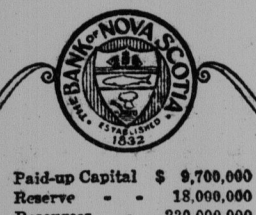




**SHARK CATCHING  
GOOD BUSINESS**

"Cod" Liver Oil One of the Products, of Which There are Many—A Coming Industry.

Victoria, B. C., May 22.—With the supply of raw materials unlimited, an industry new to this country is flourishing at "Arker Island," between Galiano and Fyne Islands on the Gulf of Georgia. It is the business of catching sharks, and a week's catch at the beginning of 'ay ran to eighty, with an average light of over a ton each. The work is carried on by the Anglo-British Canadian Company, Nelson Macdonald this city, who operated the first shark-catching machinery on the island. There will never be a shortage there are millions in the waters surrounding the island, "in fact the farther you go the more sharks you will find and from here to Alaska are there being grounds," Mr. Macdonald said, "taking them from the bottom of the sea." Norway has a hundred such industries. The only real look catching them, which works on a large scale, comes from there and the so-called cod-liver oil, which is made of the livers of the world, is really shark-oil, manufactured in Norway. Nothing is wasted in a shark plant. There is no finer fish-meat that that is taken from the bodies of the sharks. As fertilizer it is superior to any fish. The oil of the shark is full of glue of a very valuable quality and the fins are much prized Chinese food delicacy. A liver cod-liver runs from 60 to 70 percent of finest oil of which about 10 percent is glycerine. Shark's teeth are used in many parts of the world and a high price for the manufacture of ornaments. What bones there are they are few, go into the fertilizer part of the industry. The greatest interest in this new industry is being manifested in the manufacture of hides. Several American companies have been formed and excellent research work is being done at present. A Seattle company is making very rapid progress, although they have not yet arrived at a commercial paying basis. The shark hides run from an inch in thickness to the consistency of paper in the baby shark. Samples recently exhibited here to a number of local business men included soles for boots and leather for the finest "suede" shoes for women's wear. There was also a black "suede" product which would make a club bag that would last a life-time. In Seattle they are manufacturing hip-boots from shark hides and they are declared to be completely water-

"There are millions in it," he asserted, "and it is right at our back door."

**LOBSTER FISHERMEN GROWING INTERESTED IN SAVING SERVICES**

Ottawa, May 22.—The educational campaign among lobster fishermen and packers on the Atlantic coast, to secure their co-operation for the conservation of the valuable and delicious crustacean, has been fruitful of good results. Those who earn their living by the prosecution of the industry are beginning to realize that prohibitive and restrictive regulations instituted by the Department of Marine and Fisheries are not designed to make their work less profitable or their living more precarious but the reverse—to insure the future of the industry.

There is a natural tendency among all people to feel, when they are directly affected by a piece of legislation, that it is a blow at their personal liberty, and nothing less than autocratic tyranny. They neglect to take the viewpoint of the authorities, confining themselves within the compass of their own personal affairs. Future results or more sober reflection in most cases vindicates the legislation on the principle of doing the most good for the greatest number. When Andrew Hallett, naturalist of the Fisheries Branch, Ottawa, went to the east coast a few years ago to preach the gospel of lobster conservation to the fishermen, his reception was, to say the least, not warm. It took time for him to convince them that his purpose was merely to make them understand the wisdom of protecting the species, and that additional success might be achieved by their co-operation.

Each year Mr. Hallett has gone to the east coast on the same mission. This year he had as auditors more than a thousand direct interested people on Prince Edward Island, and he received a splendid hearing at the fourteen different points where he spoke, which was quite a contrast with the pioneer days of his work. The questions asked Mr. Hallett and the general discussion following each lecture were clearly indicative of a growing interest in the subject on the part of the fishermen and packers. Heedful criticism of former days is vanishing. The check on their mercantile aggressiveness gives them time to consider the future. It is drawing on them that the prohibition of the moment, is but a guarantee for the years ahead.

## STUART SCORNS PARLIAMENT OF EMPIRE NOTION

Says No Sane Man Wants to Whittle Down Autonomy of Dominions.

As the guest of the Canadian Club, Sir Campbell Stuart, K. B. E., Managing Director of The London Times, made his first address since coming to Canada, in Grant Hall, Queen's University, last week, when more than 200 persons greeted the distinguished English newspaper editor.

"Let Canada speak with all healthy diversity of voices at home," said Sir Campbell, "but when she speaks to the outer world, let her speak with one certain and united voice. Let her wear publicly the bold and true insignia of nationhood. Never before has her voice rung across the Atlantic with a greater authority than now. This is because of the part Canada played in the great war, and because she stands today in her full manhood among the nations of the world."

"There has been a great deal of foolish talk, especially about the forthcoming Imperial Conference, which has tended to obscure the realities of the Imperial situation and to sow distrust," said Sir Campbell. "I do not believe in a Parliament of Empire, and no British statesman who realizes the developments of the past few years as British statesmen do realize them will suggest that there be one. The conception of the British Empire which the British people have evolved since the war is a conception of

free commonwealth of independent nations united by ties of natural affection and of community of ideal.

"No sane man in Great Britain wants to remove or to whittle down the autonomy which Great Britain has freely recognized to be the right of the great self-governing Dominions. There is nowhere a discernible tendency toward revision of the policy which wisely recognizes those Dominions as nations, and worthy to be represented upon the League of Nations. If I thought for one moment that there were I should speak very differently, and my words would lack all that hope for the future of the British Empire with which I do not fear or scruple to charge them."

### Highest Safeguard.

"My conviction," said Sir Campbell, "is that the fullest and highest destiny of this country lies with the British Commonwealth. The war showed us that in the hour of peril the British Empire was the mightiest of all safeguards to the civilization of which it is the first exemplar. Moreover, I think we then realized that the high spirit in which Canada engaged in the war actuated the British Commonwealth in all its members. We found then that our own ideals had made the British Throne the symbol of its unity.

"Let us, therefore, base our assurance that Canada's future lies within the British Commonwealth, not upon a mere inherited loyalty, nor upon considerations of con-

If he is "kidding" the war department Charlie Step-in-the-Mud certainly has succeeded, for half a dozen veteran clerks of the quartermaster corps have been methodically searching files of the last 100 years in the hope of finding some record that Charlie ever served as an Indian scout.

Charlie wants some compensation for his century of service, now that he is retired at the age of 180, and he plaintively asks if he must "wait another 100 years," which rather indicates that his financial difficulties are not very pressing.

"First, you will have to excuse my writing as I only learned to write after I was 100 years old. I am now 180. I am an Ojibwa and Seneca Indian the reason of me writing to you is this. "My first service was with Gen. Jackson at New Orleans. Being the British Redcoats then scouting in Middle West after Bad Indians. I was with Gen. Scott in the Old Mexican War then scouting in the Plains. I was with A. J. Smith thru the civil war then back West on the Plains, and Rocky mountains after Bad Indians. I went to Cuba with Col. Roosevelt as a scout with them Knif Riders and done my part to help whip the Spanish.

"Roosevelt did not get me my transportation home so I had to go and work in cane fields and sugar mill until I could get enough to build me a good light canoe in which I can back to the Mississippi River and up to St. Louis and on up the Missouri River to great Falls Montana where I procured two horses and came over to this place to my old time white Friends House where I stay most of the time his great grandfather and I were boys together.

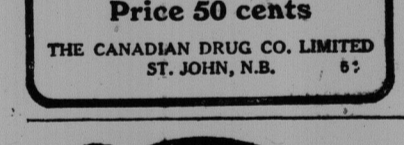

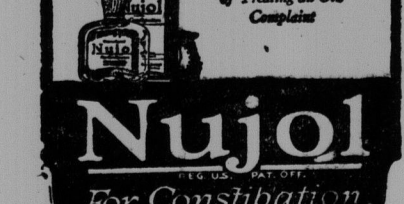

## EXPLORING WEALTH OF THE NORTH COUNTRY

Edmonton, Alta., May 28.—A new scheme for the "trapping" of the northern mineral country has been evolved by an American syndicate known as the Mackenzie Basin Exploration and Exploitation company of Boise, Idaho. A representative of the company here has arranged for the sending of independent prospectors into districts with which they are familiar. In this city the new company expect to get first-hand information regarding the hidden wealth of the north country. The organizers of the concern are old-time prospectors. The prospectors will not include in any "heavy" tools and will not be burdened with a quantity of useless gear. They will travel alone, with canoes or packs and are equipped with just what is necessary to carry them through.

The general idea, however, as the present year is concerned, is to explore and obtain data, but development work is expected to commence next year, if some of the prospects "pan out" as they are expected to do.

**HINDENBURG IS STILL AN IDOL**

Loudly Cheered at Funeral of Ex-Empress While German Princes Passed Almost Unnoticed.

Potsdam, Germany, May 6.—(Associated Press, By Mail)—The affection and admiration which German people still entertain for Field Marshal Von Hindenburg was manifested by the throngs who gathered to attend the funeral of the Empress Augusta, Victoria.

The German princes passed virtually unnoticed through the crowds but wherever the popular field marshal went there was a murmur of admiration which frequently swelled into prolonged applause. Even the Communists, who could be distinguished by their remarks, were silent before Von Hindenburg, although they spoke loudly about "tin soldiers" as other high officers passed. There was an amusing incident when he arrived before Wildpark station, where the services for the princes were held. As he descended somewhat heavily

from an automobile, the great string of medals about his neck was disarranged. A silk-hatted, white-whiskered man and a policeman rushed to rearrange them and met head-on. The silk hat was dislodged and rolled upon the pavement, and the policeman, stood in a daze. In the meantime half a dozen officers in full dress of generals had gathered about the "old man of the Masurian lakes" and carefully arranged the medals, while others helped the field marshal put on his high, tasseled cap, which he had

been unable to wear in the confines of his car. When Von Hindenburg appeared at the station to depart, the streets for many squares were packed with excited crowds which raised a tumultuous cheer and again and again, until the train was out of sight, the "books" resounded from thousands of throats. A short time previous, Prince August appeared on the station platform, and was received with a few lifted hats, but without cheers.

Cover and bake one and a half hours in a slow oven. Bring to table in the dish in which it has been cooked. In only two other provinces were awards made, chiefly due to the absence of originality. In Nova Scotia Miss Lillian M. Smith, aged 18 years, Yarmouth, captured the prize. Her recipe for "Soused or Pickled Mackerel" follows: "Clean a two-pound fresh mackerel by wiping with a damp cloth. Cut in four or six pieces and put in baking dish. Sprinkle with salt and pickling spice. Pour vinegar and water over mackerel (there should be enough to cover). Cover and let simmer for three-quarters of an hour. Can be served hot or cold, but it is better served cold. This will keep for several days in the pickle. (If desired salt mackerel or herring may be used, but omit salt in recipe). In Ontario the prize-winning recipe was submitted by Miss Kathleen Baker, aged 15 years, Kingston. Her method of preparing "Pan Broiled Pickled" is: "Clean a pickled well and wash thoroughly. Dry with clean white cloth. Have drippings and a little butter (or butter alone, if it can be afforded) well-heated in frying pan. Dip pieces of fish in milk, sprinkle with salt and pepper then roll in flour. Lastly roll it in bread crumbs. Put in grease and fry to a golden brown. Serve hot."

**POSTING THE RATE**

Impressive Ceremony Carried Out When Change is Made at Bank of England.

London, May 7.—(Associated Press, By Mail)—Announcement of a change in the rate of discount of the Bank of England, such as the recent reduction from seven to six and one-half per cent, is an impressive affair. Not one of the many hundreds of the staff of the Bank of England itself knows of the change until the actual announcement is posted, except those with the governor inside "the parlor," where the directors of the bank and prominent men of other banks and institutions are

gathered to deliberate on the momentous decision which affects all parts of the world. When these deliberations are concluded by a gorgeously attired messenger commonly known in the city as the "bank canary" because of his scarlet coat and yellow waistcoat, stalks out of the parlor with deliberate slowness in accordance with ancient custom, carrying a big sheet of paper in a glass frame on which are the magic words, "6 1/2 per cent." Hundreds of bankers' clerks messengers and newspaper men who have been thronging the passages push forward to read the notice, which the messenger deliberately keeps face away from the crowd until he has affixed it to the wall. Then there is a scramble for offices, telegraph, telephone booths and cable offices while press agency representatives wigwag the new rate, which is immediately flashed throughout the world.

**PRIZE-WINNING FISH RECIPES ARE ANNOUNCED**

Vancouver Girl Wins General Prize With Her Recipe for "West Coast Oven Fish."

Ottawa, May 28.—Prizes have recently been awarded in the fish recipe contest instituted last year by the Department of Marine and Fisheries. The contributions from all parts of the Dominion were given expert consideration by Miss Bessie M. Philip, head of the School of Household Science, Macdonald College, Ste. Anne de Bellevue, Quebec. Unfortunately a large number of the recipes submitted had to be set aside because they lacked the most important feature—originality, and were apparently culled from standard books on cookery. Next to originality, economy of preparation and attractiveness of flavour and appearance were the standards by which the judges were guided. A twenty-five dollar prize was offered in each province and an additional twenty-five dollars for the best recipe in all of Canada. Miss Muriel F. K. Osborne, age 15 years, Vancouver, B. C., in addition to winning the prize for British Columbia, won the general award. Her recipe for "West Coast Oven Fish" is herewith reproduced with the suggestion that housewives try it and decide for themselves if the commendation of the judges was well deserved. "Take 1 small fresh codfish, skin, cut in pieces and dry with cloth, dip in flour, fry till pale brown. Take 8 medium-sized onions and six small potatoes, peel and slice thin. Line casserole with part of the potatoes and onions, sprinkle with salt, pepper and flour, a small quantity of finely chopped parsley, then put in layer of fish. Repeat alternately, putting potatoes and onions last. On top place two thick slices of fat, salt pork or bacon, and barely fill dish with water.

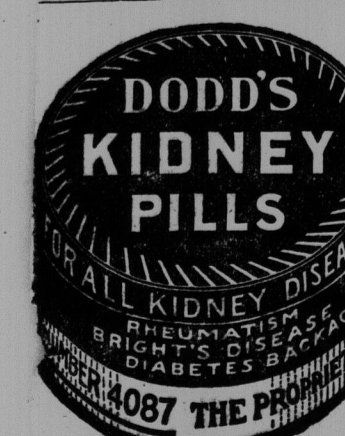

### THE NEED OF CANADA TODAY'S CAPITAL

(Toronto Globe)

A banker said yesterday that with the present upward tendency of sterling it should not be long before British money was being offered to Canada for investment on a generous scale. The uncertainty as to when sterling will reach the point of temptation for the Old Countryman remains the unsolved angle. In his estimation, if sterling advances another twenty cents or so in Canada - it was above \$4.46 yesterday - there would be an object in remitting to this country, and the same movement would tend to reduce the premium on New York funds. It should be borne in mind, however, that the great sums of American money still lie in Canada awaiting a more favorable exchange rate, and which will pour back to cross United States and operate to prevent any great reduction in the premium on New York funds for some time to come. Another banker said he had orders to buy funds for an American enterprise having a large balance here, but the rate had dropped to 10 per cent. That is probably typical of other concerns, though different companies would have a different level at which they would buy exchange.

## BOURBONS TRY TO REGAIN CHATEAU

Was Sequestered by French Gov't During War.

Owner was Serving in Austrian Army, but Brothers Served With Belgians—Their Bravery Cited.

Paris, May 10.—(Associated Press by mail)—Efforts by two princes of the House of Bourbon-Parma to recover possession of the celebrated Chateau de Chambard, which was sequestered by the French government during the war is one of the most interesting aftermaths of the great conflict.

The Chateau is more than 400 years old and is one of the most striking and interesting of the famous feudal establishments of ancient France. It was once one of the most important of the valley of the Loire close to the town of Blois and has about 15,000 acres, part of which is enclosed by walls extending for twenty miles. The building is about 200 feet square with famous circular towers at the corners and a double spiral staircase leading to the double lantern, which dominates the centre tower.

It was built about 1528 and for two centuries was a royal residence. Louis XV gave it to Marshal Saxe and Napoleon presented it to Marshal Berthier. Eventually it fell into the possession of the Duke of Parma.

At the beginning of the war it was owned by Prince Elias of Bourbon-Parma and was sequestered because he was serving in the Austrian army as an attaché of the Austrian general staff. Prince Elias is a brother of Zita, wife of the former Emperor Charles of Austria-Hungary, who lately attempted to regain his throne as king of Hungary.

### ANNUITY OF \$5,000 FOR THE PREMIER

#### Nova Scotia's Tribute to the Hon. G. H. Murray for Long Service.

(Halifax Chronicle, Monday.)  
"God bless Mr. Murray and make him well." This was the prayer of a little child recited every night by her bedside for the Premier of Nova Scotia. And as it seemed last night it was the prayer of every man and woman in Nova Scotia expressed through their representatives in parliament, when the members of the House of Assembly were speaking on the resolution congratulating Hon. George H. Murray on approaching the twenty-fifth anniversary of his premiership, the longest tenure of office of any man as premier in the history of the British Empire.

The resolution was moved by R. H. Graham, member for Pictou County. It was seconded on behalf of the opposition by D. C. MacKenzie, member for Cumberland. Those speaking to the motion were J. B. Douglas, member for Halifax; Hon. R. M. MacGregor, member for Pictou; C. W. Anderson, member for Guysboro; Hon. E. H. Armstrong, minister of works and mines; Howard Corning, Conservative member for Yarmouth; Mr. Macgillivray, member for Antigonish; and Hon. R. E. Finn, member for Halifax.

Following the passing of the resolution the acting leader of the government, Hon. E. H. Armstrong, introduced a bill providing for a retiring allowance of \$5,000 annually, which is the continuation of the salary which Mr. Murray has received as premier. This annuity is to come into force if and when Mr. Murray has retired. When the bill was introduced Mr. Armstrong amid loud applause of the House, expressed the fervent hope that it would be a long time before that retiring allowance would be made applicable and that Mr. Murray would return to his native province replete in health and prepared to continue long as her premier.

Whereas the Honorable George H. Murray, a member of this House, has continuously held the office of premier of the province of Nova Scotia since the 20th day of July, 1896;

Whereas such long, continuous public service in the highest office in the gift of a free people constitutes a unique record under British representative institutions, and

Whereas in the opinion of the House it is desirable that event unattended in the history of the nations which constitute the British Commonwealth should be recorded in its journals.

Therefore resolved that this House of Assembly in session assembled, in recognition of the lengthy, untiring and unselfish public service of Hon. George H. Murray to the people of Nova Scotia place on record its unanimous expression of warmest congratulations to him.

Further resolved that Mr. Murray has learned with deep regret of the illness of Hon. George H. Murray and it expresses the hope that he will speedily recover his health and be spared to enjoy many more years of active, happy and vigorous life.

A GLIMPSE OF THE WEALTH OF CANADA  
Total Value of Field Crops of Dominion Exceeds \$1,812,000,000.  
A table given in the report of the dominion minister of agriculture for the year ending March 31, 1920, places the value of the field crops in that year at \$1,812,000,000, and the value of dairy products at \$247,581,202. The number of horses in the country is given at 6,687,869, the number of milch cows at 74,068,221, the number of sheep at 5,826,574, sheep at 5,826,574 and swine at 8,040,070. Except in swine these numbers are slightly over those given in the previous year and swine are quoted as more numerous than in 1915, 1916, and 1917.

CRAP GAME

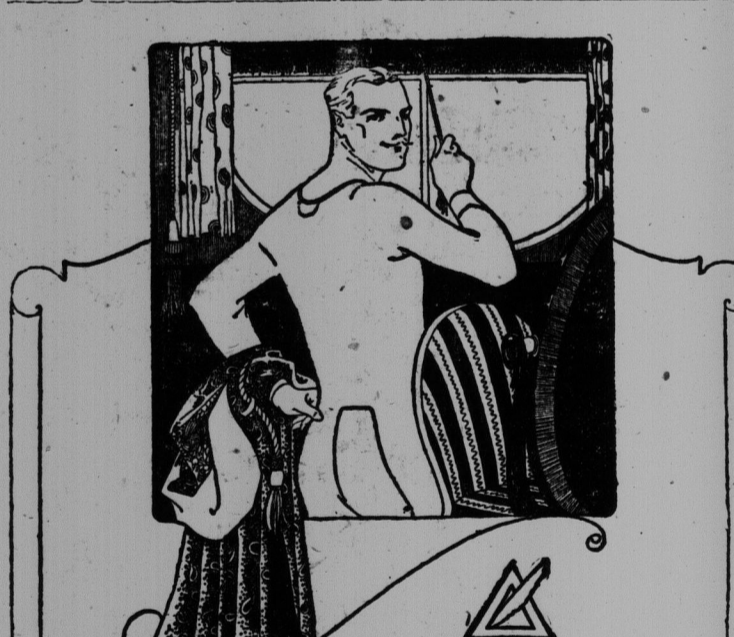
