PULLMAN CAR FRAUDS.

MONTREAL, Feb. 3.-The principal witness excompany. He produced an order signed by Mr. Clark, the former superintendent here, cautioning the conductors and other employee against bringing roods in from the States surreptitously on pain of dismissal. This order witness stated had been acted on and men were dismissed for not obeying it. The order was a standing one up to the present. The company assigned twenty-nine cars for use in Canada. All were built here. The contracts between the company and the government were read, which showed that the cars came in under bond and were not required to pay duty. These cars were under control of the government on the Intercolonial road, the o mpany merely getting the fares collected. The commissioners asked the representatives of the company for full returns of the goods and packages brought in without duty, and also a list of cars sent out for refitting and brought back without entry at customs. These returns were promised and enquiry adjonned.

Mrs. Fitzgerakl, a teacher in Dufferin school, was badly injured at Moss Park rink on Thursday night by the culpable recklessness of a skater. She was on the rink in company with her little boy, whom she was teaching to skate, when the individual in question, who was skating backward, ran into her and knocked her down. This might have been a warning to him that fancy skating was not his forte, but it evidently made no impression on him. He apolegized to the lady and assisted her to rise and in a short time was sailing recklessly round the rink backwards. The result was that Mrs. Fitzgerald was again knocked down by the same individual, but this time with more serious consequences. She was seen to be suffering great pain and to be unable to rise, and several other skaters, including the author of the mischief, carried her into the ladies' room! A carriage was procured and she was taken to her home on George street, where it was found that her leg was broken in two places below the knee. She passed a restless hight, but was somewhat better yesterday morning.

Mr. J. C. Bailey, chief engineer of the Toronto and Ottawa railway, has just returned from ah inspection of the part of that road under construction. He stated to a World reporter:—I was not surveying the route, but inspecting the portion which is being built at present, as the final location of the road has been settled on. The section between Madoc and Peterboro is let, the company is working from Madoc to Peterb, and that part between Toronto and Peterboro will be given cut by contract on the 14th of this month. The right of away has been bought as far as Perth, and Mr. Campbell, who is doing the buying is busily engaged between Ottawa and Perth. The line runs through a very rough count, y, which will occasion some deep cuts ranging from 30 to 40 feet; this is principally between Madoc and Moberly. THE POPULATION OF GERMANY. While Germany's population during the last decade has increased four and a half millions, that of France during the same period (1870,-1880) shows an increase only 612,000 souls. The number of births in France in 1867 was 261 to every 1000 inhabitants, and only 251 in 1878, while the respective figures for Germany were 38 3-5 and 383. The excess of births over deaths in France was 140,600 in 1867, and only 98,175 in 1878. In Germany in 1869 French population, therefore, should not considerably increase by immigration, or that of Germany not largely decrease by France at the end of the century will scarcely have forty millions to Germany's sixty millions of inhabitants. That so rapid decrease in France cannot but be to her disadvantage as compared with Germany, is evident. Germany raises annually four hundred thousand children more than France. If it be supposed that as many as twenty-five per cent. of that number die before they reach the age of 20, and that the maintenance and education of the remaining seventy-five per cent. during found a good cure. a term of twenty years, cost \$800 each, it will be seen that Germany spends annually upward of \$200,000,000 for the rearing of children, which sum France invests in industrial enterprises or at interest. This computation takes no account of the further facts, that in consequence of this progressive increase of population, the emigration from Germany during the last decade reached the figure of rising 600,000, that these emigrants not only reinforce the productive power of her competitors abroad, but finally, that if every emigrant is supposed to take only \$20 with him, the fatherland has been made poorer by \$12,000,000 in addition.

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


