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Madame Scotney.

Mme. Evelyn Scotney, the wonderful coloratura soprano of the Boston Opera Company, was recently interviewed by one of the musical editors of the New York Herald.

Part of this article will doubtless be interesting to those who intend to hear her at the Wolfville Opera House on Wednesday evening, May 13, where she will give a festival concert, assisted by other distinguished artists of the Boston Opera Company.

Mme. Cara Sapin, prima donna contralto, M. Alfredo Kamella, leading tenor, and M. Howard White, primo basso, are the artists selected by Edwin Bower Hesser, the tour director, to assist her throughout the Maritime Provinces.

The Herald article said: 'Madame Scotney is a young woman of many decided views which are radically different from those held by most prima donnas, who as a rule make a practice of discouraging young singers. I am always glad, said Mme. Scotney, to give advice to a young singer. Many is the time when I have been worn out by travel that I have taken the time to advise some young girl about her voice, but I think it is more than my duty to do so. Most girls, no matter what their vocal qualities, find difficulties in having a chance to develop them. If a girl has no chance of making a success, in my opinion, I tell her so. But if I hear a good voice, I always try to help along its development. There are three girls now studying in Boston, through my influence, and one that I discovered in a little New Hampshire mountain town, where I was resting, has been admitted to the Boston Opera Company membership—of course in a very minor capacity, but she will doubtless progress if it were not for the help given me by Mme. Holle Melba, I would not be where I am today. She heard me in Melbourne, Australia, nearly five years ago, and look me up with her, putting me under her own teacher, Miss Matchless, and later under Testi, the famous composer. And it was through their influence that I first received my Boston Opera Company engagement, three seasons ago. I am certainly willing to meet any youthful aspirants to operatic honors, and will help any that I can.'

Mme. Scotney is a swimmer, continues the Herald story. 'She can hold her own in almost any athletic pursuit, and to her physical strength she attributes much of her vocal power, and the ease with which she accomplishes difficult passages in coloratura.' Mme. Scotney is certainly the most wonderful of the younger sopranos, and if she develops for three or four years more at the same rate that she has since reaching Boston, she will be the long sought successor to Adelina Patti.'

It has been arranged that in Wolfville Mme. Scotney will be assisted in singing the complete second act from 'Matilda,' with costumes and scenery, and also part of the third act, and bring in Mr. Kamella's aria, 'Oh So Pure,' for which he is noted. The cast for 'Matilda' will be:—

Lady Harriet—Mme. Scotney. Nancy—Mme. Sapin. Lionel—Al. Kamella. Plunkett—M. White.

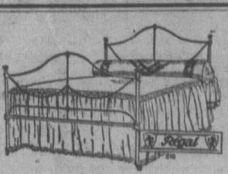
