# NOT SO MANY SAYS THE CHIEF

Dr. W. S. Carter Advocates Abolition of Examinations in Lower Grades.

Moncton, June 26-The 30th annual New Brunswick Teachers' Institute. which opened here yesterday, was well attended and some very interesting and instructive addresses were heard by the teachers in attendance. The speakers were Dr. W. S. Carter, superintendent of education, who was in the chair; Dr. C. C. Jones, chancellor of the U. N. B.; Dr. H. V. B. Bridges, principal of the Normal School; W. J. S. Myles, principal of the St. John High School; Prof. H. H. Hagerman and Hon. A. O. Thomas, commissioner of education for Maine.

Dr. Carter, in his address, said there were too many examinations in the lower grades, but he thought there should be tests at the end of grade 8 and grade 11. which opened here yesterday, was well

should be tests at the end of grade 8 and grade 11.

Dr. H. V. B. Bridges, of Fredericton, in his paper spoke of the idea of making the standard for teachers higher and offered the suggestion of extending the period of Normal training.

Much interest was shown in the public meeting this evening, a pleasing feature of which was an address by Hon. Augustus O. Thomas, Commissioner of Education for Maine, whose subject was "Modern Tendencies in Education."

At this morning's session the following were chosen to act as a nominating committee: W. M. Burns, Fredericton; Inspector Doucett, Bathurst; W. McL. Barker, Moncton; Alonzo R. Stiles, Riverside; Mr. Steeves, Blackville; S. A. Worrell, St. John; Miss Bernice MacNaughton, Moncton; Mrs. Brooks, Sussex; Miss Mary Alexander,

Public Meeting.

The public meeting this evening was largely attended. Dr. Carter presided. In the absence of Mayor Edgett, Deputy Mayor Camille Belliveau, extended a cordial welcome to the visitory. He eulogized the Moncton Board of School Trustees who are using 48 per cent. of the city's revenue for local educational purposes.

The secretary read a letter from the Women's Institute of Petitcodiac asking that the Institute consider an amendment to the Education Act proiding that wives of qualified voters be ligible for election as school trustee and to vote. This was received.

A letter was read from the Moncton Teachers' Association favoring holding of the Provincial Institute at Easter instead of June on the ground that teachers are too tired at the end of the term; that a change of programme at Easter would be beneficial and that teachers are better able financially to attend institute at Easter than in June. The meeting by a large majority voted in favor of the change and, on motion of Dr. Bridges, the question was referred to the executive with power to act.



WORK AT HEATH -

The last monthly report of the clinics and services of the St. John Health Centre showed records of the steady increase in the work accomplished there. At the 111 clinics held in May there were 1,308 in attendance.

The Victorian Order nurses, in their child welfare work, held 18 clinics with an attendance of 252, of whom 50 were new cases. The nurses made 324 visits to babies and 110 advisory visits.

While some pie bakers scoff at the idea of measuring flour, lard and water for the crust, the inexperienced cook finds it quite as necessary to measure her ingredients for pie as for cake.

So, for the benefit of the new cook this rule and method for a rhubarb pie is carefully worked out.

First and foremost, pastry flour should be used. Less lard is necessary to make a flaky crust and there is consequently no danger of a "lardy" taste to the pie. Half butter and half lard can be used if preferred but the amount of shortening must be doubled. The lard should be cold and firm but need not be chilled.

The water should be cold but need not be ice water.

Quick work and a light touch are two necessary ingredients for a good pie.

Rhubarb Pie.

One pound rhubarb, I to I I-2 cups sugar, I tablespoon cornstarch, I-4 taespoon salt, I cup pastry flour, 4 tablespoons lard, I scant teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons cold water.

Remove skin from rhubarb and cut in inch pieces. Mix sugar, cornstarch and salt add rhubarb and stir with a fork until rhubarb is well covered.

Mix flour and salt and rub in lard with tips of fingers. Then mixture should be much like coarse corn meal. Add one tablespoon of water at one side of the flour mixture and work into about half of it. Add the other tablespoon at the other side of the mixing bowl and work up the rest of the flour mixture. Work the two together, always rather tossing and lifting the dough than pounding or kneading it.

The meeting passed a resolution asking Dr. Doolittle to take up with Washington the matter of extending this privilege to the other provincial clubs, each club to guarantee the return of all cars to Canada.

Mr. Dykeman estimated that 95 per cent. of the people who drove cars might be educated in the matter of the use of the road. He referred particularly to the practice of drivers sticking in the ruts and not distributing the wear on the whole road.
