TAWA, May 15.-The great parliamentary struggle over the naval bill reached a finality shortly before midnight when the third reading of the measure was adopted after a comparatively quiet division on a vote of 101 to 68, a govority of 33. MANY COMPLAINTS AGAINST CITY FOREMEN

"I heard that this sort of thing was going on during the election campaign," said Mr. Jones to the mayor, "and many men complained to me that the foremen had threatened to put them out of the city's service if they did not vote Conservative. But I let it go by until after the election, as I did not want to take it up as a political matter.

"However, if these things are true, I think the practice should be discontinued. It must interfere seriously with the service in the public works department and is not a good thing.

"I think I have brought you positive proof of the charges against five or six foremen. These declarations were taken individualle, and the men did not know what any program had de-clared, in any case. The evidence is so uniform the there seems to be no doubt of the facts.

We have proceeded thus far without introducing party politics into municipal affairs very much. It is true that ex-Commissioner Clarke tried to organize a Tammany hall and succeeded fairly well, and this seems to be a sequel to his efforts.

Mayor Sinnott, in private life, is an ardent partisan, but in public life knowns no party. Commissioner Samis in private life is also an ardent politician, though of a different party, and in public life is quite as non-partisan. It is for them to say at this time whether there is to be party politics of the worst kind at the city hall.

Some of the commissioners say they have complaints about a foreman of different politics taking commissioners must act in the most decisive manner if they are to keep partyism out of municipal affairs. Now is the time to act and act decisively. With our numerous public utilities, the introduction of party politics would be disastrous.







In a progressive city in Western Canada, under the building bylaws a building may occupy nine-tenths the lot, or, if the ground floor is use for business purposes, that portion the structure may cover the whole lot. The upper portion of such buildings, consisting of two, three or four storeys, may be partitioned into small rooms to e rented to lodgers. The windows of these rooms open on a court or courts, which extend from the roof of the first floor to the roof of the building, and if the total ground area of the court or courts equals one-tenth of the lot required by law, it fulfils the requirements of the law respecting tenements and lodging houses.

These great "dumb-beil" barracks furnish poor enough housing accommodations when they stand alon, but when two are constructed on adjoining lots, awell is formed by their courts, and all the windows opening on these courts are darkened and shut off from fresh air. If one of the buildings is a warehouse, it may occupy the entire lot, and the width of the well is halved, making the rooms darker still.





## SWAT THE FLY!

D.R. MAHOOD, medical health officer, will take the slogan to the city council at the next meeting, when he will urge the adoption of a bylaw calculated to reduce the fly nuisance to a minimum.

The bylaw which Dr. Mahood has drafted enacts that: WHEREAS it is commonly known that flies are disseminators

WHEREAS it is commonly known that flies are disseminators and carriers of filth, poison, and disease germs, that they are born in filth and are a constant threat against the health, happiness and prosperity of the people.

THEREFORE be it resolved by the mayor and council that it shall be unlawful for any person, firm, or corporation to suffer, permit, or have on their premises, whether owned or leased, any of these unsanitary, fly producing, disease breeding conditions,

(a) Animal manure in any quantity not properly protected from flies.

(b) Privies, vaults, cesspools, pits or like places not thoroughly (c) Garbage not securely covered.
(d) Rubbish, litter or rags in which flies may breed or multiply.

The police and sanitary inspectors are empowered to enforce this bylaw and provision is made for the punishment of any one guilty under these clauses, by a fine of not less than \$5 and not more than \$50 The bylaw will be effective immediately on being ratified by the



### HEAD OF CEMENT COMPAN ARRIVES IN THE HAT

Canada Cement and Hunt En gineering Will Consolidate; Plant Capacity 3000 Barrels

Medicine Hat, May 14 .- A. C. Tagge of Montreal, general superintendent for the Canada Cement Co., arrived in Medicine Hat yesterday and his advent here is fraught with no little importance to the industrial developmen It will be remembered that original

ly, the Canada Cement company's plans provided for the construction here of a mill for the production of 2,000 barrels of cement every 24 hours. The Hunt Engineering Co. also decided to erect a cement mill here which was to have a similar capacity per day. A short time ago an an-nouncement was made that the two concerns had consolidated and that a plant would be constructed with a ca-pacity of 3,000 barrels per day. Mr. Taggs has now come to Medicine Hat Tags has now come to Medicine Hat for the purpose of closing up negotiations and details for the construction of a cement mill which will turn out every 24 hours 4,000 barrels.

This mill will be built by the Hunt Engineering Co., for the Canada Cement Co. All of the preliminaries have been worked out by the two companies and the details are now being

panies and the details are now being decided upon. It is the intention to proceed with the construction, which will be rushed to completion at the earliest possible date. The number of men to be employed in the construction of this giant cement mill will only be limited by the supply of labor to be obtained for that purpose.

To give some idea of what the con-

struction and completion of this cement concern will mean to Medicine Hat, it may be stated that upwards of 700, if they can be obtained, will be employed constantly in the construction work proper and after it is com-pleted somewhere between 300 and 500 men will be employed in the produc-tion of cement.

Four thousand barrels daily means

Four thousand barrels daily means the turning out of 1,400,000 pounds of cement and that there will be at least 27 cars outbound each 24 hours. There will also be at least 25 car loads of inbound traffic daily. In other words, this one industry will require the use of at least one train in and one train out each 24 hours.
