ALGOMA'S SOLID PROGRESS.

Dawson, Ex-M.P., Speaks Enthusiastically of the Development of Greater Ontario. Constituent of the Ontario Party.

Montreal, Aug. 11.—Mr. S. J. Dawson, ex-M.P. for Algoma, arrived in the city to-day, and being seen by your correspondent talked in quite enthusiastic terms of the progress now being made in the development of Greater Ontario.

There are many promising signs to be noticed, began Mr. Dawson, in the opening up of that great region to agriculture, lumbering and other industries, but the most marked feature at the present time is the wonderful impetus which gold mining has lately received in the Seine River region.

A great deal of the gold which is being mined in this part of the country, Mr. Dawson reports, is of the richest kind, and means will be of a nature to revolutionize that section of the country.

Has the prospecting been only of recent occurrence? No, there have always been a number of people up there who had confidence in the gold-producing qualities of the country, but it is only lately that mining has been carried on in a systematic manner, said Mr. Dawson.

It is getting to be a serious matter, continued the ex-member for Algoma, "that our people are losing faith in the mineral resources of Algoma, and up to the present time the capital investment in the mining industry has been drawn from the American side of the line. However, Ontario is getting to be a serious matter."

How do you reach the mines? "We take the canoe route to the centre of the mining district, and then follow the river for about 150 miles, and if you go round by Port Arthur there is a good road, but the distance is much longer."

"Business in Port Arthur," concluded Mr. Dawson, "is a pretty good one. The splendid climate renders the northern country the paradise of tourists and a great many people are coming to Port Arthur and other cities flock up there to pass the heated term."

In spite of a good deal of talk from the pessimists at the beginning of the season, the outlook is very bright, said Mr. Dawson, and the fact that about a thousand more head of cattle and 1500 sheep have been shipped up to date than in the same time last year.

Is there any money being made this year? "Yes," was the reply, "the shippers have done very well during the last two or three weeks, and I hope it will continue, for I am free to say that the farmers and stockmen are making a good thing out of the situation."

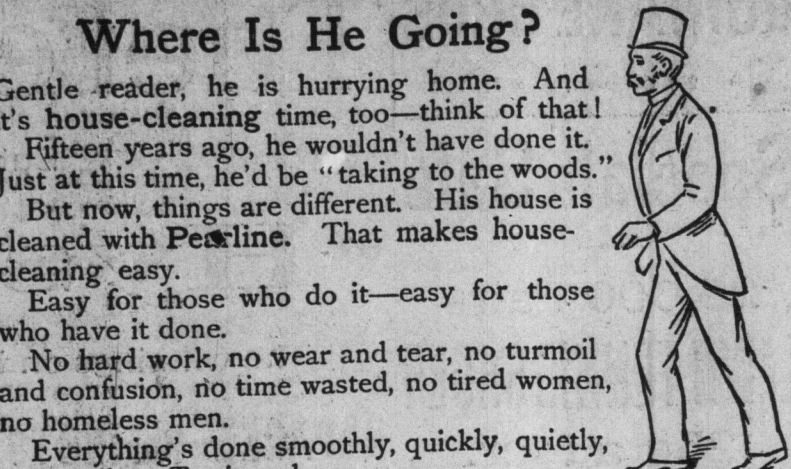
THE TORONTO SUNDAY.
