The following telegram was received from Milwaukee Saturday night: MILWAUKEE, May 18, 1901. H. W. Cherry, alias H. W. Shortwell, is the man under arrest here. He is wanted at Cleveland for forgery, but nothing is said about Toronto.

Torontonians were jubilant Saturday afternoon when they read that George Albert Winton, the bank swindler, had been caught in Milwaukee. It remained for The Sunday World to print a despatch throwing doubt on the correctness of the news of capture.

From the facts in possession of the city police, it seemed evident that Winton was captured. But later despatches from 'Milwaukee and Cleveland discredit the story. Word of his arrest was received by chief Grasett about 1 o'clock on Saturday, when the following telegram came to the police department from the authorities of Milwaukee, Wis. :

"Chief of Police, Toronto: George Albert Winton in custody here. wanted in other places. What punishment can you give him? "Supt. of Police, Milwaukee."

London, May 19.-While the industrial war in Spain appears to be subsiding, curiously enough similar troubles are in progress in Italy. The danger is growing steadily without attracting attention outside of Italy, and the international indifference will probably continue until the storm bursts.

The movement is undeniably in the hands

The movement is undeniably in the hands of Socialists, and is of a revolutionary character. Every industrial town is in a ferment already, and fights have taken place at a score of places where loss of life has been involved.

The storm centre is in Milan. At that place this week 15,000 men left work. They have a military organization, divided into fifteen battalions, each 1000 strong, and sub-divided into 150 companies. All this playing soldier is grossly illegal, yet the authorities hesitate to act, as they are afraid of precipitating a crisis.

Meantime an exodus of well-to-do people is in progress, and the whole city is in a state of painful excitement. The Central Government is quiescent in the face of this really serious danger.

The administration of the country seems to be at a standstill, pending the imminent accouchment of Queen Helena. The whole nation, including even the militant Socialists, is curiously enough waiting with impatient interest this event, and there is furious betting as to the sex of the expected infant, with the odds in favor of a boy. The newspapers discuss the matter with astonishing freedom, for the most part with entire disregard of the expectant mother.


