## SPEECH FROM THE THRONE

Naval Policy, French Treaty, Grand Trunk Pacific and Hudson Bay Railway Are Mentioned.

Ottawa, Nov. 11.—The House of Commons was opened today without any special incident. There was a large crowd present and the House was filled to the utmost capacity. The following is the speech from the throne:

Hon. Gentlemen of the Senate, Gentlemen of the House of Commons: In again meeting you at a season most convenient for the despatch of business, it is with great pleasure that I congratulate on the prosperous condition of the country. The present year which is now rapidly drawing to a close, has been a period of very steady and progressive growth. Immigration has poured into the new settlements of the north and of the west in a copious and well ordered stream, drawn from the best elements of the British Isles, the United States and continental Europe. Trade and commerce have made rapid advances in all directions. The revenue has almost completely galloped what it lost in the recent depression. Most remarkable has been the rapid recovery from the financial embarrassment which for a short time was the cause of anxiety amongst the business men. In nearly every branch of business there has been a revival of activity which gives assurance of continued progress and prosperity.

Two members of my government attended the Imperial conference called by His Majesty's government on the question of defence. A plan was adopted after consideration with the admiralty for the organization of a Canadian naval service on the lines of the resolution of the Canadian House of Commons of March 29, last. The papers will be immediately brought down and a bill introduced accordingly.

The new convention between His Majesty and the President of the French republic, respecting the commercial relations between France and French legislative chambers, you will be asked to confirm it. The construction of the Transcontinental railway has made substantial progress during the year. The western division has been extended 66 miles beyond Edmonton, completing a total distance of 961 miles west of Winnipeg. Contracts have been let for 399 miles in the Mountain division, good progress was made on the work. The eastern division is now open for traffic from Winnipeg to Lake Superior Junction and thence by the Grand Trunk Pacific branch to the Lake itself.

The whole of the work between Winnipeg and Moncton is under contract. The board of engineers entrusted with the preparation of plans for the reconstruction of the Quebec bridge, has sufficiently advanced its work to permit of tenders being invited for the structure.

The exploratory surveys for a railway from the western wheat fields to Hudson's Bay were pushed energetically during the whole of last summer. It is hoped that a report of the operations will be placed before you at an early date. In order to improve the facilities already afforded the public by the government railways and to enhance their value as part of the great transcontinental transportation system of Canada, a bill will be submitted to you for the purpose of enabling the minister of railways, on the recommendation of the government railway managing board, and subject to the approval of parliament, to lease any line or lines connecting with the Intercolonial railway.

A measure will be submitted to you for the purpose of rendering more effective the present legislation respecting combinations which unduly enhance prices. Bills will also be introduced respecting banks and banking, insurance, navigable waters, and other matters. Gentlemen of the House of Commons: The accounts of the last year will be laid before you. The estimates for the coming fiscal year will be submitted for your approval at an early date.

Honorable gentlemen of the senate, I pray the Almighty Lord that he may guide and bless your deliberations and that they may bear fruit in a further increase of our country's prosperity and well being.

The Daily Mail special Canadian edition is the latest plunge of London's imperial journalism into the Dominion field. W. Singer Barclay has been in Canada nearly three months looking for a soft bed for the new organ. He came over with McKenzie the Daily Mail correspondent, whose articles have been appearing for some weeks in the Harroworth daily.

The Centennial Committee held a conference with Premier Hazen of New Brunswick last week and received assurances of the hearty support of that government for the project.

## BAPTIST CONVENTION

The Greatest Convention in Western Canada Held in Moose Jaw.

Moose Jaw, Nov. 11.—The provincial Baptist convention was opened here today with the president, G. F. Stephens presiding. In his address, the president referred to the marvelous growth of the prairie population, and advocated greater liberality in church contributions. The address of the evening was given by Rev. D. W. Paterson on "Personality and Progress." There are about one hundred in attendance and many more are expected.

Nov. 12.—This morning's session of the second annual meeting of the Baptist convention opened with a largely augmented attendance. Rev. J. A. MacDonald, Winnipeg, delivered an address on "The Harmonious Life." It was an eloquent discourse, directed against the doctrine of a strenuous life, which the speaker thought may be carried to an extreme. There is need for a wise test as well as a wise work, he said. Worry is the rust that consumes the rage of character and we spend too much time and participating troubles that never come.

The nomination committee presented the following report recommending as officers for the year 1909-10, which on motion was adopted. President, J. E. McIntyre, Winnipeg; 1st vice president, Rev. G. H. Jones, Regina; 2nd vice president, Rev. E. Perry, D. Vancouver; 3rd vice president, Hon. G. H. V. Bulyea, Alberta; 4th vice president, Dr. C. W. Clark, Winnipeg. Appointments to the general board retiring 1910, Albert Turabull, Rev. C. E. Freeman, (retiring 1911) Mr. Joshua Frith, (retiring 1912) W. Marchant, Rev. F. W. Patterson, W. Findlay, Rev. J. C. Bowen, Rev. A. A. Shaw, Rev. M. A. MacLean, H. Hilton, R. Moffatt and J. Coulter White.

At this evening's platform meeting the Rev. J. G. Brown, D.D., and Rev. W. E. Stackhouse delivered addresses the principal feature being taken up by the Rev. C. Jackson gave a synopsis of the report of the corresponding secretary, showing that the Women's Society had raised last year for missionary purposes \$4,940, made up of \$3,200 for home and \$1,740 for foreign missions.

Rev. A. G. Hagstrom, secretary of the Swedish General Conference of the United States, detailed the work among the Swedish immigrants in both Canada and the United States. He said there were from 75 to 100 thousand Swedes in this country, and the number is constantly increasing. Economic troubles at home were driving them abroad. There were maintaining organizations which kept in touch with them from the day of their arrival.

J. G. Brown, D.D., lately returned from India, spoke of the great awakening in India. The desire for a national flag and a free self-government was sweeping over the entire country and breaking down caste and creeds. He emphasized the beneficence of the British rule in India and said it was absolutely the best form of government ever devised. But the people aroused wished to make themselves a separate nation, and would do it whether there was opposition or not. Lord Morley's reform scheme came in for a good deal of praise and approbation as a wise measure. The missionaries are doing much to elevate and assist the Indians into the higher levels into which they are climbing.

**SATURDAY**  
 The session on home missions, education and the budget furnished the programme of the Baptist convention on Saturday. The entire morning was occupied by reports from the mission field by representatives of each of the western provinces; also German and Scandinavian churches, followed by a report of the general board of home missions.

After a protracted session, during which several changes were made in the constitution, the convention approved a resolution that this organization shall in future be known as "The Baptist Union of Western Canada." The convention sermon was preached in the Baptist church this morning by Rev. J. N. McLean, before a crowded congregation, and tonight an eloquent address on the laymen's missionary movement was delivered by Rev. W. T. Stackhouse, D.D., followed by a conference.

All the city pulpits, with the exception of the Anglican, were opened today by visiting delegates, and large congregations attended each service. During the decade from 1898 to 1908 Canada led the world, with the exception of Argentina in comparative increase in trade, during the preceding decade from 1897 to 1907, Canada ranks third in respect to trade growth, with Argentina first and Japan second. Japan now ranks third. This is a most interesting fact brought out in the annual report of the trade and commerce department.

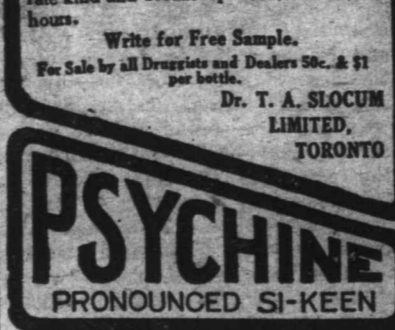

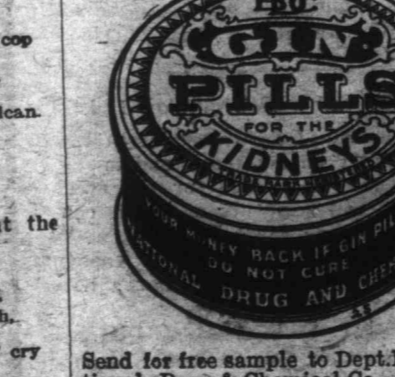

Water Guns That Discharge Nine Thousand Gallons a Minute.

RICHEST IN THE WORLD

Canada's Fisheries of Great Wealth—The Report of Great Interest.

Ottawa, Nov. 9.—The total value of fish caught in Canadian waters during 1908 was \$26,351,085. This is the most significant statement made in the annual report of the Fisheries Branch of the Department of Marine and Fisheries.

The results of 1908 were obtained by a fishing fleet of 1,414 vessels nine of which were engaged in fishing for seals, and 39,965 boats, the whole manned by 71,070 men.

### BLACKMAILED BY A WOMAN

Treasurer of Big Four Railway Stole Over Half a Million to Silence a Blackmailer.

New York, Nov. 8.—C. L. Warriner, until a week ago local treasurer at Cincinnati of the Big Four railroad, one of the Vanderbilt lines, stole \$643,000 from that company before he was suspected of being a thief by his superiors in the railroad service.

Announcement to this effect was made this evening from the office of Albert H. Harris, vice president of the Big Four, whose headquarters are in the Grand Central station. This is the brief and formal statement handed out by Mr. Harris today.

Edmund A. Mackenzie, business man of New York, has written to the local police of this city asking by what law or section of the constitution of the United States government the local police ordered him to lower the British flag, which he had hoisted in honor of King Edward's birthday, last Tuesday. The incident has caused widespread comment, not at all complimentary to the police officials. Mackenzie ordered the flag displayed at the staff on the staff, on his premises just over the city line in Fannwood. The flag had been flying but a few minutes, when it was seen by the driver of a laundry wagon. This man notified the police of the fact and patrolmen were despatched to Mackenzie's home with orders to have the flag hauled down.

He has been arrested and is now held to await the action of the grand jury at Cincinnati.

## TERRIBLE DISASTER IN ILLINOIS MINE

Nearly Four Hundred Miners Meet Terrible Deaths in Coal Mine—No Chance of Escape from the Flames.

Spring Valley, Ill., Nov. 14.—There are over four hundred miners dead in a mine at Cherry, a mining village on the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul Railway, seven miles north of this city. 484 miners were lowered to their work Saturday, and only 24 are known to have escaped. The fire originated in a stable in the second level, or in the mule barns, and was discovered by Miner James Heney, who gave the alarm. But little notice was taken of the warning until 3 p.m. when a general alarm was given. Then it was too late and the biggest mine disaster in the state went on record. A band of twelve rescuers volunteered to go down and they too lost their lives, bringing the sum total of lives lost to 472.

Late tonight government rescue men and state mine inspectors, taking their lives in their hands, unsealed the shaft of the burning mine, and penetrated to the 380 foot or first level of the mine. The fire had been smothered. The smoldering ruins of frame work in the main shaft, the dense pall of smoke, and other havoc wrought by the flames were the only evidences of the fire which raged so fiercely on Saturday and part of today, and which blotted out a greater city to many a poor, poor, little town of Cherry.

No bodies were discovered; no search was made for them. The fire party that descended into the mine was satisfied that the measures taken to check the flames had proved effectual. The men quickly returned to the surface.

Early tomorrow morning the main shaft of the Cherry mine will be opened up to the 500 foot level. Venturesome men will go below in these different levels, and into the branch workings that extend like the burrowing of a mole far into the earth in many directions. These rescuing parties in all probability, will come upon the bodies of miners who met their death in their living tomb. The work of bringing out the dead will then begin, and the harrowing scenes which have been witnessed at the mouth of the shaft, and all through the little town today will pale into insignificance.

### MANY BLUNDERS

The story of the disaster is plain enough now, and with the telling of the story is made patent the fact that someone blundered—someone had blundered not once or twice, but many times, else there might have been a different tale to tell. There was a blunder when the hay which caused the fire was sent down the mine. There was a blunder when the burning hay was dumped down the shaft. There was a blunder when the signal was given to reverse the great ventilating fan. There was a blunder when the signal to hoist the cage, to have heroes who ventured into the burning mine was not obeyed. There was a blunder when the water supply gave out and water had to be transported quite a distance before it could be poured into the burning shaft.

### INQUEST OPENED

Coroner A. G. Mahm, of the Bureau county, held an inquest over the bodies this far recovered, in the city hall at Cherry.

Engineer Cawley, was the principal witness. He testified that the cage had arrived at the 380 foot level he received a number of signals in quick succession. First came a signal to lower, then to stop, then to lower again, then to stop, so that he was at a loss to know what to do, and finally of his own volition realized that something was wrong, and raised the cage. The verdict will be rendered later.

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galleries of the mine, with the exception of the main gallery is steel, out in the galleries and shafts, it is of very heavy wooden beams said to be eight by eight.

Once there were thoroughly airtight, it seemed that all the water in the country would not extinguish the flames. Finally, after two tremendous splashes of water had been hurled down the shaft, it was decided that the only way to extinguish the flames was to smother them, and preparations were made to seal up the entrance to the shaft. Once this became apparent to the crowd, panic broke loose, and men, women and children rushed to the shafts determined to make one last effort to save those who were down in the mine. To smother the flames seemed to them to mean that the men would be smothered, and time after time, the women especially, had to be hurried back from the shaft to prevent them from hurling themselves into it. Virtually crazed by grief, screaming, cursing and imploring, they gave the rescuers and fire fighters a fierce battle before they were driven back.

Those familiar with the mine knew that here and there through the galleries and drifts were trap doors, which might be closed, and that the men, therefore, might have a fighting chance of escape if the shafts were sealed up and the fire smothered.

Finally this was done and the crowd prepared to wait until morning. Some went home, but the greater number remained at the shaft, notwithstanding that rain was falling and blowing cold and keen. Those who went home furnished one of the most pitiful sights of the whole town, all the more apparent to one who realized the import of the catastrophe. Everyone of them lighted a lamp and placed it close to the front window or in the door way, sheltered in some way from the wind.

## WRECK AT VANCOUVER

Out of a Score of Passengers Fourteen Are Killed and Others Badly Injured.

Vancouver, Nov. 16.—A runaway car of lumber early this morning crashed into a crowded inter-urban car of the British Columbia Electric railway, killing fourteen and injuring nine passengers, two fatally.

The passenger car left the Vancouver depot at 5.50. Just ahead was an electric freight train consisting of a locomotive, box car and freight car loaded with heavy timbers, which were fifty or sixty feet long and two feet thick.

Three miles out at the head of the grade, which the freight car had just ascended, the coupling of the lumber car broke, and it started back towards the city.

By this time the passenger car was a quarter of a mile behind, and just leaving the Lake View station, a short distance beyond the city limits. When the lumber car dashed into view its speed must have been tremendous, for Motorman Thoburn did not have time to move. When the impact occurred the heavy timber on the car slid forward as if they had been on greased slides, and ripped the passenger car level with the floor.

None of the passengers missed being crushed between the woodwork and flying timbers. Not a silver was left standing of the passenger car, and practically all the passengers were killed or injured, some who escaped death in the first crash were undoubtedly killed when the massive timbers fell on them at the edge of the track.

## HUDSON BAY RAILWAY

Engineer Presents an Interesting Report—Nelson Harbor Open for Seven Months.

Ottawa, Nov. 10.—The most interesting feature of the annual report of the minister of railways issued today for the people of Canada west, is the remarks made by M. J. Butler, deputy minister of the Hudson's Bay railway surveys. After referring to a general survey of the work done by the surveying parties in 1908, under Mr. John Armstrong, the deputy minister makes the following reference to Mr. Armstrong's reports.

It appears that two routes have been found, one to Fort Churchill, and the other having its terminal on the Bay at Port Nelson, on the river Nelson. He sets down the length of the Churchill route from the Pas at 465 miles, of which about 320 miles have been surveyed, the cost at \$11,000,585. The length of the Port Nelson route is 397 miles, and the estimated cost, \$8,876,350, to which, in both cases the cost of terminals have to be added.

He considers that the probable cost of either road would be seven or eight million dollars. This estimate, however, as he explains, is based upon incomplete surveys, and exploratory reports. The unit prices used in Mr. Armstrong's report are considered too low. He (Armstrong) observes that while the Churchill harbor seems to be the best natural harbor on the west coast of the bay, much excavation, probably in rock work, would be required to obtain the necessary depth for a commercial port.

As for the river Churchill itself, he states that it is full of rapids and falls, and not of much use as a transport route, though offering great facilities for the development of power for the electrification of a railway if desired.

Port Nelson harbor is described as requiring improvements by dredging a channel for a distance of about ten miles; but this would probably be easy. Comparing the two harbors by the light of the information obtained by the records of the Hudson's Bay kept between the year 1824 and 1894, in respect to Fort Churchill, which was completed and published by the Geographical Department in 1897, and information in respect to the records of York Factory (about twenty miles from Port Nelson) kept between 1828 and 1879, published by that department in 1879-80 it appears that the average length of the open season at York Factory, six months, and at Port Churchill is five months; at Port Nelson seven months.

The harbor at Port Nelson is said never to freeze over, though ice drifts up and down it with the tides. Further surveys, however, are necessary to determine the relative value of the two harbors as terminals for a railway.

Mr. Armstrong has directed attention to the possibility of construction at some future time of a canal between the Bay, up Nelson river to Lake Winnipeg, and in this connection furnishes some interesting information. The Nelson river is described as about 400 miles in length, extending from Lake Winnipeg. It discharges an immense volume of water, deriving the same from the summit of the Rocky Mountains, through the north and south Saskatchewan rivers and draining all the waters of the province of Manitoba, and an immense area of North Dakota, Minnesota and western Ontario.

From Lake Winnipeg where these waters are gathered to the Hudson's Bay the fall is set down at 716 feet. Though not likely to come within the scope of practical consideration for many years, the possibility of the building of such a canal at some future time exists, and it is undoubtedly wise to hold it in view of the selection of a terminal for any Hudson's Bay railway.

The possibility of ships utilizing this grand waterway for the transport of goods from the head of Manitoba Lake to the great sea at the north, and so on to the ocean, is an alluring one, and with other developments of the western river waters centering in Lake Winnipeg, may some day form one of the engineering features of the progress of Canada's inland provinces.

**Grain Corners.**  
Chicago, Nov. 11.—Corners in grain and food stuffs on the board of trade of Chicago will soon be a thing of the past. The board of directors of the board of trade has officially declared against future corners in the wheat pit, the oats pit and the corn pit. It has gone on record against corners in grain, and who, with everything in their own hands, run the prices up to the highest notch with great profit to themselves, and very often with ruin for the other party to the trade.

a new era in the biggest and greatest grain market in the world. The change in the rules which the board of directors has suggested, and which is now up to the members to approve or disapprove, in effect is this: "If a corner is run, and there is a defaulted contract, the president of the board of trade is to appoint a committee of three members of the board this committee to be approved by the board of directors, and that this committee shall say what the true commercial value of the commodity in question is on the day of maturity of the contract. The price established by this committee are the one on which settlements are to be made."

Another proposed change in the rules provides for the expulsion of members found guilty of manipulating the markets. It is an easy matter to see how this rule will work. If the Armour interests, for instance, have a corner in wheat, and on the day that the deal must be closed out there is a frantic rush of shorts to cover the prices go sky high, the shorts are pinched, and the runner of the corner takes down his huge profits. Under the new rule there will be no defaults. The committee will step in and say "The price is fictitious; it is a manipulated price. Here is what it should be."

The corner would be broken then and there. In fact there would be no incentive for running corners of any kind.

The residence of Samuel Shannon on Angus street, was burned on Tuesday morning. The family had a very narrow escape, Mr. Shannon being slightly burned while rescuing them.

Patrick Grady, who suffered injuries by a fall from a scaffold on Angus street last Monday, died in the Victoria hospital on Friday. The funeral was held on Saturday from St. Mary's church.

Empress Lodge of the Sons of England in this city is the largest in the west. It is proposed to establish another lodge which would result in the western headquarters of the grand lodge being centered here.

The marriage of Miss Mary McKinnon, of Avonmore, Ont., and Thome Morgan Eddy, of Bethune, Sask., was quietly solemnized in St. Stephen's church, Winnipeg, on Tuesday evening at seven o'clock, the Rev. C. W. Gordon officiating.

The home of E. Corless, eastern annex, was destroyed by fire on Monday. Almost all the furniture was lost. As the fire was without the city limits and too distant from watermain the fire brigade were unable to do anything.

Residents of Ward 1 are making preparation for a big meeting on tomorrow evening, in the Andrew Kross block, 10th avenue. The meeting will be addressed by Ald. Kramer, Mr. Schmidt, C. Weber and others, on the question of the abolition of the ward system in the city, and other live municipal issues.

For the purpose of assisting immigration to the west, especially domestic help, Thos. R. Tudge, of the Salvation Army Immigration department, Winnipeg, has announced that new settlers having female friends in the British Isles willing to come to Canada as domestics, and desiring assisted passage, can secure all information from him at the Salvation Army Citadel, Winnipeg.

One of the black horses used by Speers & Key in their undertaking business, was shot Friday evening, owing to the animal falling and breaking its left hind leg. Mr. Speers had been out driving and while putting the animal in the stable it slipped on the frozen ground and received the injury mentioned. The horse was valued at \$250 and had been in Mr. Speers' possession some two or three years.

P. M. Bredt & Sons, of the Golden West farm, Edenwald, have just shipped to the United States their old stock bull Admiral Chesterfield, at a very good figure. It will be remembered that Messrs. Bredt & Sons got last winter in the east at a long price, Imp, Prime Favorite, grand champion at the Toronto Exhibition, to head their famous herd of short-horns, this Admiral Chesterfield be comes available for export.

A tri-weekly service is now in operation on the C.N.R. line east of Regina. A baggage car that will carry mail has been put on the line, and mail will leave on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, returning the next day. The mail is made up in Regina office for outgoing trains and dropped off in the following towns: Davin, Vibank, Magna, Montmartre, Candiac, Glenavon and Kipling. On the first of the month a seven day mail service will be put in operation on the Prince Albert line.

A meeting of the literary of the Normal School was held on Friday Nov. 12. The president occupied the chair. After reading and adopting the minutes of last meeting the business was transacted. This was followed by the program: Selection, "Our Fair Dominion," Glee Club, paper on Hudson's Bay Co., Miss Ford, speech on the ideals of teachers, Mr. Greer, reading of educational review by Miss Watson. Critic's report by Mr. McMurchy. The meeting was brought to a close by the singing of the National Anthem.

A very quiet wedding was solemnized on Wednesday afternoon between Miss Irene A. Shaw and Mr. William A. Simister, of Winnipeg, at the home of the bride, 2224 Fifteenth avenue. The ceremony was conducted by Rev. J. A. Dowell, assisted by Rev. J. H. Oliver. The presents received were many and varied including a beautiful tea service from the members of the department of agriculture where Miss Shaw was formerly employed. Miss Shaw is a daughter of Dr. J. M. Shaw of this city and Mr. Simister is the representative of the Sun Life Co. in Winnipeg.

Mrs. Annie Seeley had John W. Eastwood, a city millman, charged with assault in the police court on Monday. The case was simply the outcome of a previous one, where the ruling was given in favor of the defendant in the case. On the former occasion the plaintiff threatened to get even, and this threat was used against the plaintiff in yesterday's hearing. Mrs. Seeley claimed that Eastwood hit her several times with a bottle, and called as witness a Mr. McKay. Mr. McKay gave evidence against the woman by stating that she started the fight by hitting Eastwood in the face. Two witnesses were called in support of Eastwood, and stated practically the same thing, and that Eastwood did not hit the woman at all, but rather she did all the fighting. Eastwood ran into the stable and locked the door. The magistrate said Mrs. Seeley brought the assault on herself, as could be plainly seen, and he would dismiss the case with costs against her, amounting to \$4.50.

Bedford Insane.

London, Nov. 9.—Edward William Bedford, the Canadian who was arrested here last month charged on his own confession with the murder of Ethel Kinrade at Hamilton has now admitted that there was no truth in his former statement. This was the opinion of the police, the detectives on the case having informed the magistrate that it was known the prisoner had given a wrong name and that his statement, other wise was incorrect. On being brought up in the Bow street police court today, however, he was again remanded in order to allow the police to make more complete investigation.

Toronto, Nov. 10.—The provincial police have completed their investigation into the career of William Bedford, the man who confessed in London, Eng., to the murder of Ethel Kinrade, and a report has been sent to the Dominion government authorities for transmission to the British home office. Bedford's real name is John W. Corry, a reporter inspector of the Bow street police, and on the day of the Hamilton murder he was employed in a large retail establishment in Toronto from eight in the morning until 5.30 in the evening. He continued in the employ of this establishment until March 28 when he was discharged. Subsequently he went to Muskoka for some weeks and on returning engaged as cook for a number of members of the Baptist church on Toronto Island.

Inspector Greer's investigation confirms the theory that the man is mentally unbalanced. On two occasions while in Toronto he wandered aimlessly away and at one time was found on Yonge street wailing in a half-starved condition and removed to St. Michael's hospital. Corry, it is learned, took much interest in following the newspaper reports of the Kinrade inquest.

A Valuable Asset.

Vancouver, Nov. 16.—Selling for thousands of dollars per acre, where five years ago figures were in the hundreds, three quarters of a million dollars worth of property was disposed of today at the government auction of Point Grey lands, adjoining the western limits of the city. Another million dollars worth is expected to go tomorrow, and another half million the day following, according to an estimate tonight by Trives and Leslie, the vendors for the government. A great portion of the government lands today went to Winnipeg people, and residents of Saskatchewan and Alberta, who made their purchases through brokers. Five years ago prices ranging from two to five hundred dollars per acre were paid. Today a single acre sold as high as \$5,250. The government has still 1300 acres in the district, which is estimated to be worth more than enough to pay off the total bonded indebtedness of the province of British Columbia.
