A BISHOP'S WORDS ON RECIPROCITY

Speaking of the reciprocity agreement in his charge to the Anglican Synod of Kingston, Bishop Mills said:
"Whether it would be in general the interests of the country is a question for debate, and about which different opinions may be held. But politicians have not devoted their attention so much to the discussion of this question as in ringing charges on the cry that if reciprocity were adopted it would be the first step towards annexation; that the United States would be buying us, and we would be selling ourselves. I THINK THAT IS THE GREAT-EST NONSENSE THAT EVER CAME FROM THE MOUTHS OF SUPPOSEDLY SANE MEN. AS A CANADIAN, I RESENT IT. I would think little of my loyalty to the British Crown and the British Empire if it depended on tariff schedules. Those who think the national spirit of Canada is such a poor and uncertain thing that her existence as a nation would be imperilled by an thing that her existence as a nation would be imperilled by an increase of trade with the United states certainly do not know

Cobalt, Ont., Aug. 12—For one week armed med men have been lying in ambush along the Gowganda road, threatening to sknot down all strikebreakers who tenture to go into the Hudson Bay camp at Hanging Stone Lake, Last week an armed posse held up the stage, fired twenty shots in the air and drove the strikes back into Elk Lake, where they are still.

HOW RECIPROCITY WILL AFFECT THE PRICES

Good for Consumer and Buyer According to Report of De-partment of Labor Just Isseed

Ottawa, Aug. 11-One of the most illuminative contributions to the literature dealing with the economic aspect of the reciprocity agreement has just been issued by the labor department, and has been mailed today to every newspaper office in

It is the compendium of comparative prices in Canada and the United States for agricultural, fisheries, lumber and mines products covered by the schedules of the agreement, and to which reference was made some days ago by Hon. Mackenzie

King.

It covers 316 pages and is a veritable mine of wealth for political candidates, campaign speakers, editorial writers and all students of the vital point at issue in the discussion of the agreement, namely, as the economic effect reciprocity in natural products will have on both producers and consumers in Canada.

The comparative statistics of market prices at representative points on each side of the border, gathered from reliable daily market reports cover the past five and a half years, thus giving a true index as to the average prices.

the average prices.

Halifax, St. John and Montreal prices are compared with those of Boston and New York. Toronto with Buffalo and Detroit, and Winnipeg with Chicago, Minneapolis and Duluth.

apolis and Duluth.

In general, it may be stated that the most significant conclusions to be drawn from the voluminous and comprehensive statistics of the report are that prices received by the producers in Canada, affected by the agreement, are on the whole considerably below those received by producers in the United States, while in many instances the prices paid by the consumer in Canada are above those paid in the States.

The first conclusion bears out the argument that the farmer and the fishermen will greatly benefit from reciprocity. The second conclusion bears out the argument that the Canadian consumer is in many cases suffering from undue enhancement of prices by the middleman, a condition of affairs which reciprocity would tend to obviate and which explains the opposition of certain interests to the pact.

Comparative prices for fish indicate the immense benefit which free entry for fish into the American market will confer on the Maritime Provinces.

Halibut at Halifax averaged during the five and a half years 9.12 cents per lb., as

five and a half years 9.12 cents per lb., as compared with 14.375 cents per lb. at Boston; cod at Halifax averaged 3.62 cents per lb. as compared with 7 cents at Boston; mackerel at Halifax averaged 14.8 cents per lb. as compared with 33 cents at Boston.

Moncton, Aug. 11—Olaf Larsen, the Norwegian ex-convict, who has been terrorizing the countryside the past two or three weeks, has at last been captured. Chief Rideout took Larsen into custody near Petitodiac this afternoon and brought the desperado to Moncton, placing him in jail. Early this morning Sheriff Willett had a message from Councillor I. N. Killam, of Killam's Mills, parish of Salisbury, stating a man answering the description of Larsen had been seen in that vicinity. The sheriff gave orders to have the woods in which the bandit had concealed himself surrounded and procure men to apprehend him.

FULL TEXT OF TRADE AGREEMENT SHOWS GREAT BENEFIT TO COMMON PEOPLE

THE BARGAIN ITSELF

The proposed reciprocity agreement is very simple, and can have no possible effect except to give the Canadian producer another market for his goods, and to create for the workingman a greater demand for his labor.

The arrangement is merely a proposal to let down the tariff bars a little so as to give the ordinary people, on both sides of the line, a chance to participate more fully in the profits of their own toil.

Certain interests in Canada who find it profitable to make large investments in the United States, seem to fear that if the farmer sells more of his products to the United States than he is doing at present, and at a better price, his loyalty to the British Empire will be weakened. They would have one believe that, if under this arrangement a farmer got two hundred dollars for a horse for which he now can get but one hundred and seventy, on account of the United States duty, it would somehow weaken his patriotism.

What is all right for them is all wrong for the farmer. They tell the railway companies they will be injured as the traffic now going East and West will, under this new arrangement, go North and South, and, strange to say, at the same time they assure the farmers, particularly in the West, that the arrangement will not help them in any way, as the United States does not want to buy their products. The great mass of the people of Canada have within their reach something that every Great Canadian, during the past forty years when he has had responsibility of Government on his shoulders, has endeavered to see use for our people. ored to secure for our people.

Following is a synopsis of the agreement:



It might be noted that for years the Conservative press has said that if the United States wanted better trade relations with Canada it should reduce its tariff to an equality with the Canadian tariff. In this arrangement the United States has done this very thing, and in most instances the reductions in the United States tariff are very much greater than the reductions in the Canadian tariff.

It will also be seen that only the articles in Schedule "A" are admitted free into both countries, and in the other Schedules a reduction only is made in the duty, so that the cry of the "interests" that the arrangement is an entirely free trade one, is absolutely misleading and without foundation. It provides for the free interchange of natural products, and a reduced reciprocal tariff on a named list of other articles.

It is not a treaty but an agreement that can be terminated at any time by either party.


