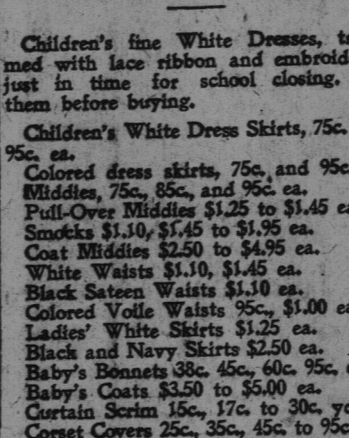

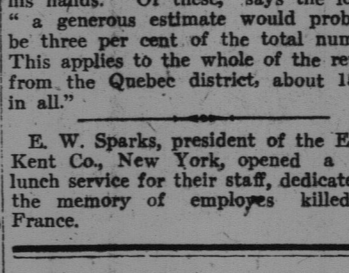

FRENCH DEMOBILIZATION NOW TO BE RUSHED

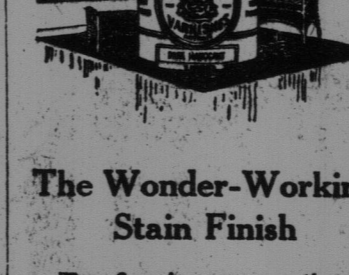

COCCHI SAYS WIFE KILLED RUTH CRUEGER

In Italian Court Is Fighting For Acquittal

Says Woman Struck Girl on Back of Head in His Bicycle Shop in New York—Comment by President of Court

Bologna, June 24.—(By the Associated Press).—Fighting for acquittal, Alfred Cocchi, charged with the murder of Ruth Crueger in New York in 1917, presented to the court and jury a vivid description of the killing of the girl. He contended that his wife was the guilty one. He explained that he made his former confession for her protection, but declared that now she had abandoned him, he would tell the truth.

Cocchi related the incident in his bicycle shop, and then came to the denial that he was guilty. He said: "I was talking to the signorina. My wife struck her on the back of the head with one of my tools. It was not I who struck the fatal blow; it was my wife. I hid the body to protect my wife."
To this, Signor Bagagli, president of the court, retorted: "But the American tribunals have exonerated your wife and found her innocent. It is impossible for anyone to call her innocent. Nobody could have an opinion on the affair unless he were there to see it."

The president then declared that Cocchi had not been moved by altruistic motives in his actions, and said: "Cocchi, if you wanted to do the right thing you would have protected the children who bear your name. You were their breadwinner. If your wife was guilty you might have let her suffer, and protected your children."

Bologna, June 25.—The trial of Alfred Cocchi, charged with the murder of Ruth Crueger in New York in 1917, has been interrupted for an indefinite period to enable the court to examine the papers of the inquiry in the case of Cocchi's wife by a New York grand jury.

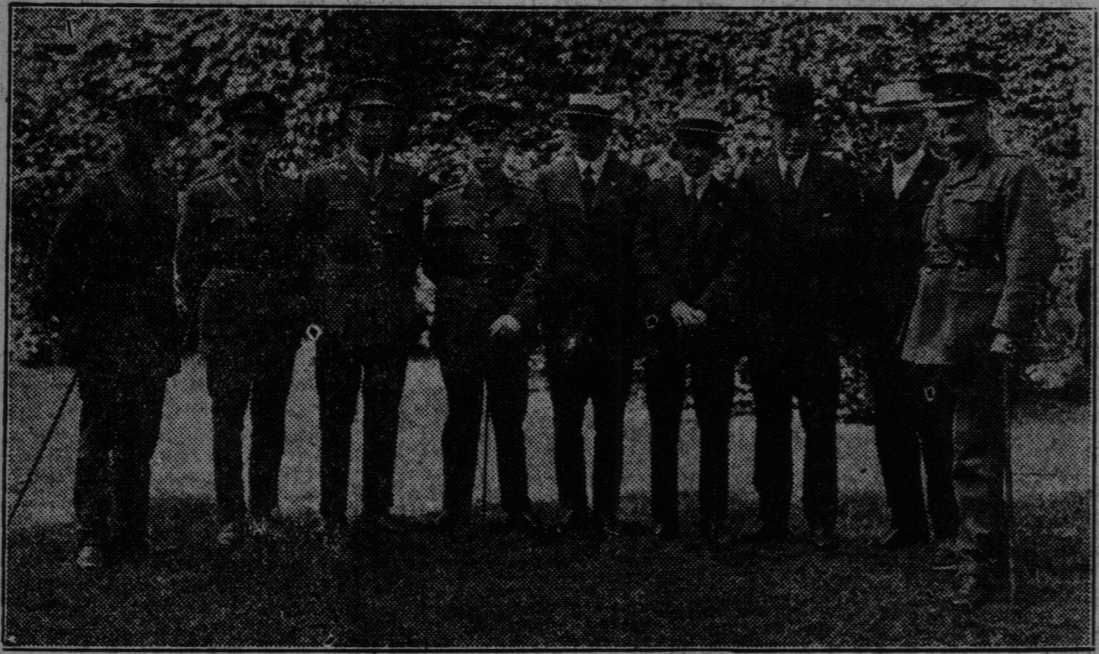

TO RECOMMEND PERMANENT CANADIAN TRADE BOARD

Policy of Cost of Living Committee to Provide Safeguard Against Inflated Prices; Limitation of Profits to Reduce Tariff Suggested

Ottawa, June 24.—One of the recommendations which the cost of living committee will make to parliament as a result of the investigation which it has been carrying on since the first meeting on June 5, it is now apparent, is that a trade commission or board of commerce shall be appointed as a permanent investigating committee. Proposals have been made by various witnesses that either business courts or such a commission should be formed with powers to deal with trade matters similar to those exercised by the dominion board of railway commissioners.

It is probable, however, that the committee will not recommend the granting of such extensive powers leading that it would be better to form an administrative body which would investigate any trade conditions brought to its notice or which the minister of trade and commerce may desire to have investigated and make its report to the minister later with recommendations. These recommendations it would not enforce itself leaving the enforcement to the attorney-general of the various provinces, to the courts and to the minister himself.

Other Functions. It might possibly supersede the paper control tribunal and other special temporary bodies of the kind and any body of thought that the price and paper committees were charged with much for paper could secure an investigation. Some members of the committee are fighting also to have the committee make recommendation that profits should be limited to a certain fixed reasonable percentage, anything exceeding, this amount to go to the government.

On Higher Level. It is also urged that the committee should make it plain in its report that prices are now on a permanently higher level than in 1914 and that manufacturers, wholesalers, retailers, consumers, employers and employees together must at once take that fact into account. Many of the witnesses called before the committee have stated at once unhesitatingly, when asked if they expected that prices would go back, that they did not see how they could. It is not only that

that the capital was two millions. I stated that the returns were \$222,214 for the year ending March, 1919. I asked you if that represented 20.10 per cent. You acquiesced. As a matter of fact your capital was \$800,000 and your earnings 61 per cent. That was a little misleading and I don't like it."

Then Mr. Stevens stated that what was impressing itself on his mind every day was that some companies started with a certain capital, after a few years they found that they had made high profits, they capitalized these profits and figured that they must be allowed by the public profits on both their capitalization and their accumulated profits. "This country is going on with a system of financing," he said, "which can't continue. We are getting to the apex. Something has got to be done. The country can't bear it. These things ought to be frankly faced by this committee."

Mr. McLean stated that his company's business was done on an 1-2-5 per cent on the turnover, over a quarter of cent per pound.

Mr. Stevens—"That's the story we get from everybody."

Mr. Davis remarked that this firm had been owned by taxation and compelling him to let his property out in lots at a price in business for nineteen years and now they had got twenty times the original capital.

He drew from the witness that since the \$150,000 had been subscribed, new capital had been put in to the extent of \$200,000.

Mr. McLean urged that the packing houses were entitled to the gratitude of the public instead of abuse. On 100,000,000 pounds of frozen meat one year the profit was only one-quarter of a cent per pound. He thought that was very little for the consumer to pay.

"Yes," said Mr. Davis, "but he's getting it from all angles."

Coming back to the practice of capitalizing profits Mr. Stevens said:

"Where are we going to end with this system of financing? When you make an earning you pay a dividend on capital and accumulated capital. The reserve you say is kept for a rainy day, then it is capitalized, and then a still larger contingency account is created to protect the capital. All you have to do every five years is to reorganize and recapitalize. There should be a line drawn somewhere."

Mr. McLean declared that there was no difference between putting profits back into a business and getting in new money. The profits would be invested somewhere.

Mr. Stevens proceeded to question the witness as to his ideas on this point when J. W. Nesbitt broke in with the remark:

"I don't agree with Mr. Stevens at all. This is for the committee to argue out." He added: "I take off my hat to any institution which can make a profit."

SAYS PRODUCE PRICES WILL CONTINUE HIGH. Canadian Stocks of Food Products Relatively Low—Ready Market for All Products. (Bank of Commerce Circular.) Weather conditions up to the present time are such as to warrant the expectation of good crops. Over 30,000,000 acres in the Canadian West are seeded to cereals, and the usual acreage will be under crop in other parts of the Dominion. The country is officially assured that a ready market will be available for food-stuffs, providing the grade is kept up. Europe will take all that can be sent there for a long time to come and the transportation difficulty which has hitherto been a hindrance has been given special attention by the Canadian Commission. So long as this demand from abroad exists high prices will be the rule, and consumers at home will necessarily have to buy in competition with foreign purchasers.

Restrictions as to movements of food stuffs are being steadily eliminated. With the provision of additional shipping and the opening of European markets for ordinary business transactions, the distribution of food products must gradually get back to a normal basis. While prices for food products are likely to remain much above pre-war levels, it is not improbable in view of the promising condition of the cereal and fodder crops that there may be some recession from the present abnormally high prices. Canadian stocks of food products are relatively low, while those abroad are reported as being considerable, and the steady increase of shipping will naturally bring products to the cen-

Fielding Strengthens Chances As the Next Liberal Leader

Political Gossip at Ottawa; Talk of Increased Indemnity; The Senate and Prohibition

(Special Correspondence of The Times.) Ottawa, June 24.—There has been practically nothing in parliament for the last two or three weeks but budget. The tariff never got near the table, and before everybody now knows what everybody else thinks about it, and the manufacturers and farmers in the House have freely expressed their opinion about each other. It got down to personalities in some instances, and in others to personal attractiveness and personality. As the mummy of Ramses the First began to put on his old robes, and the mummy of Hansard began to put on his old robes, the farmers were escaping the income tax, he provoked a farmer representative to making some reference to manufacturers who make millions out of book contracts. If he had really desired to hit Sir Herbert hard he might have said something about the War Saving Stamps campaign which he has been conducting, and which has proved to be a complete fiasco. At its present rate of progress it will take well on to fifty years to sell the stamps, as fifty millions have been issued and only about a million sold.

Mr. Omer resigned and attacked the tariff, it was thought there might be a possibility of such a general disintegration as would be dangerous to the government. But there never was much fear of that, because the Opposition would have headed it off if they had to support the government in a body. They want to see the government defeated, but in their own good time, after they have chosen a permanent leader, and their party arrayed behind them as solidly as may be.

The government was never in any great danger, however. By one or another, quite a number of the western men were won back to their allegiance, and it was an interesting thing seeing and hearing them try to convince themselves that they were doing what was in the best interests of their constituents and of Canada in voting contrary to the way they were expected to vote, and in many instances, to the way they had promised to vote. One of the most surprising incidents was when Mr. Handers, leader of the Manitoba Grain Growers, who for years has been preaching free trade, voted for the budget.

about reciprocity was that there was "an agreement," which only gave an opening to a quick fence like the little grey man from Nova Scotia, and he proceeded to show up the inconsistent position of the leader of the eighteen varieties of Toronto Liberals while the Opposition applauded uproariously.

There was a good deal of doubt as to the attitude Fielding would adopt on the tariff, some people thinking he would support the government, and as a matter of fact he had decided to say little or nothing on it, but, during his absence from the House in the afternoon Sir Thomas White made some reference to reciprocity which was more than the farmer of that measure could stand, and he came in the evening with blood in his eye. He has greatly strengthened his chances to be chosen as Liberal leader at the August convention.

The vote on the budget showed a total defection from the ranks of the government of only fourteen, including Fielding and Pardee; while two members of the opposition voted with the government.

If the grain growers had what so many of them advocate—the repeal in politics—there is no doubt that a good many members would have their marching orders by this time, but they know they are safe for this parliament. Meanwhile, the grain growers of Saskatchewan are actively organizing and believe they will yet show their strength to the country. They are putting candidates in every constituency and are apparently out for a straight farmers' party.

There is, notwithstanding recent events, a good deal more independence in the House than formerly, and its tendency is to grow. It is quite probable that we may see hereafter a very strong independent party with the farmers as its nucleus, but attracting to itself those men of independent views who are to be found in both parties. This spirit of independence is partly due to the fact that patronage has been practically abolished, and the government has no longer a club to hold over the head of a recalcitrant member. There are a few members who regret the passing of patronage but taking them as a whole, they are glad to be rid of it. It gives a great deal more time to devote to the work of the country.

The work of parliament seems very badly planned. At the first of the present session, and indeed until the last few weeks, time was absolutely wasted. The House sat in the afternoon from 3 until 6, and again in the evening from 8 until 11, or longer. There was no sitting on Wednesday evenings or on Saturday. Recently it has been sitting mornings as well as including Saturdays. The majority of the members are on one committee or another, so that they have far too little time to study and digest the legislation brought before the House. The cost of living committee, for example, has been sitting morning, noon and night on Saturdays. The members who take his work seriously, and is assigned to committees of importance, has certainly no map at Ottawa, and earns all the indignity he gets.

There has been a good deal of talk of increasing the indemnity this session, and the government would do it if they dared, but it is never a popular move in the country. As practically all the perquisites, except the salary, are taken off, to the majority of the members the indemnity is no attraction. They must lose a great deal more by the enforced absence from business, particularly those who live some distance from Ottawa. If there is a short fall session, as seems probable, it will be another indignity coming to them this year, which will help. Twenty-five hundred dollars a year is a fair allowance for those who come to Ottawa, and Ottawa is a particularly expensive place to live.

The senate is not very often heard from until towards the close of the session, as we are heading now when it begins to come into prominence. This session it has been very busy with divorce cases—one of the after-effects of war. There is a tradition that listening to tales of domestic infelicity—and worse—is one of the attractions of a senatorship, but that is a libel. The senate must become weary of it. The matter will be tested, because there is now a bill before parliament granting each province its own divorce court, something which already obtains in the maritime provinces and British Columbia. Divorce before the senate is an expensive thing, with witnesses to be brought and kept in Ottawa; and there is no reason

why the provinces should not all handle their own divorce. If the senators do not resist listening to divorce proceedings, here is their chance to get rid of the work.

The senate did one thing this session which was very popular with some people, and very unpopular with others. The house passed up to it a bill which embodied the order-in-council prohibiting the importation, manufacture and transportation of intoxicating liquors during the war and for twelve months thereafter. The senate amended this so that the prohibition ceases immediately on the conclusion of peace. It must not be supposed that the senate in doing this is any less virtuous or any more courageous than the house. If the members were allowed to express their opinions without any danger of a "come-back" in the country, it is well known around parliament that a majority of them would not vote in favor of prohibition; their "convictions" are regulated largely by fear of the prohibition vote; and if the senators were responsible to popular vote, it would not be any more courageous. The vote recorded in the senate is well known to be the true expression of the feeling around parliament.

PROROGATION IS FIXED FOR JULY 5

Ottawa, June 24.—July 5 has been agreed upon as the date of prorogation of the House of Commons. The appointment of a board of commerce will be considered in the House on Wednesday. This will be one of the results of the report presented by the cost of living committee. The chairman is to be a judge or lawyer and the name of W. F. O'Connor has been mentioned in this connection. Another bill will provide machinery for carrying on the by-elections. This

has been more contentious and it is understood that there has been some disagreement in the cabinet regarding it. As outlined in an article recently published there is no machinery now existing for the carrying on of the elections and some special legislation will be introduced for this specific purpose. Messrs. The clause increasing the size of the permanent military force in Canada from five to ten thousand was carried on a division of fifty-six to thirty-four. Strong support of the measure came from R. L. Richardson, General Griesbach, W. F. Cockshutt, H. A. McKie, G. W. Allen, and others, while Messrs. Cressal, Nickle, Clark and Johnston, were among those who voted "nay." At a late hour the house considered the bill relating to the business war tax and the income tax.

CAPT. H. STHEM IS SERIOUSLY ILL

Officer Well Remembered in St. John in General Hospital in Kingston on Return From Siberia

Captain Herbert Stthem of the Royal Canadian Dragoons, who has been on active service for some time in Siberia with the 20th Machine Gun Company, has returned to Canada and is now in the General Hospital at Kingston suffering from tuberculosis contracted while on service in Russia, also from heart trouble due to concussion while on service in France.

His condition is reported as very serious at present, but the military authorities are giving him every possible care and attention and it is hoped that in time he will regain his health.

Captain Stthem is well known to the people of St. John. He conducted a cavalry school in this city in the spring and summer of 1914.

He served in France with the cavalry in 1914 and 1915, was wounded and invalided to Canada. In February, 1916 he was appointed to the staff of the New Brunswick troops and held the appointment of general staff officer until November 1918, when he rejoined the R. C. D. He was one of the original officers who organized the present Military District No. 7.

REORGANIZATION OF 3RD REGT. ARTILLERY

A reorganization of the 3rd Regiment C. G. A. is to be made in the near future. As soon as the army becomes more clear of troops and space provided the idea is to begin the work of placing the unit on a firm militia basis. Not only for drill purposes but with the idea of having a clubroom where the old associations formed during the war may be kept alive, special rooms are to be fitted up for messes for the N. C. O.'s and gunners.

A recommendation has been forwarded to Ottawa through local headquarters that the post of adjutant of the unit be given to Capt. E. M. Slader and it is expected that the recommendation will be approved.

Captain Slader was a former member of the unit. He crossed with Major Magee's battery in 1914 and went to France in February, 1915, with the 1st D. A. C. with sergeant-major's rank. He won his commission in March, 1916, and went to the 1st Heavies where he served for twenty-two months. In March, 1918, he got his captaincy and went to the 4th Siege, with which he was serving at the close. He is well fitted for the new post, which under the proposed organization will be permanent.

SOLDIERS' AND SAILORS' LABOR LEAGUE FOR WINNIPEG PROPOSED

Winnipeg, June 25—Plans for the organization of a soldiers' and sailors' labor league in Winnipeg are being drawn up by a soldiers' committee here.

VETERAN SOLDIER HAS PASSED AWAY

T. M. Wisted Fought in Crimea and in the Indian Mutiny

Thomas M. Wisted, an old and highly esteemed resident, passed away at 6:45 o'clock this morning at his home, 142 St. Patrick street, after an illness of two weeks. Up to the time of his death he was bright and cheerful and even to the

last, when the spark of life gradually died out he conversed with his relatives about the happenings of the day and reminiscences of those gone by. He was born in Tipperary, Ireland, in 1836 and thirty-seven years later came to Canada and since that time resided here.

His Military Career

Mr. Wisted joined the 73rd regiment in Dublin, Ireland, and after serving in home stations for a while, volunteered with the 97th, the "Earl of Ulster's Regiment" under command of Col. R. H. Hancock, an Irish peer, for foreign service when the Crimean War broke out. The regiment was at Windsor Castle before leaving for the Crimea in May, 1854, sailing from Southampton, at Malta the orders were countermanded and the regiment sent to Greece, then under the protection of England, to guard King Otto against an insurrection in that country. They remained in Greece until November when they were drafted to the Crimea.

The 97th was active in the siege of Sebastopol, which lasted for eleven months against the British and French troops until Sept. 8, 1855, when it fell. The beleaguering troops suffered much hardship, sleeping in bell tents in severe winter and at times being compelled to eat their dead rations. In the following May the 97th was relieved, and, returning to England, escaped at Aldershot.

Mr. Wisted sailed with it from Portsmouth on August 8, 1857, and was present at the siege of Lucknow which fell in March, 1858. The 97th took part in one of the longest marches in history while engaged in this campaign, doing 1360 miles in three months, putting to flight any rebels among the natives and clearing the country of the mutinous natives. The massacre of Cawnpore was followed by a great pouring of British troops and the rebellion was suppressed.

After the Indian campaign Mr. Wisted returned to Dublin and received his discharge. In 1873 he sailed with many of his countrymen for America and settling in St. John, has since resided here.

His Family

He is survived by his wife and one daughter, Mrs. Joseph W. Nichol, with also two grandchildren, Mrs. Melville T. and J. Beverley Nichol. John M. Elmore is a nephew.

PLAYED BALL HERE FORTY YEARS AGO

Among the hundreds who enjoyed the exciting game of ball on the south end diamond last evening between the Pirates and All-Stars, the latter made up of seasoned players not lately in the game, was Percy Olive of Boston, who was first baseman for the Imperials, forty years ago. Mr. Olive is now a successful commercial photographer in Boston and still looks fit to play the old game. He and his brother Frank, who is an enthusiastic member of the South End Improvement League, strolled down to the field last evening and indulged in reminiscences. They recalled a great game between the Imperials and Nationals in 1880 on the Barre Square, which was won by the former. In those days the city almost made holiday when these teams met. The late LeBaron Thompson was the star batter for the Imperials, making long hits of the home run variety. The players wore no mitts, and Frank Olive said he had seen a catcher after a game with his hands so swollen that he could not close the fingers. Percy Olive was one of the earliest players of the modern game here. He remarked last evening that the city should become responsible for providing playgrounds for the people.

CONDITIONS IMPROVING AND PREPARATIONS CONTINUE FOR HANDLEY-PAGE FLIGHT

St. John's, Nfld., June 24—Doubt as to whether mid-ocean weather would permit him to hop-off tomorrow for a trans-Atlantic flight in his Handley-Page biplane was expressed tonight by Vice-Admiral Mark Kerr before he returned to his airframe at Harbor Grace after a visit to this city. He added, however, he had received reports indicating that conditions were improving across the Atlantic.
