THE PROJECT EXPECTED TO BE CARRIED
OUT WITHIN TWO YEARS.

Three Corps of Surveyors Will be at Work
Next Week-Mr. Lumsden of Toronto
is in Charge of the Work-The Arrangements
are Particulars of Proposed Route.

The Toronto-to-Suburby line is no longer
a myth. Two corps of surveyors are
already at work on the proposed route, and
a third party will start next week. The
work is to be completed this summer, and
within two years the Canadian Pacific will
have their new line extended from some
point on the Orangeville branch into the
Mills District.

Mr. H. D. Lumsden of Toronto, a civil
engineer with the Canadian Pacific, has
been engaged for the past 18 months in
getting through the Crown's West Pass Bill,
and two months ago he was recalled to
complete the work. Since then Mr. Lumsden
has been making numerous and many
visits between Toronto, Montreal and
Ottawa on business, which proved to be
in connection with the Toronto-to-Suburby
line, and last evening at 9 o'clock
he will get together his party and surveying
equipment, and start for Suburby on
Monday next.

Mr. Lumsden has already placed a surveying
party at Parry Sound to go over the
proposed route between that point and
the Orangeville branch, and has also
placed a party at Coldwater and survey
southward through Coldwater and Coldwater

Mr. Lumsden is supervising the entire
survey, and has taken the heaviest and
most important part upon himself. His
staff is for the most part composed of
young men from McGill University, and
