THE SESSION SO FAR.

It is now within a day or two of a month since Parliament met, and as yet we have had no legislation worthy the name. It is expected Parliament will adjourn about the 14th or 15th of this month. A round robin has been in sirculation amongst members for some days, asking the Government to reconsider the indemnity question so that members may obtain \$600 for this as well as the second part of the session. About fifty signatures were obtained to this document on Saturday, those who signed it being chiefly from Quebec, with some from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. The Ontario members refused to sign it, and the scheme will probably fall through.

OTTAWA, Dec. 8.

Sir John A. Macdonald presented a Report from the Committee on Privivinges and Elections The Committee stated that they had considered the reference from the House to enquire as to the right of the Hon. J. S. Macdonald, Attorney-General of the Province of Ontario, and the Hon. Christopher Dunkin, Treasure of the Province of Quebec, to hold seats in the House of Commons, and they begged to report that, in their opinion, these gentlemen had a right to sit and vote in this House.
