OUR CANADIAN MARINE

Would Appear to be Declining Rapidly According to a Cleveland Writer—Some Figures.

Chicago, Aug. 13.—A Cleveland despatch to The Record says: The decadence of the Canadian marine, with the vast increase in the lake-vessel interests of the United States, is disappointing to the British-American. The Canadian Marine Association, organized to promote the interests of Canadian shipping, has a membership of about 50 and its work is confined to the great lakes. The organization in many respects is similar to the Lake Carriers' Association, composed of American owners of lake tonnage, having no power to adjust transportation charges or influence the trade.

The Dominion's lake fleet does not contain a vessel of importance when compared with the boats coming from the west coast of this country. Her largest vessels, like the steamer Algouquin and those of the Dominion's lake fleet do not exceed 100 tons.

The decline in Canadian shipping for the last five or six years has been marked. During the last five or six years her fleet has declined at the rate of 25,000 to 30,000 tons a year and at the present time there does not seem to be anything that will stop the decrease.

Across the border there has been some discussion in an informal way about devising means to rehabilitate the Canadian lake shipping. The interest seems to have been aroused, the people evidently being content to permit the lake shipping to decline, the principal reason being that the DSR report of the Canadian Department of Marine and Fisheries is not available, but the report is expected to be published in the near future.

Figures showing Canadian decrease. For about 20 years previous to 1892 the tonnage reported each year aggregated 200,000 to 1,500,000 net tons. In 1892 there has been a marked decrease in the aggregate, notwithstanding the building of new vessels.

He May Not be Heard From for a Year. So His Relatives Say.

Chicago, Aug. 13.—Capt. John Windrow of San Francisco does not believe the story that Prof. Andree's balloon was seen floating in the ocean by a ship's captain. The captain has just returned from Sweden, where he visited his relatives, among whom is the family of Prof. Andree's brother. The captain said: "I was in Stockholm when the news arrived that Andree had left Copenhagen in his balloon. His family, that is his brothers—Andree is not married—fully believe that he will be heard from. Andree himself told them that if no news were received from him in two months, probably nothing would be heard of him for a year, as he would have then landed in such localities that it would take months for him and his party to reach a point where they could communicate with the outside world.

Another Steamer Ashore. St. John's, Nfld., Aug. 13.—The brigantine Florida, Capt. Williams, from Antigonish on June 30, bound for Plover Bay, with a crew of 20, was wrecked on the rocks in a dense fog, and will be a total wreck.

TUBERCULOSIS IN CATTLE.

Special Investigations Will be Made Throughout the Province by Experts.

Col. David McCrae of Guelph and E. C. Harrison, bacteriologist of the Guelph Agricultural College, had a conference with Deputy Minister of Agriculture C. O. James yesterday with regard to the investigation into the prevalence of tuberculosis in cattle and to the testing of the same. Arrangements were made to make a tour of the province, Mr. Harrison making the tuberculin test and Col. McCrae will impart instruction in methods of testing. The work will be performed free of charge, and that farmers and milkmen can have no objection in allowing them to operate.

SEWERAGE SYSTEMS.

Special Meeting of Provincial Board of Health Will Consider Certain Proposals.

A special meeting of the Provincial Board of Health has been called for Monday morning next. It is understood that applications for ratification of laws authorizing the construction of sewerage systems for Rat Portage and St. John's, and for an extension of the Stratford system, and for the disposal of the sewage for a part of the city of Hamilton will be under consideration.

While the press of every important city in the United States from New York to San Francisco is filled with stories of expeditions being fitted out for gold-seeking in the Klondike, in some cases by private individuals and in others by companies organized for the purpose, very little in that direction has been done in Canada. It is with the Klondike as with the Kootenay and Ontario gold fields. Canadians are slow to believe in the possibility of rich gold fields in the Dominion, and only realize the fact after the best of the locations have been acquired by foreigners.
