

WAR AGAINST THE QUEEN

WHAT WAS FOUND AT WHITEHEAD'S FACTORY.

Argued at the Defence of the London Dynamite-Explosives of the late Chief Justice.

LONDON, June 13.—In the trial of the dynamite conspirators to-day, detected that after Ansbury was arrested he was asked to give an account of himself, and told that if he refused he would have himself to blame for anything which happened to him. He thereupon said he was from America.

Lord Chief Justice Coleridge expressed the opinion that as the prisoner was not provided with counsel, no statement obtained from him by threat or promise could be received against him.

Inspector Maguire testified that he examined the contents of Whitehead's factory in Leamster, Birmingham, which contained 200 pounds of nitro-glycerine, 600 pounds of sulphur acid, and 700 pounds of sulphuric acid. He also examined a portion of the local government board office wrecked by the explosion and gave it as his opinion that twenty pounds of nitro-glycerine caused the explosion.

The prosecution then closed.

It was proved Mr. Galer introduced Ansbury into the Harting Hotel in order that he might obtain letters and telegrams addressed in that name.

Ansbury, in examining Inspector Maguire, who called the witness to the stand, was asked if he knew Ansbury in the month of January, 1884, when he was arrested, called the witness a liar because he denied he had been at Harting at the time.

The lord chief justice then informed Ansbury that the evidence against him was so strong that he would have to be committed to prison.
