TEN MILLION DOLLARS WILL BE VOTED FOR AGRICULTURE IS BURRELL'S ANNOUNCEMENT

Bill to Be Introduced at Present Session Will Provide Largest Lump Sum Ever Proposed For Aid to Farming in Canada by Instruction in Agriculture, Including Work in Veterinary Colleges.

OTTAWA, Jan. 17 .- (Special) .- Hon. Martin Burrell, minister of agriculture, tonight gave notice of a bill which he will introduce providing that the large sum of ten million dollars be appropriated for the purpose of aiding agriculture."

The resolution will be introduced in the house next week, and is as

"That it is expedient to provide that a sum not exceeding ten million lollars be appropriated and paid out of the consolidated revenue fund of Canada during the period of ten years, beginning with the year ending March 31, 1914, for the purpose of aiding and advancing the farming industry by instruction in agriculture, including the work carried on by veterin-

FULFILMENT OF PROMISES. This is the largest lump sum ever proposed for aid to agriculture in the history of Canada, is an elaboration of the "federal aid to agriculture" bill introduced by the government last session, and a fulfilling of the pledges made by the Conservatives while in opposition. It is understood that the money is to be spent in co-operation with the provinces, and that a number of agricultural colleges will be erected thruout the country. ed Cheques and False Entries in Books — Amount HYDRO COMMISSION REFUTES SENATE COMMITTEE REPORT

Statement Issued Showing in Detail How the Surplus For Last Year Was Obtained-Further Reduction of Rates Will Save Municipalities Hundred Thousand Dollars.

The Ontario Hydro-Electric Commission comes out with another answer to the misleading statements by the New York State Senate Comwere the "young gentlemen from New York" who came north for fish under the guise of obtaining facts about the Hydro-Electric system. These figures, which appear below, give a full account of the amount of power used, the operating and administration expenses and how the surplus of \$55,166.45 was obtained. It was stated by the New York senators that the Hydro Commission did not include administration charges. Herewith are given detailed expenditures on operation, showing the amount of administration and general expenses, as well as operating and maintenance charges and interest on capital cost.

Owing to increased loads on the Niagara system in the last three months of operation, the commission found it advisable to revise rates, as published, which will have the effect of making a reduction to municipalities of over \$100,000 during the present fiscal year.

No longer need the fruit grower fear a crop failure, no longer is fruit production the uncertainty it used to be, for, asserts a writer in the January issue of Farm and Fireside, with the intervention science, neither frost, insects nor disease can give the grower off years when he receives no income from his high-priced land.

Spraying and heating go hand in hand, Jack Frost is now driven back from the tender blossoms and fruit by a process of heating which is fast becoming popular. Scientific orchard heating is a new thing, but a sure thing, and a 200-acre orchard can have its temperature raised 10 to 15 degrees with absolute certainty.

Orchard-heating was first practised in California, altho smudging, or the formation of a dense blanket of smoke over orchards, had been practised in Europe befores. In 1908 some Grand Valley fruit growers in Colorado practised orchard heating with the burning of oil in simple pots of the lard-pail type, with the result on the fruit growers of Colorado have saved annually four or five million dellars' worth of fruit.

Experience has shown, however, that even this protection is not a sufficient safeguard against forest fires starting by sparks from the locomotives. This danger will now entirely be removed by electrification, which will also be more economical for the railway company, since the cost of fuel in this part of the northwest is extensively high.

"In choosing a distraction—that is to say, in choosing a rival to his business—he should select some pursuit differs as much as poswhose nature differs as much as possible from the nature of his business, and which will bring into activity another side of his character. If his business, ness is monotonous, demanding care and solicitude rather than irregular, intense efforts of the brain, then let his distraction be such as will make a powerful call upon his brain. But if on the other hand the course of his business wins in crises that string up business runs in crises that string up the brain to its tightest strain, then let his distraction be a foolish and

merry one.
"Many men fall into the error of assuming that their hobbies must be as dignified and serious as their vocations, the surely the example of the greatest philosophers ought to have taught them better! They seem to imagine that they should continually be improving themselves in either body or mind. If they take up a sport, it is because the sport may improve their health. And if the hobby is in-tellectual it must needs be employed to

improve their brain.
"The fact is that their conception of self-improvement is too narrow. In their restricted sense of the phrase they possibly don't need improving. They possibly are already improved point of being a nuisance their fellow creatures; possibly what they need is worsening. In the broad and full sense of the phrase self-im-provement, a course of self-worsening might improve them.
"I have known men—and every-

body has known them—who would approach nearer to perfection if they could only acquire a little carelessness. a little absentmindedness, a little illogicalness, a little irrational and infantile gatety, a little unscrupulous-ness in the matter of the time of day. These considerations should be weighed before certain hobbies are dis-missed as being unworthy of a plain

Bank Guarded by Soldiers.

An outbreak of fire at the Bank of England the other day, which was more alasming than large, was the means of letting many of the public know to their surprise that the bank is guarded every night by a detachment of Foot Guards armed with rifle and bayonet. The inception of this guard was due to the attack on the bank by the Gordon rioters in 1780, and the bank has never since that time been asked to defend itself against an enemy from without. The guard consists of a quarter of a company drawn from whatever regiment of Foot Guards may be quartered in London. It is in charge of a subattern and two non-commissioned officers. The subaltern has very comfortable quarters, and is allowed to invite two guests nightly to dinner. These guests must be out of the bank by eleven.

The fire that occurred the other day, it may be added, was the first occasion in which the guard at the bank was called to active duty during the 130 years of their existence.

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GUARDING THE KAISER'S WAR CHEST

Sixty Millions of Dollars Locked Up in Tower-Carefully Counted Yearly.

We hear much of the perfection of the German military organization, especially of its preparedness for war, but little of what is perhaps its most extraordinary feature—namely, the Imperial War Fund, says Harper's Weekly. The Kaiser's war chest is kept in the Julius flower at Spandau. This fund was reserved from the French indemnity payment, and, it is said, has so increased that it now amounts to sixty millions of dollars.

It must be remembered that this vast amount has been entirely withdrawn from circulation, so to speak, and that the community loses upon it in interest something like six hundred thousand pounds, according to English estimates. The Kaiser's war fund is reported to be kept in iron chests inscribed with the names and addresses of commanders of army corps and admirals of fleets. These packages would be immediately despatched to the commanders named in the event, of war. Special sums have been set aside for commanders on the frontier in the vicinity of the outbreak of hostilities. There are also set aside special sums to be used for special purposes, such as the secret service. It is said that for the most part this treasure consists of ten and twenty mark pieces, but that there are, however, quantities of coins of all the great powers, principally France, Great Britain and Russia.

At stated times during the year all this treasure is opened, weighed and counted by army officers specially detailed by the emperor from all parts of Germany. It is a feature of the count that prior thereto these officers must give their word of honor that they do not know one another, Furthermore, altho the war funds are in charge of a special officer at the tower he is not always advised of the proceedings beforehand. In such event, it is only when the Kaiser's special deputies have finished their task that this officer is called to check up the accounts.

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Governor Sulzer of New York Decides That Sentence Given by Courts Was Excessive.

ALBANY, N. Y., Jan. 17.—Governor Sulzer today pardoned Folke E. Brandt on the ground that his sentence of thirty years for burglary in the home, of Mortimer L. Schiff of New York City was excessive.

At the request of Governor Sulzer, Attorney General Carmody made a statement in which he said he favored Frandt's pardon, "not as a matter of grand's pardon, "not as a matter of mercy, but as a matter of justice." He criticized the procedure thru which Brandt was tried and sentenced.

Mr. Carmody declared that the governor's action wiped out a "blot on the judiciary of the state." and shows "that there isn't anything that can defeat the end of justice."

It was stipulated by Governor Sulzer in pardoning Brandt that he is not to accept a flieatrical engagement and accept a theatrical engagement and must not in future reflect upon the character of anyone.

The Brandt case was a memorable one, persistent efforts having been made since his conviction six years ago to secure his release. It was contended that he had been unduly punished because of powerful influences. He was formerly a valet in the service of Mortimer Schiff and was convicted of burglary.

IMPROVED DIVING SUIT.

An important improvement has been recently made by a German inventor which makes it possible for the diverto remain several hours under water without any connection with the upper world. The innovation is a self-containworld. The innovation is a self-coltained diving suit in which a supply of fresh

diver as wanted, the supply being entirely under his own control. The explred air is purified automatically, by
passing over cartridges of chemical which
absorb the impurities. In the place of
the usual lead ballast, the driver carries
on his chest a weight constituted by the usual lead ballast, the driver carries on his chest a weight constituted by steel bottles where compressed air or highly compressed axygen is accumulated. Whenever the diver wishes to reach the surface without any outside help, he simply opens the valve of these bottles, thus causing air to flow into his outfit and to impart to the latter the required buoyancy. This is how, in cases of emergency, he will, from any rormal depth reach, in a few moments, the surface of the water. A safety valve actuated with any excess pressure prevents used diving outfit from bursting with an accidental rise from considerable depths. The apparatus has been subjected to a number of severe tests and is said to have satisfactorily answered all requirements.

NEW GAS DISCOVERED.

LONDON, Jan. 17.—(Can. Press.)— Sir Joseph John Thomson, Cavendish professor of experimental physics at Cambridge University, announced to the Royal Institution tonight his dis-covery of a new gas, which, he said, holds the same relationship to hydrogen that ozone does to oxygen.

On the face of things it is apparent that the medical service is hampered, and so inefficient until these things are provided. In many instances the prinand so inefficient until these things are provided. In many instances the principal obligingly gives his room for the purpose, but a special room properly heated and supplied with hot and cold water, and kept free from interruption are the equipment necessary. This, then, is another point which needs to be looked after, right away. Oover-crowding of classes is a long standing evil in almost every city, one from which Toronto is not free. It cannot be too often emphasized that crowded classes mean poor results for both

It is the devil's will that has been done thru our pas gent, criminal inacticity. Disease me uncleanliness and unsanitary condi-tions, and habits in the community, in he home or in the school. This is an rraignment which we, as o not like to hear, but we have the omfort of knowing that we do not all suffer thru our own negligence on the points mentioned, but that often or carelessness of others. In either case it is the imperative duty of the public to assist the schools by providing financial support and of the

schools to see that every provision is made to safeguard our children while they have them in their care.

Open-Air Schools. resist disease Dr. Struthers have open-air schools. These started in Germany, and now across the line they have them in nearly all

their big cities. Our near neighbors have them. Cleveland has eight. One of these, the Eagle School, has provision for four open-air classes on the roof. These are reached by electric elevators—just think of it—and have playgrounds, shower baths, rest rooms, toilets, medical dispensary and a large dining-room with kitchen; in short, all requisites for an ideal school for the children predisposed to any manner of disease, who form their clientle. How does Toronto stand in the mat

ter of open-air schools? A beginning was made during the summer. At present there is nothing of the kind in existence. Here is another where we are conspicuously lacking.






