

PRACTICAL ADVICE BY A FAMOUS PLAYER. The beginner at tennis will discover

The principal stroke in tennis is

> questionably the most difficult task in the game. Keep Your Opponent Guessing. If you have returned the hall well towards the base-line and given it speed, instead of being content merely to get it over the net, you have added greatly to your chances of gaining

> the point. Another important stroke is the service. Here, again, speed on the ball means much. This stroke, moreover, will test your placing ability. An opponent must be kept guessing as to where your service will dropwhether to his right or left, and whether short or deep.

As in the forearm drive, placing wide to the left of an adversary improves your chances, while a hall dropped short over the net, and obliquely to it, flies over the side-lines without giving the other fellow an opportunity to return. This is a dif-Scult shot, but well worth cultivating. Vary both pace and direction, and renember that the ease or difficulty of the service rests with you alone. For instance, there are in our blood many millions of tiny floating discs, which are called the blood platelets. These are quite different from the well-known red and white blood corbuscles. They are much smaller, and physiological laboratories. It has been discovered quite recently, however, that if the number of these blood platelets becomes diminished, all kinds of ailments soon develop. The skin beomes blotchy, all kinds of inflammations appear, and illness gradually
