

REPORT.

In bringing the toils and anxieties of another year to a close, the Directors of the Toronto House of Industry rejoice in being able to review the

past with pleasure and satisfaction.

Under the protection and assistance of a kind and gracious Providence, they have been enabled, notwithstanding the high price paid for wood and provisions, to relieve the squalid wretchedness, and extend the hand of mercy to upwards of 3,000 of our suffering fellow creatures who cried to them

The operations of the year have been marked with great harmony and mutual goodwill. All points of friction have been so entirely removed, that the clergy of the different churches, assisted by their lay friends, have been enabled to cooperate, in the most combined and pleasing manner, for the general good. While the Directors would present their very sincere thanks to their friends and patrons for the liberal support extended to this charity, they also feel that they may cordially congratulate you upon the vast amount of good effected. Every year's experience but deepens their conviction of the importance of the institution, and every month developes new claims upon

your benevolence, and brings increasing evidence of success. By your timely aid you have warmed the cold limbs of the feeble and destitute, who were perishing in their dreary abodes—fed the hungry—clothed the naked—healed the sick, and administered to the relief of the destitute and the dying. Without presumption, therefore, may you adopt the language of the benevolent Job and say—"When the ear heard me then it blessed me; when the eye saw me it gave witness unto me, because I delivered the poor that cried and the fatherless, and him that had none to help him. The blessings of him that was ready to perish came upon me, and I caused the widow's heart to sing for joy."

Your efforts in this work of mercy are fraught with many elements of success. The Corporation itself is based on the broadest principles of Christian benevolence, irrespective of age, sect or colour. The Government of our country, and the authorities of our city, are kindly affected towards us, and contribute largely to the support of your funds; while the courtesy, the liberality, and the kindheartedness of many of our fellow-citizens, when called upon for aid in these times of financial pressure, are really above all praise. It would afford the trustees much pleasure could they in truth say that this feeling of friendliness and liberality is universal throughout the city; but in looking over the list of subscribers, the painful

fact is forced upon their minds, that a large portion of their fellow-citizens, equally benefitted by your operations, and equally able with yourselves to assist in suppporting the poor that are thrown upon the benevolence of the charitable, contribute not a farthing to the increase of your funds.

The Directors, from their frequent visits to the different wards of the House, are happy in being able to report that the greatest amount of comfort, consistent with strict economy and the state of their funds, is afforded to all the inmates.

The Superintendent and Matron continue to discharge their arduous duties with efficiency and fidelity. The wards are kept clean, the food is of a healthy kind and sufficiently abundant. Medical aid is always administered when necessary, and the general wants of all are looked after with tenderness and solicitude.

But the benevolence of the Board is by no means confined to the inmates of the House. There are many indigent families in all parts of the city who are feebly contending against the pinching hand of poverty, who cannot, and for many good reasons should not, break their family ties, and be removed to the wards of the House. These must be looked after at their own homes; and you will be glad to learn that no less than 200 cords of wood, and 3,176 loaves of bread have been distributed to them during the year.

The Directors are anxious, as far as the interests of the poor will admit, to discourage the very common, and in too many cases, very objectionable practice of street begging-a practice as unpleasant to the industrious and worthy receiver, as it is disagreeable to the benovolent and kind hearted If all who call at your door for alms were real objects of charity, as many of them doubtless are from adverse circumstances, it would be a pleasure for the Christian to relieve their distress; but the thought that many idle impostors, destitute alike of honesty and truth, are in the habit of thus appealing to the benevolent for very unworthy purposes, is a great drawback upon that pleasure. In the operations of this institution every precaution is taken to prevent such imposition. Doubtful cases are examined into, and improper recipients struck off the lists. Let the "Industrial Farm" be at once put in successful operation, and let the citizens of Toronto contribute to the support of your funds, "every man according to his ability," and this desirable object may soon be accomplished.

The Directors cannot close this Report without expressing their deep regret at the removal from among them of one of their most active members, John Arnold, Esq., who, with much credit to himself, and satisfaction to them, has filled their chair for some time back. They trust his absence in England may only be temporary, and that they

may soon have the pleasure of seeing him return again to this city, and to his place in your Board of Directors

It will afford you pleasure to learn that in view of the great distress occasioned by the present hard times, the City Council, by an unanimous vote, have doubled their annual grant to the House of Industry, thus placing at your disposal, for the benefit of the poor, the handsome sum of £500.

Annexed you will find a detailed statement of the Treasurer's Account, as well as the Report of the Superintendent, which we trust will give entire satisfaction.
