REGULATIONS.

1.—That to constitute a Member of this Committee, a subscription of 10s. currency, per annum, shall be sufficient.

2.—That a General Meeting of this Society take place annually, if possible, during the Assizes for this District.

3.—That the Standing Committee of this Society meet quarterly, on the first day of the Quarter Sessions in this District.

4.—That the subscriptions and donations be paid annually, in advance, on or before the 24th day of December, in each year.

All unpaid accounts for books are expected to be discharged (payable to the Treasurer) on or before the 24th December, in each year, as remittances are then made to the Parent Society.

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EIGHTH AND NINTH

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WHATEVER may have been the fluctuations in public support and encouragement which have marked the progress of this Committee of the Venerable Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, great cause have they for thankfulness to Almighty God that they are now permitted to enter upon the eleventh year of their The Committee are deeply alive, as a paramount duty, to the necessity of furnishing, as far as possible, the services of a minister of Christ to the numerous unprovided settlements of this fast peopling country; -- but while this anxious care to provide for the long neglected congregations of the Church of England in the more remote parts of each District the ministrations of a pastor of their own communion, is one in which none can more cordially unite than the members of this Committee, their persuasion remains unchanged that the Scriptures of God and the auxiliaries to the knowledge of the truth provided by this Society should, in corresponding measure, be disseminated to strengthen the "declaration of the counsel of God," and to enable

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them, like the Bereans, to see whether the things that are preached be so. And while such is their conviction, and such their aim and labour, they are rejoiced to declare that they feel no doubt of being enabled, through the blessing of God, still to maintain and to extend the benefits of the valuable Institution which now presents its claims to the support of the Christian public.

While the ambassadors of Christ speak of the precious promises which the revealed Word of God contains; while they call in solemn terms, upon the impenitent and careless to arise and be converted, and point to the "terrors of the Lord," as a motive for this immediate repentance; while they would comfort the contrite and broken-hearted by words of consolation drawn from those sacred pages; it can easily be understood that their earnest appeal, must be deficient in power and their work be imperfect, unless that Book be furnished for their careful perusal, from whence the accredited messenger from heaven draws forth his topics of encouragement or alarm.

And vainly, in the opinion of your Committee, shall we speak of the excellencies of our venerated Church, and direct attention, especially, to the Scriptural purity of those beautiful prayers and offices which constitute the praise of our unrivalled Liturgy;—vainly shall we call upon the children of the Church to adhere to the faith and cling to the worship of their fathers, unless we

disseminate that Book of Common Prayer in which are contained the most persuasive reasons for the maintenance of that primitive order and discipline which the Church of England inculcates.

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These, in the judgment of your Committee, constitute simple but unanswerable arguments in favour of the principles of this Society; and afford the most solid ground upon which to establish the justice of its claims to the patronage at least of every Church of England Christian.

With this persuasion of the efficacy of the course pursued by the Christian Knowledge Society, your Committee have not failed, to the best of their ability, to promote throughout this District the circulating of the Scriptures and of the Book of Common Prayer; and although the result of the operations of the last two years is not, to appearance, altogether as gratifying as that of the preceding year, your Committee need hardly allude to the disadvantages under which they have laboured, during that interval, from the deplorable events which have taken place, and the unsettled state of the public mind to which they have given rise. But notwithstanding these obstacles to the success of their operations, the efforts of the Committee have not been slackened to maintain this invaluable institution in that position of efficiency which they deem so essential to the well-being of the community. The following amount

of books circulated, through the agency of this Committee, during the last two years, is such we trust as, taking into consideration the difficulties to be surmounted, will not disappoint the patrons of the Society:—

Of the Books above-mentioned, a very considerable number have, as usual, been distributed gratuitously; and your Committee would here beg to call attention to a fact which may not always be sufficiently regarded by the contributors to this Institution, that the full amount of all that has been received in aid of the funds of this Society, whether from the annual subscriptions or collections in Churches has, for the last few years, been appropriated to this gratuitous distribution of their Books, in quarters where they believed that such a manner of appropriation would be attended with advantage to the cause of religion. And this, they trust, will furnish to their benefactors a renewed impulse to the steady and undiminished support of an Institution the object of which is the promulgation, in so extensive a degree, of Scriptural truth and the Scriptural practice which the dissemination of that truth will, with the blessing of God, produce.

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The Travelling Missionaries of this District have been furnished at various times with a considerable supply of Books, according to the vote of the Society at its Seventh Annual Meeting; and the Committee will feel it their duty, on all occasions, when the means are in their power, to supply these labourers in the vineyard, with a proportionate quantity for free distribution amongst the poorer settlers whom they may encounter in their missionary journeys.

Your Committee are happy to state that the formation of a new Depository in Cavan, under the superintendence of Mr. Joseph Graham, has been attended with much advantage; and the contemplated establishment of receptacles for Books in Emily, Seymour and Percy will show that, in obedience to the spirit of this Society, their exertions are very anxiously directed to the furtherance of the Gospel cause in those more remote portions of the District where the benefits of a regular ministry are less frequently enjoyed.

The Committee regret to state that the debt contracted with the Parent Society for the last supply of Books is not as yet discharged; owing, in some degree, to the late very extravagant rate of premium charged upon Bills of Exchange on London; but it is their intention, as the means are now in their hands, to transmit without delay the amount of the balance due.*

Your Committee have also to express their disappointment that so large an amount of arrears continues to be due by the Subscribers to this Society, and that, during the last year especially, so very small a portion have placed their annual contributions in the hands of the Treasurer. But feeling assured that this is a circumstance not ascribable to any indifference towards the just claims of this valuable Society, they have every confidence that they have only to remind their patrons of the inconvenience experienced from this neglect to ensure a speedy remedy of every cause of complaint .-When they refer to the vast amount of benefit of which the Parent Society has proved the honoured instrument, and to the good achieved even by this humble branch of that great Institution,-in being the medium through which, since its commencement 1060 copies of the Holy Scriptures, 970 of the Book of Common Prayer, and 4600 of other religious Books and Tracts, in all 6116 volumes, have been diffused,-the Committee will not for a moment allow their anticipations of future support to be damped, by the pressure of any present difficulty, or of any temporary discouragement.

Again they commit their cause to the gracious keeping of Him "from whom all holy desires, all good counsels, and all just works do proceed."

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NEWCASTLE DISTRICT SOCIETY

FOR THE SUPPORT OF A

TRAVELLING MISSIONARY.

AT a Meeting of the Newcastle District Committee of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, held at the Court House, Cobourg, on the 16th Sept. 1835, the friends of that Institution, after the proper business of the day was concluded, resolved to associate with the good work in which they were engaged some means for the alleviation of the spiritual destitution of the District, by the employment of Missionaries of the Church of England, in imitation of the plan which had been so successfully pursued in the Home District.—The following Resolutions were accordingly agreed to, and a subscription list was opened on the spot:—

"1. That Christians, when animated by the genuine principles of their religion, esteem it a privilege as well as a duty, to promote the temporal, and especially the eternal welfare of their brethren in the world; and that all institutions, having for their object the spread of the truth as it is revealed in the Gospel, possess an irresistible claim upon their benevolent aid and exertions.

"2. That the many Protestant families throughout the District of Newcastle, who from remoteness of situation, have no access to the regular ministrations of the word and ordinances, render highly expedient the appointment of a Travelling Missionary for the District of Newcastle, to be employed in disposing the services and consolations of the Gospel amongst the remote and unprovided settlers thereof."

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It was not, however, until the month of September, 1836, that the Lord Bishop of Quebec had it in his power to meet the views of this Association, by appointing a Minister to this important charge. At this period, the Rev. C. T. Wade, having auspiciously arrived in the country, offered his services to the Lord Bishop, and was recommended to undertake the duty of Travelling Missionary in this District,-his Lordship having kindly undertaken to furnish from funds at his disposal one half of the amount of his stipulated salary. The Committee readily entered into an engagement with this reverend gentleman, and he accordingly commenced his itinerant labours on the 1st October, 1836,-which he pursued with great acceptance and success until the same period of the succeeding year. As the details of his Missionary labours have been published in the "Church" newspaper,-a periodical designed to be a register of Church operations in these Provinces as well as an advocate of her general principles,-it is unnecessary to recapitulate them here.

After the resignation of the Rev. C. T. Wade, the Committee were unable to procure the services of another Missionary until the 1st March, 1838, when the Rev. W. F. S. Harper, with the sanction of the Lord Bishop of Montreal, entered upon the same sphere of Missionary duty; in which he persevered with much success until the 1st November of the same year.

Tho Rev. G. C. Street, having been ordained Deacon in the month of June, 1839, by the Lord Bishop of Montreal, was appointed to the itinerant charge of this District, and entered upon its duties on the first day of the following month. He still continues actively and acceptably engaged in these duties; and the Committee are gratified and thankful to learn that the good seed which by this indefatigable Missionary is so industriously sown, promises, by the divine blessing, to spring up into an abundant harvest.
