

It was de-cided to hold a meeting of the committee next week, when Controller Foster, the chairman, and Property Commissioner Chisholm, will make some de-finite recommendation as to the policy and procedure which the council will be

urged to adopt.

Everywhere the aldermen saw congestion of the worst character. On the wharves the Niagara boats were unloading thousands, of baskets of peaches, and there was scarcely any passage way. Big trucks loaded with fruit passed in a continuous procession and on every spare portion of floor area peaches were piled up in a manner of a wood pile. Express carts were lined up everywhere at the entrance to the wharves, and there was apparently little system about the proceedings.



WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any mate over 13 years oid, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, saskatenewan or Aberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the Land in each of three years. A homesteader nay live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in Lood stancing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his nomestead Price \$2.00 per acré.

Duties.—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of nomestead entry discluding the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.


