## FARMERS AGAINST STRICT MEASURES

Clear Explanation of Military Service Requirements at Galt.

## PASSED A RESOLUTION

Would Keep Young Men for Seeding and Harvesting This Year.

Galt, April 28.—(Although only hastily summoned by telephone 300 farmers, representing the Townships of North Dumfries, Wilmot, Waterloo, Beverley and Pushtich, gathered here Saturday evening at the city hall to hear the explanation of the new order-in-council respecting the Military Service Act, P. 2, for South Waterloo. Some of the farmers came a distance of 25 miles.)

the farmer owing as much to the state as any other man. However, the farmer was deserving of consideration if it could be shown he could better serve his country by producing food-stuffs than by military service, but this was a matter for the military authorities to decide. Mr. Scott emphasized the fact that the government was not trying to disrupt agricultural production, but instead wanted to get all possible out of the land, but reinforcements were required for the men at the front. He felt satisfied, however, that the military authorities would show proper consideration in dealing with farmers for military service.

**Considerable Discussion.**  
There was considerable discussion, followed by the passing of the following resolution, moved by J. Taylor, Jr., Galt, and seconded by Thomas Hall, Ayr: "While this meeting and notwithstanding the seriousness of the situation which confronts the government and country at this time and the necessity of providing reinforcements to the men at the front, we desire at the same time to impress upon the government that immediate and indiscriminate enforcement of this order-in-council would seriously interfere with agricultural production, and we would respectfully suggest in calling these young men to the colors where it is apparent to the military authorities that they can best serve the cause of the allies by being left upon the farms, that leave be granted them during the present seeding and later the harvesting operations of the present year to remain on the farms."  
J. Taylor, Jr., reeve of North Dumfries, presided.

## ENEMY FORCES STAND NEAR VOORMEEZELE

Berlin, April 28.—The official communication from general headquarters on the operations against the French and British says:  
"To the north of Wytschaete we advanced as far as the southern border of Voormezele. French and British divisions vainly attempted to wrest Mont Kemmel away from us. Their attacks, delivered in the morning on a front from Dickenouch to Loree and during the evening from the region of Loree as far as west of Dranoote, broke down under our fire with heavy losses."

"Where the enemy reached our lines he was defeated in hand-to-hand fighting. Northwest of Merville, on the southern bank of the Lys and near Givency, enemy advances failed. Between the Scarpe and the Soume enemy reconnoitering engagements also failed."  
"South of the SComme the French tried themselves to death in repeated assaults, as well as south of Villers-Bretonneux. After the failure of strong attacks in the early morning at the northern end of Hangard Wood, the enemy in the afternoon again gathered his forces, consisting chiefly of Moroccans, for renewed advances against Hangard Wood and to the north of Luce Brook. Off-repeated attempts, which were preceded by the strongest artillery preparation, to pierce our lines, failed."  
"On their own initiative our infantry detachments advanced to the attack

## GERMANS CAPTURED BRITISH FRONT POST

London, April 28.—Field Marshal Haig's report from headquarters in France last night says:  
"During the night the enemy attacked one of our posts in the neighborhood of Festubert and succeeded in capturing it. Another local attack against our positions west of Merville was broken up by our machine gun and rifle fire and failed to reach our trenches."  
"Except for minor engagements in the battle sectors and artillery activity on both sides, the day passed comparatively quiet on the British front. Bodies of hostile infantry assembling east of Villers-Bretonneux were effectively shelled by our batteries."

## CANADIAN SOLDIERS WIN SCHOLARSHIPS

London, April 28.—(Via Reuter's Ottawa agency.)—The following is a further list of Canadian soldiers' scholarships awarded, bringing up to 25 the number of scholarships to all the dominions:

P. S. Warren, Canadian military forces, Imperial College of Science and Technology (awarded by the Kitchener Memorial Fund).  
Corp. A. Gallaway, infantry, Oxford University; Gunner Grove, artillery (awarded by the Rhodes trustees).

## BRITISH QUIT VILLAGES CAPTURED ON STRUMA

London, April 27.—A retirement by the British troops on the Salonica front from villages which were recently captured, is reported in an official statement issued by the war office on operations in the Macedonian theatre of war. The statement reads:  
"During the night of April 18 British troops withdrew from advanced villages in the Struma sector, which they had occupied on April 16. The villages were later shelled by the enemy."  
"On April 20 and April 22, the British carried out raids on the Doiran Vardar front."

## Vancouver Civic Employes Strike to Enforce Demands

Vancouver, April 28.—Members of the civic employes' union, following the ultimatum presented the city council last Tuesday, automatically ceased work at noon yesterday to enforce their demands for an increase in wages of 25c a day. They number about 200 men.

## FIND SOLDIERS' UNIFORMS.

Brockville, Ont., April 28.—Two soldiers' uniforms were found by boys on one of the Sister Islands in the American waters of the St. Lawrence River near here and handed over to the local military authorities. The clothing was that of infantry privates, who are presumed to have deserted to the United States.

## FREE HAND GIVEN CARDINAL LOGUE

Vatican Refuses to Interfere With Irish Anti-Conscriptionists.

Rome, April 27.—The Courier d'Italia, a semi-official Vatican organ, speaking with reference to the attitude of Cardinal Logue concerning conscription in Ireland, says:  
"The holy see always has left the episcopacy of each country free to take the attitude they think best in internal affairs of their country. Thus whatever Cardinal Logue may consider expedient to deal with conscription in Ireland cannot affect the impartiality and neutrality of the Vatican in this war, nor be considered as a violation of the policy constantly followed by the holy see since the war began."  
Cardinal Logue presided over the Irish Catholic Bishops' Committee at a meeting recently held in Dublin, at which a resolution was unanimously passed, protesting against conscription in Ireland and declaring that to enforce conscription without the consent of the Irish people would inevitably end in defeating its own purpose.
