form.
4.3. All first prize animals are eligible to compete for sweepstake, and they alore.
43. In all cases the right is reserved to reject entirely or accept conditionally, any entry or application.
44. Exhibitors must make themselves acquainted with the Prize List and Regulations, and be sure to which classes and sections their exhibits properly belong.
45. Parties desiring the privilege to scll must make special arrangements with the Secretary.

A merchant who sells a line of goods which are also sold by other merchants, cannot be considered as an agent for such goods.
47. Extra Entries:-Every article must be entered under some one of the sections in the regular Premium List, when possible; but if any article is not enumerated, it may then be entercd in the class with which it most nearly corresponds, under the Section Heading "extra."

49. There are no charges for space. Application for space for the exhibit of all classes of manufacture should be made to the Sccretary as early as possible.
50. Intending exhibitors are requested, when sending in their entries, to state size of space required.
51. Exhibitors desiring extra space for advertizing and display purposes, or the privilege to sell, may have the same granted upon condition of maintaining their display, and by paying a centain rental per foot or bulk sum, according to arrangement. Extra ligar may be obtained upon payment.
52. On or about the 15 th of July, apace will be allotted in the Machinery, Carriage, and Main Buildings, to such exhibitors as have made application, and notice of such allotment, stating the rental, if any, will be mailed to them, and should any space remain, it will be allobted as applied for.
53. If any exhibitor fail to make and maintain a creditable display, or have the exhibit completed on time, the Commission reserves the right to declare the space, or any portion thereof, forfeited.

## LIVE STOCK.

54. Good buildings are provided upon the grounds for Live Stock. Water will be furnished for Horses, Cattle, Sheep and Swine, without charge, from the opening till the close of the Exhibition, so that the stock may be taken to the grounds immediately on their arrival. Hay, grain and straw for bedding for Horses, Cattle, Sheep and Swine, will be for sale on the grounds at lowest market prices. Exhibitors will please report if unreasonable prices are exacted.
55. Exhibitors nust have their catalogue numbers posted in a conspicuous puace on their respective stalls on a card, which will be furnished by the Secretary.

56. No stalls will be let for storage or sleeping purposea, and parties intentionally or otherwisc using stalls for such purposes shall forfeit their rights to same.
57. All stalls must be left open and animals kept uncovered from 10 a. m. to 5 p. m. every day of Exhibition, so that visitors may have ample opportunity to inspect the animals. The production of any of the animals may be ordered by the Superintendent in charge for review or other purposes, at any time during the Exhibition; and any exhibitor or attendant refusing or neglecting to bring such animal out as directed, shall forfeit his entry fees and any premius which may have been awarded him.
58. For further Regulations, see heads of the various Live Stock Departments.
59. Prize Colors-First Prize, Red; Second Prize, Blue; Third Prize, Green; Highly commended, White.

## JUDGFS AND JUDGING.

60. The Judges will be appointed by the Commission previous to the Exhibition, and will receive a circular informing them of the fact, and when to report at the office of the Secretary.
61. No person will be allowed to act as a Judge who is in any way interested in the animal or article to be examined. All Live Stock will be judged between 5 a. m. and 1 p . m. Programme of judging will be furnished to all exhibitors.
62. Judges in the several departments will meet at the Manager's office on the grounds, presenting their Circular of appointment at 10 a. m. on Monday, September 24th.
63. It is particularly requested that Judges will not enter into arguments with exhibitors as to the nerits of their exhibits.
64. The Judges are requested to make at the end of their book, before handing in the same to the Secretary's office, any suggestions or recommendations they may deem necessary for consideration by the Commissioners with a view to improving the Prize List for future Exhibitions.
65. It is desired that tae Judges of each class go together to hand in their report, instead of sending it by one of their number, and remain together until their 'sok has been examined by the Secretary, in order that errors or doubt nay more promptly and easily be made right.
66. It is expected that the expert Judges in the Live Stock Departments will give an address, setting forth the points required in the different classes, using, for that purpose, subjects taken from the prize winners.
67. Judges are requested to have the winners' name and address written upon the prize card, where cards ars used, before placing same upon tne animal or article to which they have awarded the prize.

68. Judges will please sign and hand their awards to the Secertary as soon as possible, and make any more extended reports they desire to make afterwards.
69. The Judges are pa:ticularly requested not to leave the grounds until they ascertain from the Secretary whether there are any protests against the awards in the classes they have judged.
70. No individual exbibitor can take more than one rize in any one section, uniess there is competition, as in other words, he cannot be a competitor against himself. Also where there is no competition except between anima!s from the same farm or stable, but one prize will be given.
71. If the stock or article exhibited is of inferior quality or not in proper condition, Judges shall award only such primium as they think the animal or article deserve?. They shall єxercise their discretion as to awarding first, sccond, or any premium.
72. It does not follow because a prise if ofiered for any partionlar animal or articlo, that it must be awarded moless there is proper competition, or unleas the exhibit is really of auflioient merit to warrant the award being made. Judges are particularly requested to note this fact.
73. In addition to the stated premium offered, the Judges shall also distinguish such animals or articles as they consider deserving of notice, but which have not received prizes, 1 y tickets with tine warls "Htraicx Commended" and "Commended" upon them. These tickets will not entitle the holder to any money payment.
74. No award of a money prize not offered in the list will be oaid.
75. Each award must be written in a plain and careful manner by the Judges, in the books handed them by the Secretary.
76. Exhibitors can ascertain from the Superintendents in charge of the several departnents when the Judges will examiras their exhibits. No complaint based upon the statement that Judges overlooked animals or articles, will therefore be entertained by the Commissioners.
77. In a! classes of Live Stock where registration is called for by the Prize List, every exhibito: must give the registration number when making entry, and must produce to the Secretary and the Superintendent of the Department, when required, a certificate showing that the animal is duly registered in a recognized Stul, Herd, Flock, or Swine Book, and unless such certificate is produced as above, tue animal or animals shall not be allowed to compete, excepting horses and cattle under one year, sheep and swine under six months, in which case name and registration of the sire and dam must be given on the entry form.

78. Any exhibitor lodging a protest must make it in writing, and deliver it to the Secretary within twelve hours after the award complained of is made. It must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal, and must be accominanied by a deposit of $\$ 5$, which sum shall be forfeited if said protest is not sustained by the Commission or by the persons delegated by it to deal with the same, whose decision shall be final, and no further appeal shall lie.
79. The commissioners, however, earnestly hope exhibitors will not enter protests without the strongest grounds. Protests of a frivolous nature cause much annoyance and unpleasantness.
80. No animal or article exhibited shall have above it any price, colors or cards, until the awards have been made in their respective classes.
81. No person will be allowed in the Rings during the time Horses, Cattle, Dneep and Swine are being judged, except Judges, Commissioners, Superintendents, Officials, Members of the Press, Grooms, or persons in charge of animals being judged.
82. All prize cards and ribbons amxed by the Judges must be displayed during the Exhibition. Any infraction ot this rule will incur forfeiture of premiums awarded.
83. Any person who shall attempt to interfere with or influence thy Judges in the discharge of their duty, or who shall at any time on the Exhibition ground use any contemptuous or ahusive language to any Judge in consequence of any award made by him, shall forfeit his rights to all premiums which have been awarded to him. Judges are particularly requested to immediately report any breach of this rule.
84. Upon discovery of any fraud, deception, dishonest practice or misrepresentation in the preparation, entry, or ownership of any animal or article exhibited, which may '.ve affected or may have been intended to affect the decision of the awarded, and may prohibit the Commission will withiold all prizes uch party or aries from exhibiting in any department of the Exhibitior for one or more years, and also publish the names of such persons should they see fit.
85. The Commissioners may require any exhibitor to make a statutory declaration before any magistrate or commissioner of tuc Supreme Court in relation to any disputed fact in regard to any matter relating to entries or to the awarding of prizes in any department, and a refusal or neglect on the part of any exhibitor to make such statutory declaration may be taken by the Commission as such evidence of bad faith as to justify the withho!ding of any or all prizes.

## EUPERINTHMDENTE OF DEPARTMENTE.

86. Each Superintendent of a department will have the selection of necessury assistants, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee, and the arrangement and supervision of all articles or animals on exhibition in his department, and be responsible to the Cominission for the manngement of tne same.
87. He shall attend the Judges in his department, and afford them every facility for examination.
88. He shall provide proper and ample space for all exhibits, and the Superintendents of Live Stock shall, eitner personally or through the Secretary, provide stalls for all animals exhibting.

## PAYMCINT OF PRIZES.

89. The secretary will be prepared to commence giving orders upon the Treasurer for the payment of premiums on Friday morning, October 5th, at his office. These orders must be endorsed, as they will be payable to order (not to bearer), and on presentation to the Treasurer, properly endorsed, will be paid.
90. Parties having prizes awarded to them, are particularly requested to apply for them before leaving Halifax, or leave a written order with some person to roceive them, stating the articles for which prizes are claimed, and the amount of same. No prizes will be paid other than to the parties to whom awarded except upon presentation of a written order signed by the winner.
91. All persons to whom a prize has been awarded, and-who did not receive the same, as above, must apply to the Secretary, in writing, for payment thereof, before the 20th November of this year, otherwise such prize will be forfeited.

## MEDALS.

2. Medals will be s,warded to meritorious exhibits in the different classes, subject to the approval of the Commission. Exhibitors may also receive medals in lieu of money prizes should they prefer to do so.

## RAILWAYS, BTEAMBOATS, ETC.

93. Favorable arrangements have been made with all the Railway and Steamboat Managers for the conveyance of passengers and exhibits to and from the exhibition at greatly reduced rates, and for special excursions.
94. The grounds are connected with the railways, and exhibits can be delivered from the trains.

## 3ITBOHLLANEOU8.

95. If through ignorance of the regulations any person shall bring things to the Exhibition without having entered the same in proper manner at the proper time, they may, in the discretion of the Commission, be allowed to place the same upon the grounds so as to be seen by the public. They shall not, however, be classifled or examined bv the Judges, and no premiums will be awarded.
96. Exhibitors must arrange their exhibits in as neat and as attractive a manner as possible, and fit up the space allotted them in a proper manner, in default of which the Commission may cancel their entries
97. The Commission reserve the right to prescribe the dimensions and regulate positions af all signs, and generally to dircet the management of articles on exhibition, so far as may be necessary to secure harmony and an aucractive appearance.

## FIRE AND POLIOE PROTECTION.

98. The most thorough arrangements possible have been made to guard against fire. The groands are connected by telephone with the different Fire Halls, and with the precautions taken, it is believed the danger of fire is very remote. Exhibitors desiring insurance must give the matter their personal attention.
99. An ample police force will be on duty day and night. Exhibitors are, however, expected to exercise constant supervision over their articles on exhibition, because the Commission will not be responsible for loss or damage by theft, fire, or any other cause.
100. Small and valuable articles should le exhibited in show cases wuich can be securely locked.

## BNQUIRIES.

All information concerning the Exhibition and its arrangements can be obtained by addressing the Secretary at Halifax. During the Exhibition, enquiries may be made on the permises of the Commission, their officers and servants, who, whin applied to, will either supply the information sought, or refer the questioner to the proper officer.

## PREs3.

101. Members of the Press are cordially invited to the Exhibition. Ample accommodation will bs provided and all necessary information promptly supplied.

Editors are requested to notify the Secretary, two or three weeks previous to the Exhibition, of the names of representatives they will have on duty, in order that tickets may be forwarded.

The hotels of the city, ample for any occasion, will adhere to their regular rates, and the citizens will co-operate with the Commission in every practical manner in contributing to the pleasure of visitors.

3. In making entries the owner's name and address in full, the name of animal (if named), and the age must be given.
4. In all pure-bred classes full pedig: ce, properly certined, must be produced on the grounds when required by the Superintendent, and the number of registration, and the Stud Bcok, must be given on the entry form. No animals will be allowed to compere as pure-tred, unless they possess regular stud pedigrees, except geldings and animals under one year of age, in

which case the name and regietration of dire and dam muat be given. Judgea and Superintendents on the grounds will have the right to demand produc. tion of certificates of regitration.
6. Great care must be taken to enter each animal in its proper class, as no alterations can be made after the entries close.
6. The entry must in every instance be made in the name of the bona fide owner, and unless this rule be observed, no premium will be awarded, or, if awarded, will be withheld.

If any person shall exhibit any animal of which he is not the bona fide owner, except where sire and hie get are shown, or under false entry as to age or otherwfee, he will forteit any premium which may be awarded.

Exhibitors intending to compete for Apecial Prizes must enter in regular form.

All first prize animals are eligible to compete for sweepstakes, and they alone.
7. Upon discovery of any fraud, deception, dishonest practice or mis. representation in the preparation, entry or ownership of an animal or article exhibited, which may have affected or may have been intended to effect the decision of the Judgr, the Commissioners will withhold all prizes awarded, and may prohibit such party or parties from exhibting in any class for one or more years, and also publish names of such persons should they sit.
8. No animal will be allowed to compete in more than one class or section, except (1) toals of 1806, which may compete with their dam and also separately, and (2) mare and two of her progeny, and stallion and three of get, and (3) animals competing in the Speed Class.
9. No animal will be allowed a premium unless sound, except in the case of stallions, and brood mares injured by accidents, which do not lessen their usefulness, and in the Speed Class.
10. All stalls must be left open, anu animals kept uncovered, from 10 a. m . to 5 p . m., so that visitors may have ample opportunity to inspect the animals.

The production of any of the animals may be ordered by the Superintendent in charge for review or other purposes, at any time during the Exhibition; and any exhibitor or attendant refusing or neglecting to bring such animal as dircted, shall torfeit his entry fees and any premium which may have been awarded him.
11. In the Roadster, Carriage and Hackney Classes, exhibitors should come prepared to show their horses harnessed to carriage, if required.
12. All horses on exhibition must be brought out for inspection by the Judges, or for exhibition, whemever called upon by the official appointed to that duty.

If any person shall exhibit an animal of which he is not the bona fide owner, except where sire and his get are shown, or under false entry as to age or otherwise, he will forfeit any premium which may be awarded him.

Exhibitors intending to compete for "special prizes," herd or pen prizes offered, must enter in regular form. All first prize animals are eligible to competc for sweepstakes, and they alone.
5. Upon discovery of any fraud, deception, dishonest practice or minrepresentation in the preparation, ownership, or entry of an animal or article exhibited, which may have affected or may have been intended to affect the decision of the Judge, the Commissioners will withhold all prizes awarded, and may prohibit such party or parties from exhibiting in wny class for one or more years, and may also publish names of such persons; should they see fit.

Althongh Angora breeding is a growing and extensive industry in the United States-there being
extensive runches in Texns, Culifornia, Nevada, Missouri, Dakota, Maine, and even in Alaska-except for n few Angoras kept for exhibition purposes in a couple of public parks, it is an entirely nere enterprise in Canada.

Angora Goats are bred for their wool (culled Mohair), which is long ( 10 to 20 inc hes), silky, lustrous, and snowy white, as well as for their meat, skins and pelts. They are exempt from the offensive odor of

the collmmon gont, and where known are classed aniong the most useful of domestic animals, and have been so for thousands of years-so much so, that the Sultan lins absolutely prohibited their exportation. The fleece furnishes many of the fliert fabrics of ladies' wear. The fine fabric known as "camel's hair" is of the best mohair, and not from the cimel, as generally supposed.

Mohair is mivod with silk and wool in a great variety of beautifur fabrics, improving the luster, quality and durability of each. Mohair braids contest the market with silk. It is also used in the munufacture of ladies' shawls, dress and knit gools, plushes, and many other fine lines. The short and coarser qualities of hair are used for shankets, lap-robes, rugs, carpets, ete.

The skins are used for leather, bu. the pelts for rober and rugs

The meat, is so nearly like the best Shropshire lamb that it requires an expert to detect it, and it is exceedingly nutritious and palatable.

The milis is richer than that of cows or the common goat.

They are great brousers, every leaf, twig, and even most of the weeds :and bushes nsualiy considered poisonous to other anirauls, are eaten. They will desert the finest clover or olue joint grass for such browse.
