## Parish Notes.

On Thursday afternoon, 4th January, at 2 o'clock, a Mothers' meeting was held under the direction of Mrs. George Hagarty. Fourteen mothers responded to the invitation to be present and since then more have come in. The re-opening of the Mothers' meeting has been welcomed by many in this parish and we are glad to again add it to those parish organizations which are a power for good.

On Friday, January 5th, the annual treat of the infant class was held. A tree provided by Mrs. Cartwright, was covered with presents and afterwards distributed by Sister Meta and the Misses Boulton and Cayley. Tea was also provided for the children, who after a romp, departed well satisfied to their homes.

The festival for the upper school was held on Tuesday evening, January 9th. It consisted as usual of a sit-down tea for each class with its teacher, followed by prize-giving and a magic lantern. The lantern views were chiefly of scenes in South Africa and of famous people connected with the war. Great enthusiasm was displayed by "Young Canada," who all clapped and hissed at the right places, showing thereby that even the children are well up in the details of this, our country's campaign.

Mr. Charles Beam, who has been a member of St. George's choir for several years, has been appointed to the position of agent of the Canada Life Assurance Co. in Guelph, and took his departure from Toronto at the end of last month. Mr. Beam has been such a valuable member of the choir that he will be greatly missed. At the close of the evening service on Sunday, 28th inst., before the choir was dismissed, the Rector addressed Mr. Beam, told him how much they all liked him and valued his membership in the choir, how sorry they were to lose him, how warmly they wished him prosperity and "good luck" in his more important sphere of work, how sure they were that he would soon be a member of St. George's choir, Guelph, and finally in the name of the choir, presented him with a copy of the larger edition of "Hymns and Tunes" that he might be fully equipped.

The Rector begs to acknowledge the following sums received during December, for the Poor Fund; through the offertory, \$8.30; H. S. W., \$25; E. D., \$5; F. C. M., \$5; Miss A., \$1; L. H. P. \$1. Total, \$45.30.

Lately, seven cents in copper, were found in the alms box, which seems to show, first, that the poor help the poor, and secondly that others imagine that the alms box is intended for the use of the poor only; whereas it is intended to be used by anyone who hears the cry of this bitter weather "Consider the poor and needy." Whatever finds its way into the alms box is presently converted into warmth for little children.

The Secretary of "The St. George's Mens' Club," has handed in the following report:—

At a subsequent meeting, Mr. Mann resigned, and Mr. Bilkey was elected in his place. During November and December, the evenings were given up to games, debates, songs, boxing-bouts, etc., but at the suggestion of Mr. Blanchford an improvement was made; it was that each week a "talk" should be given on some subject in which the chosen speaker was particularly interested. This has proved an entertaining and instructive experiment.

WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

Our Branch gave \$35 and St. Agatha's Guild \$5, and the sum was considered satisfactory because, though not large, it represented a very general response from the members. The gifts of several absent members were specially appreciated. The collecting was chiefly done by several of the younger members whose help was cheerfully given and gratefully acknowledged by the officers of the Branch. Three weeks' holiday was taken and the Branch reassembled on January 12th. The attendance has rather fallen off of late from various causes. A most welcome gift of material has been received from a member, and the two Christmas bales were gratefully acknowledged by Mrs. Bourne, Essonville, and Mr. Hazelhurst, Baysville.
