Accident During Trial Flight Ends Brilliant Life of Noted Deuilin. Paris, June 27.—Deullin, the French aviator who, during the war was the planes, met a tragic death at Villa-coublay on May 29. Lowers Time for Two-thirds of a Mile Bicycle Event to 1.10 1-5 in Newark-Grenda Set Old Record.

Newark, N. J., June 27.—Willie Spencer, bicycle champion of America, broke the world's record for the two-thirds-of-a-mile event at the Velo-drome here.
