Canada had so far escaped with very little taxation, and he was astounded to learn that the Province of Ontario had collected \$300,000 a year in taxes upon its enormous deposits to mineral products.

Mr. White said that the member for Pictou (Mr. James) had underlined the fact that the government recognized that mining was one of the great industries of Canada and that it was a policy which should be adopted that would check the inflow of foreign capital.

Mr. Turriff objected that land owners and coupon clippers escaped free. There was a bunch of millionaires, he said, around the Rideau Club in Ottawa, who would not be called upon to pay a dollar of taxation.

Mr. Greenwood (Kootenay) said the British Columbia mining companies would cheerfully pay the tax. The tax was not a new one but had been in existence since the beginning of the war.

Mr. Turriff said that the tax was a war measure. He hoped the government would take steps to compel not only zinc and copper but gold, silver and nickel to be refined in Canada.

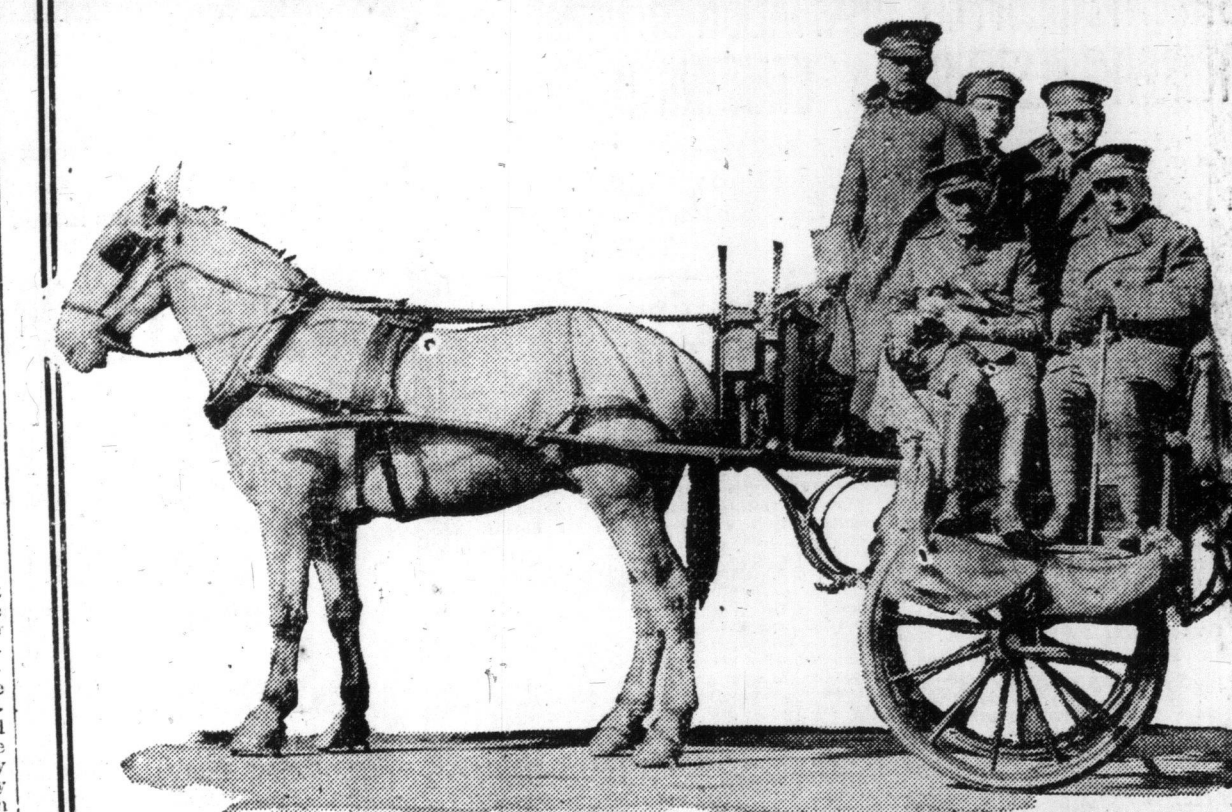

OTTAWA BASEBALL CLUB FOR N. Y. STATE LEAGUE

Application Has Been Made to President Farrell—How Ottawa Lost Money.

OTTAWA, March 17.—The Canadian Baseball League will not have a team in Ottawa this season. This was definitely decided when the local management gave notice at the league meeting in Toronto to count the capital out of the 1916 circuit. However, it does not mean there will be no organized baseball here this summer, for the four-times Canadian League champions have made application to J. H. Farrell, president of the New York State League, for a berth in that circuit. It will not be known for a couple of days whether the Canadian capital will be admitted or not. This territory has been looked over by the New York state managers for some time and it is only the geographical location that stands in the way. The towns in western Ontario have made it necessary for the local club to discard any idea of continuing in the circuit during the lean times occasioned by war conditions. Under the most prosperous circumstances Ottawa, being off the map as far as Ontario baseball is concerned, has been compelled to make double the outlay of any other club in the league, with no come-back in the west, except when playing in London, or possibly Hamilton. Every trip to St. Thomas, Guelph, Brantford, or when Peterboro was in the league, meant a dead financial loss. These towns have not the population for the upkeep of fast Class C baseball.

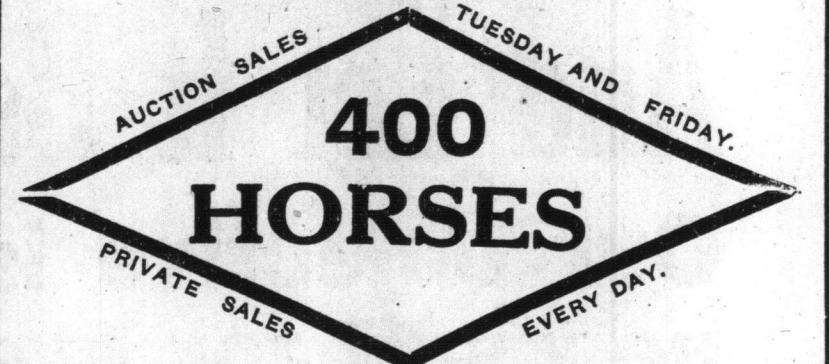

Substitutes for Soap to Cleanse the Face

EVERY woman is born with the possibilities of a smooth, clear skin, but years of neglect and abuse finally rob it of its texture, color and transparency.

If you take the most perfect plant ever grown and neglect to give it the proper nourishment, allow the dead foliage to remain on its branches, the pores of the leaves to become clogged with dust, or if you fail to expose it to the sunlight and air it will very soon lose its thrifty beauty and eventually die.

If a plant requires constant care to preserve its loveliness, how much more attention should be given to the more delicate skin. Yet few and far between are the women who do anything more for their skins than to bathe their faces with soap and water.

If your skin lacks that youthful freshness that is necessary to the really lovely complexion there is some reason for its unattractiveness. If you are naturally healthy and do not suffer from indigestion, there is another cause to be discovered. Perhaps you do not keep the tissues well nourished with a skin food? Or probably you neglect to give the pores a thorough cleansing by a steaming process or by scrubbing the skin with a bland soap and hot water. Then again, your skin may be naturally dry and scaly, and is in need of lubrication to make it pliable and restore to it a velvety smoothness of texture. It is of this latter condition that I wish to suggest a remedy today.

Many a perfect complexion has been ruined by using a soap unsuited to it. Some soaps are composed of a combination of strong chemicals that spell havoc for tender skins. They completely absorb the natural oil from the skin and leave it dry and rough. Instead of tracing this condition to its true source many women blame it upon the ravages of wind and dirt, and continue to scrub the face with the beauty-destroying soap.

If you have always avoided the use of strong soap, ten chances out of one your skin has retained its loveliness but if you have been careless in the selection of soaps, choosing them because of their pleasing scents rather than their purity, then your skin has suffered because of your lack of good judgment.

Greasiness Cleansing Lotion.
There are skins of such delicacy that it is absolutely criminal to cleanse them by using soap and water. In such instances a cleansing cream or lotion should be substituted. In case the use of grease is distasteful to you I shall give you several formulas for lotions that may be used to cleanse the face instead of water.

The benefit of such lotions lies in the fact that they cleanse without drying or hardening the skin, and in many cases soften and refine it.

An excellent lotion consists of:
Rosewater 1/2 pint
Lemon juice 1 tablespoonful
Glycerine 1 ounce

Shake the ingredients vigorously together and apply to the skin with a piece of linen or antiseptic gauze. Mop the face and neck until the skin is thoroughly cleansed.

Glycerine is in two grades, and you must insist upon having that which is chemically pure. The other contains

salts of lime, which is likely to discolor the skin and make it coarse.

Other Cleansing Lotions.
Another lotion which cleanses the skin contains the following ingredients:
Pure glycerine 1-2 ounce
Camphor water 1-2 pint
Powdered borax 1-5 ounce
Apply the lotions several times to

the skin until every particle of dust has been removed.

The following preparation is a liquid cream that is particularly adapted to coarse skins: Place one ounce of sweet almond oil in a porcelain bowl and set it in a basin of boiling water. Add to the oil a piece of white wax the size of a small English walnut and when it has blended with the oil add

as much powdered borax as will stay upon the point of a knife. Then drop in 20 drops of simple tincture of benzoin and oat the mixture with a slip of paper from the hot water as soon as the wax has melted.

Milk is excellent for cleansing and nourishing the skin. Use it in its natural state, and after the dust has been removed from the face it should be allowed to dry into the skin. Rinse the face with clear water to prevent any sour odor. Buttermilk is also one of the best skin purifiers, and will soften and whiten the skin, and at the same time will cleanse the pores of grease and dust.

Take the trouble to study your skin, and if you find that soap does not agree with it, use a cleansing lotion instead.

Diary of a Well-Dressed Girl

How She Remodeled Last Season's Sleeves to Suit the New Styles.

DAD poked his head into the room this afternoon and found me remodeling an old frock. "Sweet girl," he quoted, "are you trying to stack up pennies for your old dad by transforming your old frocks into out-of-date clothes into frocks that will defy anyone to detect their old-timeliness. Never mind, Robin, the day's coming when you'll wear nothing but satins and real laces, for that mine will make good yet."

Dad had to send his savings to help finance the sinking of another shaft in the "Dragon," as mother and I call the mine because it eats up everything that we can scrape together. Our allowance has been reduced, our trip to Jamaica postponed and we've been told to "go easy" on things for awhile. Thank goodness that spring is approaching instead of winter. I can manage to make most of my frocks do for another season since they are made of lightweight silks and transparent materials.

I found that by changing the sleeves, the originals being worn out, five frocks would be presentable.

The sleeves of my prairie-colored crepe meteor frock were of tulle and lace, but they were thru in a very short time. I decided to replace them with more substantial sleeves of taffeta and found a way to make them that appealed to my fancy.

They are cut in one piece with seams on the inside of the arms. I fitted them from the elbow, but above there is ample lining. They extend well over the hands. In medieval fashion, and I used crocheted, bullet buttons of the same color—and folds of the crepe for trimmings. They are particularly stunning sleeves and the natural contour of them.

It was a more serious problem to find a way to make new sleeves for my dark blue taffeta and Georgette crepe frock, for I hadn't much material to work with. I finally decided to make the upper sleeves of taffeta and the lower portions of Georgette crepe. I fitted the taffeta sleeves with an easy fulness, at the same time preserving the natural contour of the serving. Then I made mousseline sleeves of the crepe, added pleated wrist frills and joined them to the taffeta tops. I trimmed each sleeve above the elbow with a band of taffeta

edged with frills of pleated crepe. I am well satisfied with these sleeves.

FOR TURNIP SALAD.

Peel and dice very thin four small white turnips, cut up two small onions, two boiled potatoes and a few lettuce or cress leaves, arrange in a salad bowl and dress with mayonnaise or French dressing. Or, cut turnips into very thin slices, and then cut the slices into squares of half an inch.
