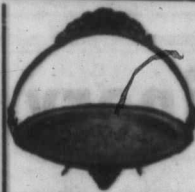

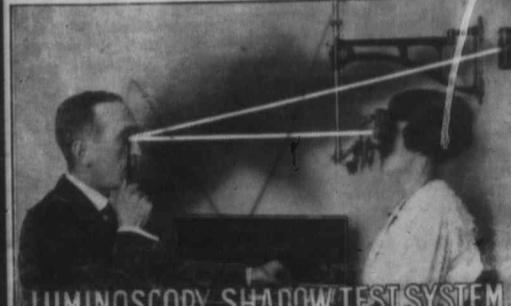

H. and the order in Council of the Royal Gazette in reference to re-opening or continuing schools. At the present it did not appear necessary to take stern measures of closing all gatherings and quarantining all who were ill, but an outbreak might occur here as well as elsewhere and the authorities would be blamed if preventive measures were not adopted. Dr. McGrath followed and he strongly advocated preventive measures being taken at once and the closing of all gatherings where the Influenza might be disseminated. The pastors of the various churches then expressed the views as feeling that up to the present there had been no danger of contagion from the churches, but if the Board deemed it best to close for a time they would readily comply.

The precautions taken in the school rooms were mentioned showing that all care had been exercised there.

On motion of Prof. Blair seconded by Mr. F. E. Wade it was resolved that all schools, churches, places of amusement, pool rooms and all public gatherings be closed or discontinued until further notice. This motion was freely discussed and several members of the Board expressed themselves strongly against such drastic action as American cities which had closed such places were re-opening. School children were said to be far less liable to contagion if properly cared for in school than if allowed to go about promiscuously the parents not being able to keep them in the houses. However it was deemed wise to take every precaution possible and the motion for closing was carried.

Further action will be taken to prevent persons from congregating in the Post Office or in the Railway Station or even in numbers in any of the stores.

All citizens were given notice of such closing from the pulpits on Sunday and on Monday morning the closure came into effect. We ask our citizens to observe the ruling of the Board of Health and do everything possible to prevent Influenza from becoming epidemic here. The people will be notified when public gatherings can be again held and the schools re-opened.

Influenza: Some interesting Facts About Prevention and Treatment.  
 Issued by Commission on National Prevention Service 1918.

**Influenza: Some Interesting Facts About its History, Prevention and Treatment.**

Issued by Commission of Conservation Press Service, Oct. 15th, 1918.

Influenza, which is now sweeping over Canada from one end to the

other, is a very old disease. It was known in ancient times, and as early as 1510 it over ran the whole civilized world. For centuries it has periodically swept over various parts of the world. The last great world epidemic was in 1889-1890 when it was generally known by the French name of la grippe. The disease has always travelled from east to west.

Symptoms -- The symptoms are similar to those of a heavy cold;

more or less severe headache, cold in the head and throat, fits of sneezing, flushed face, chills, aches and pains in the back and limbs, pains in the eye-balls and behind the eyes, general depression, and temperature rising to between 101 and 104 degrees.

How to Prevent it -- As it is such an old disease, doctors have naturally learned a great deal about its pre-

vention and treatment. The first principle of prevention is to keep away from those infected, and the second, to build up the germ resisting parts of the body by eating nourishing foods, dressing comfortably, getting lots of sleep, and by living in the open air and in bright, well ventilated rooms as much as possible. The mouth, throat and nose should be systematically and

frequently disinfected by antiseptic inhalations, sprays and washes. Such preparations as chloretone and listerine are well adapted for this purpose.

In fighting previous epidemics, doctors found quinine a useful preventive. One grain of sulphate of quinine mixed with (but not dissolved in) a wineglassful of cold water makes an excellent antiseptic gargle.
