The Eleventh Annual Convention of the Grand Lodge Knights of Pythias of Ontario was called to order by Grand Chancellor A. J. Rattray, at eleven o'clock a.m. on the Thirteenth day of June, 1882. The Convention was held in the hall of Charity Lodge No. 20.

REPORT OF THE GRAND CHANCELLOR.

OFFICE OF THE GRAND CHANCELLOR, TORONTO, 10th June, 1883. P.P. XIX.

To the Officers and Representatives of the Grand Lodge Knights of Pythias of Ontario:

BRETHREN,—The undersigned has the honour to submit to your Grand Body, his Report as Grand Chancellor for the past year.

At the last session of the Grand Lodge, held at Toronto, June, 1881, I was chosen as your presiding officer, and have endeavoured, to the best of my ability, to forward the interests of an Order of which I feel it an honour to be a member; and beg to tender my sincere thanks to the Order generally throughout the jurisdiction, for the many kindnesses and courtesies extended to me.

During the recess I paid official visits to the lodges, and have always met with a hearty welcome. I trust that the result of these friendly visits will be of benefit to the general good of the Order.

DISTRICT DEPUTY GRAND CHANCELLORS.

Immediately on the adjournment of the Grand Lodge, I appointed, upon the recommendation of the various lodges, the following brethren as my Deputies, viz.:

These brethren have one and all discharged the various duties devolving upon them in a most able and satisfactory manner, and deserve the thanks of this Grand Lodge in seconding the efforts put forth by your Executive head for the advancement of the Order.

P. C.'s Hatch and Townsend, at considerable inconvenience to themselves, kindly rendered me valuable assistance when making official, visitations.

RULINGS AND DECISIONS.

1st. A ruling was asked through one of my Deputies as to whether a member over three months in arrears was entitled to receive benefits. My answer to this question was as follows: That, although the By-law of the Lodge provided for the space of six months before becoming in arrears, that under Article X., Section 2, of the Constitution, the member was not entitled to receive benefits, and that no By-law of subordinate Lodges could contravene the Constitution.

2nd. My approval was asked to allow Myrtle Lodge No. 2 to strike out from the By-laws of that Lodge, Section 1 of Article VIII., relating to sick benefits; also Section 1 of Article XI., regarding benefits to widows of deceased members. I answered that this could not be granted, as under the Constitution, it would be a decided infraction upon the principles of our Order.

DISPENSATIONS GRANTED.

During the year dispensations were granted by me to Ivanhoe Lodge No. 4, for the purpose of conferring ranks on a maimed person, and also to Charity Lodge No. 20, to confer the several degrees upon a candidate over fifty years of age. The monies for these and all others received by me, have been forwarded to the Grand Keeper of Records and Seal.

THE LATE SUPREME KEEPER OF RECORDS AND SEAL.

It is my said duty, in my official capacity, to inform you of the death of Bro. Joseph Dowdall, Supreme Keeper of Records and Seal, which took place on the 7th of April last. I received a circular from the Hon. G. W. Lindsay, Supreme Chancellor, dated April 15th, informing me of the loss which the Order had sustained, and in accordance with the directions contained therein, I immediately issued a communication to the different Lodges in this Province in regard to the same.

Bro. Dowdall was born in Centerville, Pa., in June, 1824; afterwards he removed to Ohio. He filled Government positions of great responsibility, both in that state and also at the seat of the Federal Government at Washington. As a member of our Order, and one who has been called upon to occupy exalted offices in the Supreme Lodge, I think it peculiarly fitting that some expression of our sympathy, as a Grand Lodge, should be forwarded to the bereaved family of our brother. Bro. Dowdall always took a most lively interest in this isolated jurisdiction, and has proved himself a

most able and efficient officer, and one whose place it will be difficult to fill. His name will live long in the memory of the members of the Order, more especially in that of those with whom he has been brought in contact from our province.

CONCLUSION.

Before closing this Report, I would inform you that both numerically and financially, the lodges throughout the jurisdiction are in a much better condition than they were one year ago. You will perceive from the Report of our Grand Keeper of Records and Seal that a large number of new members have been added, and that the funds of subordinate Lodges have correspondingly increased.

I annex hereto the Reports of the District Deputies, and feel sure that the prosperity shown by the Reports is a cause for congratulation.

The G. K. of R. S. has rendered me very valuable services in the discharge of my official duties, and I think this Grand Lodge is fortunate in retaining such an excellent officer. He has aided me in every way in furthering the interests of our beloved Order.

I would call the attention of this Grand Lodge to the fact that the Supreme Lodge of the World will meet in the City of Detroit, Mich., on Tuesday, the 22nd day of August next. I have received a very kind letter from the Committee on Reception, extending to the members in this jurisdiction a hearty welcome, should they be able to be present. I attach both letter and circular herewith.

And now I beg to ask your kind indulgence should I have committed any error in the discharge of my duties, and should I have offended any, I assure you, brethren, it was an error in judgment. Again thanking you for the many kindnesses received, and hoping that the legislation of this session may result in benefit to the Order.

DEAR SIR AND BRO.,—I herewith submit my Annual Report as D.D.G.C., for the year ending June, 1882:

The year now closing has been one of general prosperity in the case of Red Cross Lodge, and I am happy to state that the attendance of members and the interest in the work has been highly satisfactory to the officers and myself.

We had the extreme pleasure of receiving a fraternal visit from Charity Lodge, St. Catharines, last fall, which was of a very pleasing nature. The members of Red Cross repaid the visit, and, from the manner of their reception and entertainment, I have no doubt it has been the means of cementing the ties of brotherhood and of Knights closer together in the bonds of true fraternity.

I have, in common with the members of Red Cross Lodge, felt considerable disappointment that no new Lodges have been opened during the past year; and hope that the legislation in that matter, passed at last Grand Lodge, will be at once carried out.

During my term I have granted three dispensations; two for a candidate who was leaving the city, and the third for a Page to receive two ranks the same evening, he being so situated that he could only visit the lodge once a month. The cash for the above is enclosed herewith.

I would like to see some plan brought forward to reduce the per capita now levied to support Grand Lodge. Taking into consideration the fact that the Lodges have to pay the expenses of their Representatives to the Grand Lodge, salaries of officers, rent, light, etc., etc., a small lodge is so reduced in funds that it must of necessity either make constant levies on their members or surrender their charter. I need not call your attention to the many instances which have occurred during the years which have cause since Grand Lodge was organized, that can be traced to the above cause.

In conclusion, I beg to thank you for the many kindnesses shown me, and for the promptness in which all communications were answered. My task has been made a very pleasant one by the members of my own Lodge giving me their aid, counsel, and kind assistance on every occasion when required.

CONDITION OF THE ORDER.

In referring to this subject in my Report of last year, it will be seen that I did not speak of it as being in a very prosperous condition, and although, at the present time, I cannot report any great increase in the membership, yet it affords me much pleasure to be able to say that our future prospects are much brighter than they were at that time. The majority of our lodges have been adding to their numbers, and there seems to be a much more active interest taken in the work generally. We meet to day to see ourselves entering upon a second decade in the history of our Order in this Province, and I trust that every member will work, to the best of his ability, to advance its interests, and endeavour to help, as far as lay in his power, to make our future an assured success

During the past year Calanthe Lodge, of Acton, surrendered its Charter. Many of its most active members having removed to other places, it was found that there was not sufficient material in the village to warrant it to keep in existence.

Crusader Lodge of P. A. Landing, and Algoma Lodge, of Sault Ste. Marie, are still in the same position as I reported last year. I am convinced that nothing can be done regarding them, unless a personal visit is made by the G. C., or some one delegated by the G. L. to go there.

Several inquiries have been made from different localities during the year regarding our Order, but so far nothing has been done towards the institution of new Lodges. The legislation of last session towards extending the Order has been practically inoperative, from the fact that we have no member properly qualified, who has sufficient time at his disposal, to undertake the duties necessary to carry out the object you had in view.

SEMI-ANNUAL REPORTS.

I have to draw your attention to this subject once more. For some time back I have had little cause to complain, but during the past year the reports have been very late in reaching me, some of them not being received until the end of last month. If the installing officers have complied with the law, this shows that the Lodges have been working very irregularly, as they could not have the current pass-word until their installation took place; but I am inclined to the opinion that the Deputies, in some instances, must have overstepped their functions, as some of the Reports have come to me in a very round-about fashion. They should be forwarded direct to this office by the Deputy, together with the Grand Lodge assessment, and if each one will follow the instructions laid down for their guidance in the instruction form, no trouble or difficulty need be experienced.

While under this head, I desire also to draw your attention to the fact that many of the Reports are not as carefully and correctly made out as they might be. Duplicate blanks are always forwarded to each Lodge, and a correct copy should always be retained. That this is not done, or if it is,

that the copy is not referred to, is very apparent to me. I have had occasion, time and time again, either to return Reports or send corrections back to Lodges for such simple errors as mistakes in bringing forward the numerical or financial balances from one Report to the next one. A great part of the trouble arises also from too many officers having to take part in the making up of the Report, while it is only necessary for one to have anything to do with it. If the Minutes of the Lodge are correctly and properly kept, it should be a very simple matter for the K. of R. and S. to fill out the entire Report without asking for information or assistance from any one.

OBITUARY.

Within the past few months we have been called upon to mourn the death of two officers of the Supreme Lodge, Bro. Joseph Dowdall, of Columbus, Ohio, Supreme Keeper of Records and Seal, who died April 7th, and Rev. Bro. Wm. Bryce Thompson, of Nashville, Tenn., Supreme Prelate, who died April 23rd.

Bro. Dowdall was taken sick on March 14th, and his disease rapidly developed into an acute attack of what is commonly termed Bright's Disease, which, in about three weeks after, terminated fatally. By the death of Bro. Dowdall the Order loses one to whose exertions in its behalf, it owes to a great extent its present prosperity. In the dark days of 1874, when our Order was suffering through the malfeasance of the then S. K. R. S., Bro. Dowdall came forward and assumed debts amounting to several thousands of dollars, thus redeeming it from the perilous condition it was then in, and restoring its credit. He was elected S. K. R. S. at the Pittsburg Session in 1874, and has ever since been continuously re-elected. To the Order in Ontario he has been a firm friend, taking a deep interest in all our affairs, and ever ready to give us his counsel and advice. Nothing gave him greater pleasure than to hear of our welfare and prosperity, and during the past few years while we were at a standstill, he was continually urging us, in his letters, to stick to the Order and leave nothing undone that would in anyway advance its interests. He has now passad away from us forever, but the good works which he did will live after him. May each one of us, taking pattern by him, endeavor to emulate the good example which he set, and although we cannot all rise to the prominence in the Order which he did, yet we can, in our own humble sphere, do much that will tend to advance the good and welfare of the Order, and leave a name after us that, like his, will always be honored and revered.

Following close upon the announcement of Bro. Dowdall's death came that of Bro. Thompson. Although not so well knewn, yet he was much loved and respected by all with whom he came in contact. He was a faithful and earnest worker for the Order. He was a charter member of the Grand Lodge of Tennesee, which was instituted on April 2nd, 1872, our own Grand Lodge being almost its twin sister, as we were instituted on the eight. During the same year he was appointed G. K. R. S. to fill a vacancy, and

has ever since held the position until the February Session of this year, when, from the state of his health, he was compelled to decline the nomination. He was Supreme Representative of his jurisdiction until 1879, when he was elected Supreme Prelate, which office he held at the time of his death. He was a Minister of the Presbyterian Church.

FINANCIAL.

The financial standing of the Lodges this year is slightly better than what it was last year, for although the receipts are considerably less, yet the expenditure also has been reduced in the same proportion, while the amount on hand shows an increase. As each year goes round, I become more firmly convinced of the imperative necessity that exists for Lodges to have an invested fund of some kind or other, in order that drafts could not be made upon the exchequer to such an extent as is liable, under the present general system, to be done. Many would say that their funds have never been large enough to invest, and I can only say in reply that they are never likely to be unless a start is made. This is not a matter that Grand Lodge can very well legislate upon, but I mention it simply with the hope that Representatives present will think over it, and if they can see any good likely to accrue to their Lodges by acting on the suggestion here thrown out, I trust they will advocate it when they return home. There is always a certain element in every Lodge that never seem satisfied to see a large amount in the treasury, but want to keep spending the money almost as fast as it comes in. The course I suggest would, if properly carried out, effectually put a stop to all such proceedings. An exhausted exchequer means dragging out a miserable existence with a lot of empty seats; a statement, the truth of which, perhaps, some present can vouch for.
