



Simple Tests for Water.

Now that summer has arrived, when peo ple will be visiting the country, camping out, etc., and when it will be necessary for them to pass upon the potability of new supples of water, a few trustworthy tests for this purpose, culled from the Massachusetts Medical Journal, are timely, especially as they are not based on chemical analysis. First boil and fill a bottle made of colored glass with the water and look through at some dark object. The water should then appear perfectly colorless and free from suspended matter; a muddy or turbid appearance indicates the presence of soluble organi matter or of soluble matter in suspension. If this test is passed successfully empty out some of the water, leaving the bottle about half-full;cork up and let it stand for a few hours in a warm place. Shake up the water, remov the cork and critically smell the air contained in the bottle. If it has any smell, and the water should be rejected for domestic that it sometimes develops an odor that would not otherwise be perceptible. Pure water should be tasteless and re-
