Comments on the Rule of Politicians in Canada To-Day With Pessimistic Force.

Woodstock, July 12 .- (Special.)-In a stirring address before a gathering of 5000 Orangemen here to-day, Rev. Canon Farthing, rector of New St. Paul's Church, this city, made a scathing denunciation of present-day political methods and the reprehensive means employed by parties in an effort to remain in power. He spoke of the civil and religious liberties gained by civil and religious liberties gained by the overcoming of the tyranny of King James of England. Orangemen and true Christians should stand for the liberties of the people, irrespective of creed or party. He urged the upholding of high ideals and denounced war in the strongest terms. It was peace and civil liberty people wanted.

"I am not sure but that our constitution is in danger," he said. "It is not the Pope at Rome who is our greatest enemy. It is our Canadian politicians. There are politicians on both sides in parliament to-day seeking to rob us of the political freedom our fathers fought for. It was apparent in our election contests, where men were seen circulating money, wood or coal and whisky to obtain votes. We must protest against our politicians going in for political jobbery by selling timber limits to keep in power. These men are the real enemies of Carada. Nowadays it appears a man must remain true to his party if he must commit perjury to do so. The methods employed in stealing our votes are a disgrace to our country. The machine must be fought. The political heeler is at our doors. These are the ones who are more formidable enemies to our liberties than the saintly old man sitting on his throne in Rome."

The department will arrange where an owner desires to retain his number while changing his machine, to issue a new ilcense and change the number upon application. Changes of ownership must be at once notified to the department, and all vehicles will be kept account of.

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

CORRESPONDENTS LEAVE THE WAR NO CHANCE TO GET TO THE FRONT

William Kuton of The London Graphic, and Mr. Williams of The London Sphere Arrive In Victoria, B.C., and Tell of Their Experiences.

Victoria, B. C., July 12.—Wm. Kirton, war correspondent for The Central News and London Graphic, a military critic of considerable note, arrived this morning by the Canadian Pacific Railroad Company's steamship Empress of India. Asked as to the real reason for the refusal of the Japanese used to advantage. In the hand-to-hand fighting, some of which Kirton saw, the Russians, in spite of their superior physical stature, were no match for the Japanese, who won all those encounters with the steel.

Was the fact that a number of irresponsible and sensational American newspaper reporters, who knew nothing about war or the duties of a war correspondent, had been sent out by ing about war or the duties of a war correspondent, had been sent out by individual American newspapers, and that the Japanese include not only those persons in the ban of prohibition, but also on their account the trained and veteran British war correspondents.

Kirton maintains that is the one solitary reason why Japanese did not permit correspondents to leave Tokio, or on permitting a few to accompany stately affine a fall off his horse during the Yalu action. This fall led to the report that he had been shot.

J. Sheldon Williams, special war artist of The London Sphere, also returned from Tokio on the Empress.

He declares it is hopeless for correspondents of individual newspapers to remain in Japan or try to get to the front. The only men who are doing the real war reporting are the representatives of the Associated Press of America, who are scattered all over the war front, and doing what Mr. Williams describes as truly splendid work.

Kirton, describing the Yalu River fight, which he witnessed, says it was par excellence a Howitzer fight, that the Japanese outclassed the Russians work.

It is now understood in Japan that the tactical crisis of the war has been reached. Kuropatkin's decision to fight or fall back will determine the length of the war, and men returning to Yokohama from the front just before the Empress left, expressed no doubt that Kuropatkin intended to risk all in a general engagement on a selected battlefield.
