SALE OF SPANISH MOROCCO TO FRANCE FOR BILLION FRANCS

Exchange of Gibraltar for Ceuta and Tunnel to Connect France With Africa Openly Discussed in French Chamber.

Paris, Dec. 26.—The cession of Spanish Morocco to France in exchange for a cash consideration of one billion francs, the return of Gibraltar to Spain by Great Britain and the abandonment of Ceuta, Morocco, to Great Britain by Spain, are being openly discussed. It is asserted that the Spanish premier, Count Romanones, recently, during his visit to Paris, made such a proposal to President Wilson and M. Clemenceau, the French premier.





ORDER-IN-COUNCIL KNOTTY PROBLEM

Is the Order Relative to Post-Discharge Pay Retroactive?

Is the order-in-council relative to post-discharge pay retroactive, that is does it affect all men returned from everseas and discharged during the entire period of the war? This is a widely discussed question among returned men, especially among those who have been in the trenches for two years or more but who were discharged say six months ago. "It's like this," said one man, an original, with two years and seven months' service in the trenches to his credit. "If the order-in-council is not retroactive the order-in-council went into effect have seen only two years' service altogether, counting training. Will it be fair to allow these men full six months' post-discharge-pay and leave me stranded with only three months' pay because my own time limit has been reached? Decidedly not. My record is that of four years' service all but fourteen days. There should be no differential treatment in favor of the chap with only two, or as in many cases with only one year's service to his credit. I therefore read it as retroactive." F. G. Pratt, secretary of the Red Triangle Club Service Bureau, expressed the same views.

No Liberal desires the west to "indefinitely suppress" its tariff views No Canadian imagines that the tariff issue can be indefinitely postponed The choice is between another session of parliament and its dissolution. A dissolution this winter or in the spring would plunge the country into a general election in the midst of demobilization. Twenty-five or thirty thousand Canadian soldiers will be crossing the Atlantic every month. The Canadian army now in Germany will be streaming back to the channel ports England to embark for Canada after peace is declared. It would be impossible to take properly a military pol in these circumstances. An election during the process of homecoming and demobilization would be a virtual disfranchisement of the Canadian Expeditionary Force.
