



From the point on which we now stand, we look down and around what is, par excellence and beyond all other regions, the classic ground of the Maritime Provinces of Canada. All the land and water that we can now gaze upon, were once comprised within a seignory of one Sieur de Pontraincourt. From this Digby height, looking eastward, we may perceive a low, dark streak, near the horizon line. That is the Island of Biencourville, now, for no known reason, miscalled 'Goat Island,' Its n'est name was conferred in honor either of the Sieur de Pontraincourt named above, or of his son and successor, Biencourt being the family name.

Directly opposite Isle Biencourville-to the left, as we now face on the now Granville, mainland shore, Pontraincourt mad his first clearing and exected his first fort and dwelling.
