Kaiser Threatened.

Special to Evening Telegram.
BRUSSELS, Oct. 28.
Extraordinary precautions were taken last night to protect Emperor William when he left this city for Berlin. The reason was explained today when the police announced that a letter, threatening His Majesty, had been received at the Royal Palace. The communication was signed by a Berlin anarchist and read: "Since no one has had the courage to blow up the German autocrat, I have decided to throw a bomb." Efforts of the authorities to arrest the writer were fruitless, and accordingly unusual steps were taken to guard against any untoward incident. All the windows of the houses overlooking the streets through which the Royal party passed from the Palace to the railway station were ordered closed temporarily and the station itself was surrounded with troops. The railway line for a considerable distance out of the city was guarded.

Trouble in Cuba.

Special to the Evening Telegram.
HAVANA, Oct. 28.
Rumors of intended uprisings in Pinar del Rio and Guantanamo are current. Troops are being hurried to both points. Additional reinforcements are going forward today. The Government officially denies the presence of trouble and explains that the troops are being distributed at Guantanamo and Pinar del Rio in order that the money spent by them at those places may assist in an alleviation of the distress of the storm victims. The suspicion is very general, however, that the Government purposes to remove their troops under the immediate command of Major General Pino Guerra, as no reports of distress at Guantanamo have hitherto arrived, Guantanamo having been outside the zone of the storm.

Black Hand Outrage.

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.
A Black Hand bomb exploded early this morning on the ground floor of a tenement house on Washington Street. It smashed nearly every window, tore off the plaster, and threw sixty occupants from their beds. A panic followed. All rushed to the streets, but the police quickly restored order. John Romano, the owner of the house, told the police that he had never received a threatening letter. He said, however, that he believed the bomb to be a warning and expected that he would get a letter in a few days, demanding the payment of money.

Duma Opened.

ST. PETERSBURG, Oct. 28.
The Duma has opened, and as had been anticipated, there was trouble over a proposal to honour the memory of Professor Bouxom Toeff, who died recently. The Vice-President declined to put a motion that membership as a mark of respect to the former President of the Lower House immediately the constitutional Democrats and Radicals withdrew.

Daughters of Empire

Yesterday afternoon a meeting of the Daughters of the Empire took place in the British Hall, when quite a number of new members were added to the roll and several councillors were put in nomination. Several ideas were outlined for the activities of the Association, such as the erection of a children's hospital, a children's playground, civic reform, district nurses, work amongst the young and anti-consumption campaign, etc. The meeting adjourned until Saturday, November 5th to complete, in the interim, arrangements for the organization of the local chapter and preparations for the work.

Building up a Cheek.

Success of a Novel Surgical Experiment.
The final stage in the operation of making a new cheek for a patient at Guy's Hospital from the skin of his arm was completed yesterday.
The patient as was described in these columns last week had a large part of his right cheek and upper jaw cut away in the removal of a growth six years ago. On September 24 a flap of skin was partly detached from over the biceps of the right arm, and made to cover the sunken part of the cheek by stitching it to the side of the nose and mouth. To keep the skin flap, which drew its blood supply from its remaining attachment to the arm, in place, the arm had to be bent over the head and fixed in a plaster cast in that position.
NEW BLOOD-VESSELS.
In the eighteen days since the skin flap was sewn to the side of the face, enough new blood-vessels have sprung up between it and the underlying tissues to render the blood supply from the arm vessels no longer necessary. Yesterday's operation, therefore, consisted of removing the plaster cast, cutting the flap away from its remaining attachment to the arm, and fitting it into position over the rest of the denuded area on the face.
No stitches were needed, the anti-septic dressings applied and the new firm attachments to the nose holding the flap in position. The arm wound was also treated antiseptically, the arm somewhat stiff, but apparently none the worse for being fixed so long in such a cramped position, being laid comfortably at the patient's side.
In another eight days it is expected that the flap will have taken firm root, new cells springing up from the two opposed raw surfaces and knitting them into one. Little scar will be left to show that practically the whole of the right cheek is composed of skin tissues removed bodily from the right arm.—Daily Mail, Oct. 12.

Bishop of Guildford Was Fined.

Policeman Behind Hedges Catches Him Speeding Auto.
LONDON, Oct. 22. — Dr. Andolph, Bishop of Guildford to-day was fined for driving a motor car at excessive speed. He told the Court that he was travelling over an exceedingly open road, where the least possible inconvenience could not have been caused by his fast driving.
"I have driven some 12,000 miles every year over different country," he said, "and submit for the consideration of the Bench that with the best intentions in the world it is exceedingly difficult not to relax one's moment from one's diligence." The Bishop added that he had forgotten to take out license this year.
He caused amusement later at a meeting this afternoon at which he arrived late. He explained his delay by saying, "I was obliged to attend a Court to answer to my delinquencies. I don't want you to think me too disreputable a person. It was a very lonely part of the country and I didn't know that a policeman was behind a hedge."

Navy Men Victorious.

The return Field Hockey Match, Navy vs. City, was held on St. George's Field yesterday afternoon, when an interesting and closely contested struggle resulted. This was the third game for the season, and the naval boys bested the "bush horns" by 5 goals to 1. The naval men beat the city twice in these three matches, but another game may give our boys their revenge if it will be held.

Anderson, arrived here last night at 9 o'clock to place in the Hospital for treatment Engineer John Rose, who was terribly burned by the explosion of a lamp on board last Saturday night. Dr. Anderson and Dr. Macpherson visited him at the request of Capt. Anderson, and they agreed that the best course was to send him to the Hospital. The engineer was taken on the pilot's steam tug and on being brought ashore was taken to the Hospital in the ambulance. He has a good chance of recovery. The Venango is one of the Furness Line and in 12 days out with China clay from Fowey to New York.
