LARGER CANADIAN SHIPS RESTRICTED IN TRAVELS

By a Staff Reporter, OTTAWA, March 17 .- A new order has been promulgated whereby Canadian steamers whose gross tonnage exceeds 500 ton are prohibited from voyages between ports in Canada or between Canadian and United States ports, unless a license to do so has been granted.





But information from England and reports from Rome, following the visit of Premier Briand of France, caused the Germans to begin their offensive two months earlier than they had roiginally plared it to begin. How Women Might Help.

There are many firms yet where eligible men are employed in large numbers on the elevators, in grocery and drug and other stores. In any one of these women could do the work, Running an elevator was not the heavy task some imagine, and wrap-ping up parcels could be done as deftly by women as men. The advice of Major Watts was that the women should make personal application for such positions. Their action would tend to the awakening necessary.

Another idea launched at the meet ing was that a committee of business men and women be formed for the purpose of taking responsibilities due to property, of those who are now deterred from recruiting thru fear that their families may suffer and the results of their lifetime of labor be lost, as might happen in the case of mortgages on property. "Assurance that these thing would be attended to in



Industrial Activity.

Mr. Runcim n said the importation of some fresh fruits probably would be prohibited later. Turning from the matter of imports to the general industrial situation in the British Isles, Mr. Runciman said there had never been greater activity in the larger industries, that wages were higher than ever before and that the percentage of unemployed had never been so small in the history of the country.

"In all the larger industries," Mr Runciman continued, "there never has been greater activity, but the bulk of the output, of course, is for war purposes. The only trades rela tively quiet are the building, linen and some of the luxury-producing trades, but even in these there is little either having secured other employ ment or gone into the army.

"Because of the heavy demand for labor and the higher cost of living, wages have increased since the out break of the war, and nearly all class es of workers are receiving mor money. About 5,500,000 have received raises and the increase in wages has been roughly a million pounds a week Besides this, many of the people have been transferred to the better paying unition industries

Women Doing Good Work. "Women who have taken the place of men in various trades are doin amazingly good work. It is estimated that the number of women who have been substituted for men in the metal rades is 77,000, in the leather trades 4,000 and in the miscellaneous trades 274,000. Besides these many are in the government employ, an increasing-ly large body in commercial houses great number are employed in the dilution of labor and in agricul tural work. More women are needed badly on the farms. Two hundred thousand could be used in the south

of England alone. Women are performing every kind of work which is not too heavy for their strength. In one firm they are making electric motors; in another they are doing all the work in manunfacturing 2-inch howitzer shells, including the test of them. And they are doing many other kinds of work re-





Officers of National Guard of U.S. Discuss Adaptability of Motor Vehicles for Military Service Motor Truck Club.

cent meeting of the Motor Truck Club of America toward the formation of a motor truck reserve corps in the metropolitan district, and, as was stated by the newly installed president, Roderick Stephens, "a non-stop motor run" was inaugurated for this branch of national preparedness. Officers of the New York division of the National Guard were present and spoke of the important part that can be played by the motor truck in military service, following which a committee, composed of George H. Pride, Roderick Stephens and A. J. Slade, was appointed to form an adequate organization for motor truck reserve. This action is a part of the plan for the formation of a nation-wide Automobile Reserve Corps, which has been under way for the last few months. In places where there is no present intention of allying the companies with the national guard, recruits are actually being asked for, while in those states where the promoters plan the corps as an adjunct of the organized militia there has been a necessary delay until a special act is passed by the legislature. The form of an enlistnent will practically be a contract to charter the vehicles. The schedule to pay not only has to be worked out, but accurate information is needed as to the probable cost to the state of indemnifying all vehicles when in active service; also, the cost of wrecking

The first truck company to be form ed under the plan recently worked out by the general staff of the United States army has just been completed in this city. The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lanus Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by Dioxy may be made at any Dominion Lanus Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within mine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain con-

farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where restuence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price

WHEAT BROKE SHARPLY ON REPORTS OF PEACE

Wholesale Seizure of German Ships in Brazil Adding to Chicago Depression.

CHICAGO GOES LOWER

Turkish Situation Alarmed Dealers Owing to Prospects of Opening Dardanelles.

CHICAGO, March 17.—Peace reports from Switzerland, as well as rumors of wholesale seizure of Germans ships in Brazil, led to sharp breaks today in the value of wheat. Prices closed heavy, 2 1-2c to 3 3-8c net lower, with May at \$1.08 1-8 and July at \$1.06 8-4. Corn lost 3-4c to 1 3-8c and oats 7-8c to 1. In provisions the outcome varied from 35c decline to a rise of 10c. Lowest prices of the day in the wheat pit were reached after word was making an effort for a separate yeace between Turkey and the Anglo-French allies. The weakness in the market, however, began on the receipt of despatches from Liverpool assert-ing that 44 German vessels, interned in Brazil since the opening of hostllities, had been appropriated by the Brazilian Government, and would likely be used for the transportation of wheat to Great Britain from Argen-The Brazilian reports were not confirmed, tho, and were said in some quarters to be the outgrowth, perhaps, of confusion as to recent wholesale seizures of German vessels in Portu-

Altho several rallies took place in wheat, none proved to be of more than a transient character. Final quotations were within a shade of the bottom figures of the sessions. Enlarged shipments by Australia and Argentina counted somewhat against the bulls, but, like domestic crop reports, were nearly forgotten in view of the much more striking advices regarding Turkey and Brazil.

Corn dropped as a result of the

break in wheat. The selling, however, was not aggressive. Oats were depressed by the action of other cereals. As in corn, the offerings were light. Lower prices on hogs operated as weight on pork and ribs. Lard con-tinued to show strength, in line with grease and cottonseed oil.




