CHICAGO'S FIREBOATS.

A thrill of apprehension will be felt by millions who see its flery head plowing through the stars and its sword shaped tail brandished over the earth, as if monitory of unknown and unavoidable evil. Astronomers have calculated that

Halley's comet must have crossed in-side the orbital distance of Jupiter from the sun about the 1st of last January. In the middle of January its distance from the earth was estimated at 440,000,000 miles. During the late fall it is expected to become visible to the naked eye after having for months before been photographed and studied with telescopes. It will slowly brighten during next winter, being visible from nearly all parts of the earth. Gradually approaching the sun, it will make its perihelion passage at a

distance of about 66,000,000 miles from April. Its greatest brightness is exthe solar globe on the 13th of next pected to occur after the perihelion passage, when it will draw nearer the earth and be visible in both the evening and the morning sky. But at that time it will be south of the celestia! equator and consequently better seen from the southern hemisphere. About May 18 the comet will be only 12,000,-000 or 13,000,000 miles from the earth, although for more than a month it will have been retreating from the sun.

Just what its appearance will be no one can predict. It is the Proteus of space. It may blaze with amazing splendor, as it did when trembling Europe saw in it an avatar of the con-Teddy, after having a drink of plain soda water, was asked how he liked it. The returns of Halley's comet have recently been traced back to the year 240 B. C., but it has probably been revolving in its elliptical orbit very much longer than that.

Halley's discovery after its appearance in 1682 that it was a regular visitor to the neighborhood of the sun has always ranked as one of the capital triumphs of astronomy. His suspicion that the comet of 1682 was not paying its first visit to the sun was based upon the similarity between its orbit in space and the orbits of two other Mr. James Lulloch, of Iron Bridge, comets which had appeared in 1607 peat twice to each call. 



Canada's Fisheries of Great Wealth - The Report of Great Interest.

Ottawa, Nov. 9.-The total value fish caught in Canadian water ring 1908 was \$25,451,085. This i in the annual report of the Fisheries Branch of the Department of Marine and Fisheries. The revenue of 1908 was less than that of 1907, by \$46,-264, and less than 1906 by \$828,400. This was the second highest year on record, 1905 being the record year. For that year the total revenue was from two and a quarter to four and a quarter million dollars ahead of the years 1902-3-4. Although the total for 1908 was less than the two pre-ceding years, the upward tendency has been well maintained.

ent of fisheries, in his general summary remarks: "To say that the fisheries of Canada are by far the most extensive in the world is no ex. aggeration, Moreover it is safe to say that the waters in and around Canada contain the principal compercial food fish in greater abundance than the waters of any other part of

HUDSON BAY RAILWAY

Engineer Presents an Interesting Report-Nelson Harbor Open for Seven Months.

Ottawa, Nov. 10.-The most interest feature of the annual report of the minister of railways issued today for the neonle of Canada west, is the remarks made by M. J. Butler, deputy minister of the Hudson's Bay railway surveys. After referring in a general way to the work done by the surveying parties in 1908, under Mr. John Armstrong, the deputy ministen makes the following reference to Mr. Armstrong's reports.

It appears that two routes have been found, onr to Fort Churchill, and the other having its terminal on the Bay at Port Nelson, on the river Nelson. He sets down the length of the Churchill route from the Pas at 465 miles, of which about 320 miles have been surveyed, the cost at \$11,-605,585. The length of the Port Nelon route is 397 miles, and the estimated cose, \$8,875,350, to which, in

He considers thae the probable cost of either road would be sevenreen or eighteen million dollars. This estimate, however, as he explains, is based upon incomplete surveys, and exploratory reports. The unit prices used in Mr. Armstrong's report are considered too low.
