





Changing Their Names.

NEW FAD HAS DEVELOPED IN ENG-

A name to Englishmen had so little in it that until the outbreak of the war a man could call himself anything he liked without consulting the law. A privilege which enabled him to indulge his fancy for a resounding name or to get rid of an ugly patronymic like Bugg, which it is recorded was exchanged by a saloonkeeper for a combination of the old English names Norfolk-Howard.

During the last four years alone the following names have been abandoned: Baggs, Buggy, Gotobed, Onions, Outlaw, Pickles, Scragg and

When the war broke out there was a rush among people who bore German names to change them, but in 1914 the Defence of the Realm Act stopped enemy aliens from doing so, but British subjects were still permitted to make a change, and they have done so ever since, and continue to do so. Up to date over 2,000 changes of enemy surnames have taken place since the war broke out.

The first foreign surname changed after the, war broke out was that of a Liverpool man, who changed his Rosenheim to Rose on August 11, 1914, and by the end of the month 64 similar names were changed. The sinking of the Lusitania was followed by an increase in changes to 116 and 132 in May and June, 1915. After this the figures dropped until January, 1919, when the number rose to 80, which has been the average figure for this year.

A list issued by the British Empire Union gives a number of the changes. and it is not difficult to trace the difterent principles on which the changes have been effected. In many cases there have been direct translations, such as Konig into King, Muller into Miller, Schloss into Castle and Schneidner into Taylor. Some times the translation has been in direct, such as Steinthal into Petrie, through "petros," the Greek word

The Harp That Once.

What is said to be the oldest harp in the world is preserved at the Louvre Museum in Paris.

It was found in an Egyptian tomb and is nearly 4,000 years old. Others dating back 3,000 years have been discovered, while the instrument was held in such high regard by the ancient Celtic races that harpers were treated with veneration and distinction, their lands being free and their persons sacred.

In his interesting booklet on the barp, Sir Robert Hadfield, the steel magnate, who has made a study of the history of the instrument, mentions that Ireland's most famous harp is now in Trinity College, Dublin. This belonged to the Irish monarch, Brian Borumba, who came to the

throne in 1005 A.D.

An extraordinary incident in the history of the instrument concerns its presentation by King Brian's son, Donagh, to the Pope of that time, John XVIII, in order to obtain absolution for the murder of his brother Teig. For a while the harp was deited in the Vatican, being ultimately sent by Pope Leo X, to King Henry VIII. with the title "Defen der of the Faith" written under the crown, which was of massive gold. By Henry VIII.'s orders the harp was adopted in the national arms of Ire-land and represented on the Irish


