The structure was about 12 feet high, closely boarded in, and the pit underneath the fatal trap door was about 8 feet, about 3 feet of which was formed by an excavation. Radelive brought back a portion of the scaffold to store with his other "curiosities."







Is this productive of a peaceful Sabbath? Is it productive of religion at all? Is it really necessary for military discipline and show? Could not more suitable hours be chosen or even different days—that of say saturday afternoon, or if different hours, could not from 9 to 10 o'clock be chosen, or 5 to 6 p.m.? Then if Mr. Potts is a Sabbatarian of the very strict Methodist Church, how can he reconcile his squaing or countensancing this Sabbath disturbance?




