1,500 soldiers have been discharged, 280 of them having suffered disabilistill on active service, asking their future intentions, and 600 replies had been received. Of those, 461 were able to return to their jobs if open, and the others were unable to work owing to disabilities. So far the employers of labor had been doing well in placing returned men. There are 102 men taking training, from the university to the factory. Some 60 applicants, whose cases were not considered urgent, had been refused. The great trouble is not to overcrowd the professions. There is a great desire to engage in telegraphy, but the desire of the committee is to place men at profitable employment without unduly interfering with any branch. Great encouragement is given those who want to study navigation, motor engineering and the like. A school has been opened in the former Spencer College, in which several teachers or repute are engaged, and opportunity is here offered the men to study and prepare themselves for the different occupations they select. This etducation is only preliminary, not technical. Another problem of the Committee is to save the men from unwise decisions as to vocations. The pay to the man under training is, unmarried: \$50 a month; married: \$70 married, with one child, \$76, and \$6 for each additional child. In connection with the school, other teachers are needed, and also an increase in

the general staff. The committee so far has held 3 meetings, and the outlay at present is about \$30,000.

The Governor proposed a vote of thanks to Dr. Blackall, the Premier seconding and Sir P. T. McGrath supporting. Mr. Justice Kent put the motion, which was carried by aclamation, and the meeting closed with the Ships' Bells in singing of the National Anthem.

"One remedy that suggests itself at once is a greatly increasd care of the children of our soldiers and sailors. These do, in fact, represent the hope of the nation. They, and they alone,

inherit the traditions of our race which have made our race glorious. Their value is above all computation at this time. Again every asistance should be gvien those of our soldiers and sailors who are left to us to marry at once. Economic barriers should be removed; inducement should be held out. The old economic prejudice against married men with families is fatal.

DIES IN SEATTLE, WASHINGTON.




