Sir John A.'s Speech on the Treaty.

We are unable to give at length the speech which Sir John A. Macdonald made, in introducing the bill in the House on Friday, to ratify the Washington Treaty, as it fills twelve columns of close type. But as the question is the most important for Canada which has ever come under the notice of Parliament, we propose to give a synopsis of his speech, and indicate the chief points in his arguments in favor of ratifying the Treaty.

After some introductory remarks he said the policy of the Government was to carry out, or try to carry out the Treaty, which was one of the Commissioners, he signed at Washington. At the same time there was a reservation in it which gave Parliament full power to accept the fisheries articles or reject them. In attaching his signature to the Treaty he felt he was performing a grave and serious duty—but still a duty. Having thus stated his position, he reviewed at length the working and results of the Reciprocity Treaty, and the attitude assumed by the Government of Canada in regard to the fisheries at the expiration of that Treaty. A system of licenses was introduced by which American fishermen, on payment of the fees, were allowed the privilege of fishing in Canadian waters and within the three mile limit. These licenses, however, did not answer the purpose. They were withdrawn, and the Government, aided by the fleet granted by the Imperial Government, established a marine police, asserted and maintained the right of Canada to the inshore fisheries, though this was done cautiously and with a view not to exasperate the American fishermen. Still these fisheries were a continual source of irritation, and it was desirable that the question should be settled, and for ever. The present Postmaster-General went to England and laid the matter before the Imperial Government, and that Government agreed to bring the matter before the Government of the United States, to press for a settlement of it, and also for reparation for the wrong done to Canada by the Fenian raids. Out of the negotiations on these matters came the proposal for a conference between the two powers, not only for the settlement of these questions, but also of the Alabama claims. When the Joint High Commission was agreed on the Governor-General asked Sir John privately whether he would act as a member of it. After consulting with his colleagues he consented. When the proposition was first made to him he said he felt reluctant to accept it. Still, it was felt that if Canada was not represented, her interests might go by default.

Sir John then goes on to describe the difficulties which met the Commissioners when they went to work, and also speaks of the assurance he had from the Home Government, before the Commission met, that it had no intention of advising the Commissioners to part with the fisheries without the consent of Canada. At the same time it was thought advisable that the fishery question should remain in abeyance until the Alabama question was settled; this was after the proposal was made to open the fisheries to the Americans on condition of a renewal of the Reciprocity Treaty. The Americans offered to admit our coal, salt, fish, and after 1874 our lumber, but this was not at first considered a fair equivalent—still it was accepted. In the meantime our Parliament took the duty of ratifying the Treaty, and other articles mentioned, and the American Commissioners then withdrew their offer, and in place of it offered that Canadians should fish in American waters, and that fish and fish oil should be reciprocally free. This, Sir John says, were the best terms that could be made.

He says that the Treaty does not include any articles which are to be reciprocally free, but contains that in neither of the governments Canada is to have a right of fishing her rights that she was in 1854. The first Reciprocity Treaty was made. He contends that the American fisheries are of some value, but that it is a most important matter to have the privilege of producing fish in our waters, which can only be done in American waters—and that it is of great value to Canada to be allowed to sell our fish in American markets. The Treaty does not allow the Americans to have access to our coast fisheries to the north of the Bay of Fundy, or to our Northern Lake fisheries. He says at great length justified the claims in the Treaty which the Americans free access to the navigation of the St. Lawrence river which are allowed to navigate Lake Michigan and the River St. Clair. He also dwelt upon the advantage to Canada of having for 12 years, by the Treaty, to continue our holding system over all the revenues of the Treaty. He also referred to the settlement of the Fenian question as one of the good results of the Treaty. He also spoke of the omission of the settlement of the Fenian claims. What Canada pressed for was that the principle should be established, that the demand should be made by England upon the United States, that the demand should be acquiesced in, that the question of damages should be referred to a tribunal like that now sitting at Washington for the investigation of claims connected with the civil war in the South, that time should be given within which the Canadian Government, and every individual Canadian who suffered by those outrages, should have an opportunity of filing their claims, putting in an account, and of offering proof to establish their right to indemnity. But when the question came up the American Commissioners objected, maintaining that it was not included in the correspondence in which the subjects were stated. He blamed the

British Commissioners for not demanding in clear language that the investigation of these claims should be dealt with by the Commission, and said Britain was responsible for the error. He then argued strongly that it was no humiliation on the part of Canada to accept the guarantee from Britain for the two and a half million pounds loan as a set off to our claims. He concluded by asserting that in accepting the Treaty Canada would help greatly to insure peace between the two countries, and in this light—if in no other—he contended that in signing it, and now recommending its ratification, he was doing his best for the interests of Canada.

EDITORIAL NEWS.

The Province of Manitoba covers an area of 13,008 miles, or nearly nine millions of acres. The whole extent of the crown lands of the Dominion amounts to about one and one-half billions of acres.

We are told that Mr. Greeley received the first intimation of his nomination for President from a private dispatch which had been bulletined a few doors from the Tribune. As soon as the by-standers read the bulletin, they ran to the Tribune office and shouted "Greeley, Greeley." He appeared in the counting-room, and the office rang with cheers. Uncovering himself, he bowed to the crowd, in the meantime blushing to the roots of his hair at the cries of "Speech." He would not respond to it but passed into the private room and locked himself up. An army of reporters made determined assaults on the door with their knuckles, but Greeley refused to open the door and be interviewed.

A reliable correspondent, writing from Ottawa to the Hamilton Spectator says that the committee on manufactures will report in favor of a return to the general 20 per cent tariff of 1855, instead of the present 15 per cent, and will recommend some highly important, though not at all sweeping alterations, which will have the effect of promoting the making of iron as well as the use of it in Canada. Mr. Workman, of Montreal, says the demand for a return to 20 per cent, is fair and moderate, and meets with his approval. He is willing, also, to go the length of a five per cent. duty on pig iron, with the view of starting furnaces in Canada, and making iron more plentiful and cheaper. It is not expected that the Committee will bring about any change of policy this session.

A TALE OF THE CLYDE. CHAPTER XXIX. JOINING THE ARMY.

On coming to the foot of the hill which ran parallel with the river, and finding that the road along which the wagons were to travel made a detour, to avoid the declivity, Edwin resolved to take the shorter route over the heights and either rejoin the military train on the other side, or if the camp was at no great distance, proceed thither by the most direct road that could be found.

In the pursuance of this resolution, he and Ritchie had left the wagons and the soldiers, in whose company they had come to the frontier, and struck into the narrow and broken path which wound its way up among the vineyards, and led by many a devious turning to the western slopes.

The path by which they had gone was beautiful in the extreme, leading as it did among the shady vineyards, where the cool green foliage subdued for them the sun's heat, and where from picturesque cottages latticed the pretty dark-green sides of the south gazed on them as they went by, or the embowered and swartly countenances of the vine-keepers stared at them in surprise, but never in anger or with the appearance of evil intention. Once even, at one of the prettiest cottages they passed, where an old woman sat in the porch, and a laughing-faced girl of twelve or fourteen stood at her back, they sought for and obtained with cheerful alacrity a draught of sweet milk, which sent them on refreshed as much by the bright and kindly smile of its giver as by the milk itself. They could not exchange one word with her, but the language of the face is common over the world, and that of the innocent peasant girl spoke eloquently of kindness and goodwill, which they tried to answer in kind, and succeeded, if they might judge by the sparkling glances of her clear shining eyes and the deepening blush of pleasure on her peach-like cheeks.

It was shortly after this pleasant little episode of the journey that someone upon them treading the mazes of the path, and eagerly looking forth at every opening for the expected prospect of the plain below.

Just then they came to an open space, clear of vines, at the top of a very steep grassy declivity, and all at once there burst on their sight the view they had been looking for, but with such a brilliance of extent and beauty as to bring them both to a stand-still, and cause admiring exclamations to come from their lips.

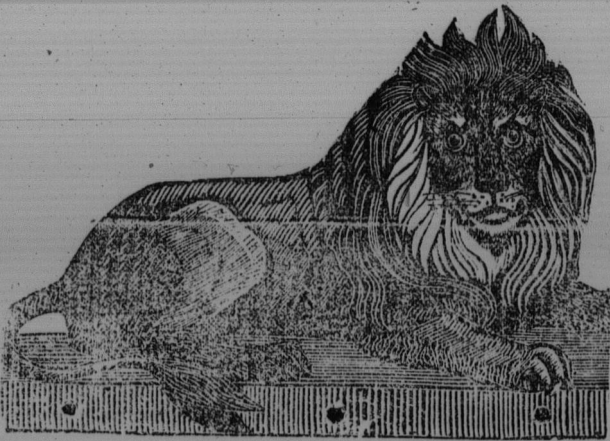

It was stated at a Cabinet meeting yesterday that the reply from England to your note relative to the negotiative principle of international law, was received. 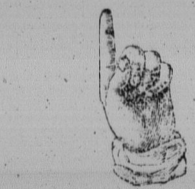

Arrival of Livingstone at Zanzibar.

The great African Explorer, David Livingstone, has, according to the New York Herald, arrived in Zanzibar in charge of Mr. Stanley, commander of the Herald expedition. Yesterday's Herald has the following notice of the success of the expedition: "Early in 1871 the Herald expedition started from Zanzibar, and in April of that year left Bagamoyo. After reaching the basin of Tiana its commander communicated with the Herald from Kivuhya. From this point he gave us the gladdening information that the "old man with the long beard almost white" was still living. The danger to the Herald explorer may be gleaned from the fact that four of his men had been killed by the natives, and he himself prostrated with fever. Yet with these dangers and difficulties, sufficient to break the courage of a less determined man, we learn that the search was prosecuted to a success, and the Herald rewarded in the fact that it had rescued a noble soul from a silence which would be worse than death. From us we can do no more than announce the safety of the two explorers. Doubtless the world, enriched by the wonderful adventures which have befallen Livingstone in the past seven years, and benefited by his acquired knowledge of the geography, peoples and climate of the mysterious continent, will sufficiently thank the Herald for its enterprise, but we take our own satisfaction in the great good achieved. The work of Bruce, Burton, Grant, Speke and Baker will now be supplemented by a more perfect knowledge of the heart of Africa. The story of the great inland lakes will be told, and the old secret of the Nile robbed of its last swathing of fable and romance. These are great things for a newspaper to point to; but while there is work for humanity for this or bolder nature to be done, the Herald will ever be found ready to undertake it, and we can assert confidently, find men of brain, nerve and courage to accomplish it.

Death has been very busy lately among those who are best known in London society: The Marquis of Graham, the eldest son of the Duke of Montrose, succumbed, after a few days' illness, to typhoid fever, although it is whispered that Sir William Gull erroneously treated him for Roman fever. Sir Frederick de Vaux has been a victim to the same disease; Sir Alberton Peyton, the master of the Bicester house, a man of about five-and-thirty, died suddenly of apoplexy; and two others, both well known, and both considerably under thirty, have been taken from us, one by epilepsy, the other by the same affection which has been fatal to so many—which was so nearly fatal to the Prince of Wales—typhoid fever. And all this, and several more almost as well known, have gone in the course of the last very few weeks.
