TWENTY-SECOND YEAR

**WINSTON STILL ELUDES ARREST  
REPORTED CAPTURE IN A HOAX**

MILWAUKEE, May 18, 1901.

**WHAT MISLED CITY POLICE.**

Torontonians were jubilant Saturday afternoon when they read that George Albert Winston, the bank swindler, had been caught in Milwaukee. It remained for The Sunday World to print a despatch throwing doubt on the correctness of the news of capture.

From the police in possession of the city, it seemed evident that Winston was captured. But later despatches from Milwaukee and Cleveland discredited the story. Word of his arrest was received by Chief Grassett about 1 o'clock on Saturday, when the following telegram came to the police department from the authorities of Milwaukee, Wis.:

"Chief of Police, Toronto: George Albert Winston in custody here. Is wanted in other places. What punishment can you give him?"

"Supt. of Police, Milwaukee."

In reply, Inspector Beak of the Detective Department immediately sent this message:

"Supt. of Police, Milwaukee: Case against Winston clear; punishment unlimited. Can we have him? If so, will he return without extradition?"

**DENIAL FROM MILWAUKEE.**

Milwaukee, Wis., May 18.—(Special)—Information has been received at police headquarters which indicates that the man who was shot yesterday while in a struggle with Detectives Peck and Wallerman is H. W. Cherry, alias H. W. Shortwell, a man known as bearing a likeness of the wounded man who was seized, which gave this information.

It is stated that Cherry is a police alleged forger. The postal gives an accurate description, which corresponds so far as facts with the man who is now in custody.

According to this information, Cherry was acting as agent for the Hickman derfer Typewriter Company, and while at Cleveland bought two valuable diamond rings with a cheque alleged to have been forged. The Armoury Cleveland had been entered, it is said, by a number of cheques from a cheque-book belonging to Capt. Squires and been taken, together with a bank book, which showed the location of the one, which was found on the person of Cherry.

This condition was found on examination to be much less serious than was at first supposed. He was taken to the Central Station this morning and subjected to a vigorous questioning, something the police retained from doing yesterday, because of his weakened condition. The man will protest that he is innocent of crime, although the photograph accompanying the postal card is a perfect likeness of him.

Thus far it is not known what kind of a charge will be brought against him. He denies that he has ever been in Canada. Local police say they did not wire Toronto regarding the case, and that Winston has nothing of a Canadian end to the story.

**SALISBURY MAY RESIGN ANY DAY.  
PREMIER'S OLD-TIME VIGOR GONE**

**Despite Official Denials He is in Bad Condition Physically—Everybody Shocked by Change Manifest When He Spoke in the House of Lords Last Week.**

New York, May 19.—The World prints the following special from London: Precisely the same pathetic game is being played over Queen Victoria's health as over that of Queen Victoria for six months before Salisbury's resignation.

The Premier's manner was so listless, his face so grey and his gestures and voice were so feeble that Lord Rosebery, sitting opposite, turned to the Earl of Camperdown and said:

"He is positively ill. It is dangerous for him to attempt to speak; he will break down."

However, he did not break down, but his enunciation, always so clear cut, was unusually muffled, and his voice, usually so penetrating and resonant, died away on his lips.
