STORY OF NAVAL VICTORY FOR GREAT BRITAIN IN NORTH SEA

Belgians Still Hold Germans at Bay; Britain Accepts Canadian Aid

EUROPEAN STRUGGLE

--British Cruiser Amphion Sunk By Contact With Mine --Hundred Thousand Men In Battle Around Liege---Belgians Besiegers.

London, Aug. 6.—The passage of a war budget for \$500,000,000 in the House of Commons today without a dissenting voice and the granting of an army increase of \$00,000 men, in accordance with the plane of Lord Kitchener, the new minister of war, shows that Great Britain has put her hand to the plow.

A call to arms issued by the War Office tonight says an addition of 100,000 men to the regular army is needed immediately and that "Lord Kitchener is confident this appeal will at once be responded to by all who have the safety of our empire at heart."

The term of service for the new men is to be three years, or until the war is concluded. The age of enlistment will be between 19 and 30.

The naval estimates provide for 67,000 additional officers and men, which will make the navy's strength 218,000 men.

Paris, Aug. 6.—Two fifteen-year-old boys were executed by a German rmishing party near Longwy according to official advices given out at a war office. The youths had warned a force of Gendarmes of the proce of the German scouting party. The frontier guard drove the Germa back but they later returned and captured the boys. They were mediately stood up against a wall and shot by a firing squad. There is no confirmation of this report.

REPULSE OF GERMAN UHLANS AT LIEGE.

Berlin, via Amstredam and London, Aug. 6.—The Daily Mai Aug. 6.—The force of Russian cavalry which tried to break through the German frontier guard was repulsed to-day near Soldau in East Brussia. Another Russian cavalry division also suffered losses and is retiring in the vicinity of Neidenburg.

A SWIFT BUT DECISIVE WAR

There are no illusions in England that the war is certain to be a swift and decisive one.

The Admiralty netified the public tonight that the first news from the navy might not be good news. Swift upon the heels of this Intimation came the tidings that the cruiser Amphion had been sunk by a mine with a loss of an officer and 130 men—Great Britain's first sacrifice to the war.

It is considered that British ships in the North Sea are running greater risks during the first days of the war than the Germans. The royal family shares with the homes of its many subjects the suspense of waiting for news of the fate of the different units of the fleet.

NINE OF ENEMY AT BOTTOM, CANADA'S OFFER TO SEND FTHE SEVEN CAPTURED; REPORT CONTINGENT OF 20,000 FROM NORTH SEA BATTLE

Half Billion Voted For Army From Various Sources Come Meagre Bulletins of Heaviest Cable From His Majesty and Naval Fight to Date---Austrian Ships in Adriatic Flying to Cover from British War Dogs---Emperor William Appeals to All Germans to Fight for the "Fatherland" --Engagement Reported Imminent Off Coast of Brazil.

Holding Out Against German

Meagre reports of the first big naval engagement of the war were received last night from various sources. For several days reports have come to hand of heavy firing in the North Sea where the British home fleet, under Vice-Admiral Callaghan and the German Armada have been gradually drawing closer to one another.

It was announced at the armory last night that, in an encounter between these two titanic forces, nine German warships had been sunk and seven captured, the British loss being confined to one battleship sunk. Later in the evening the same report came to The Standard through a different news service and while, at 2.15 o'clock this morning it was not officially confirmed we believe it it to be authentic. From the composition of the contending fleets it would appear that the vessels engaged were Dreadnaughts and first class cruisers.

A despatch from London reports that the British fleet had engaged the Germans and were reported to be driving the enemy towards the Dutch coast. Another report, confirmed, says the British cruiser Amphion was sunk yesterday morning by striking a German mine. The paymaster and one hundred and thirty men were lost, while the captain, sixteen officers and 135 men were saved. The Amphion was attached to the third destroyer flotilla and the fact that she was in the general vicinity where firing was reported would indicate that the main fleet would be in a position to attack the enemy.

Another bulletin from Lowestowft, England, reports a battle between a German destroyer and a British scout cruiser 45 or 50 miles from the English coast. The German ship was clearly on fire

It is also learned that the German mine layer Koenigin Luise, which placed the mine that sunk the Amphion, was herself, afterwards, sunk by the British torpedo boat Lance.

Developments of the conflict on land indicate that the Belgians are still holding Liege against German invaders and inflicting heavy losses on the enemy. The French attack is proceeding well on the houndary lines, reports from more or less scattered sources.

The British government has accepted Canada's offer of a contingent enrollment which opens at once. The Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick, who notified H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught of the decision of the government of this province to raise and equip 1,000 men, received last night a reply couched in terms of thankful gratitude.

Out of London comes the report that the British fleet has engaged the German fleet in battle on the high seas. The British Admiralty refuses information as to whether a naval, engagement is in progress, but the British warships which put out several days ago, have been searching for the Germans in the North Sea.

The captain of the trawler reported that the German destroyer was emitting dense smoke and was plainly on fire.

Imperial Authorities Received at Ottawa Last Night---Contingent Will Likely Be Mobilized Within Ten Days At Valcartier, Que.---Name of Commander Not Yet Announced

TO EUROPE ACCEPTED

Ottawa, Aug. 6.—A cable was received from His Majesty the King and the imperial authorities late tonight accepting Canada's offer to send a contingent of 20.000 trained men to Europe and asking that they be mobilized at once. Inside of ten days it is expected that the contingent will be enrolled and assembled on the training ground at Valcartier, Que.

The Minister of Militia, on receipt of the cablegram, immediately summende the militia council and they were in session at a late hour. It is understood that Col the Hon. Sam Hughes is anxious to get only the very best men available.

It is definitely stated that Col. Hughes will not command the contingent nor will General Lessard, who is at present on sick leave. The name of the commander has not yet been announced.

It is expected that all the lists will be in by the middle of next week. It will be seen that the whole process is likely to take practically a fortnight, while additional time must be allowed for transportation to Quebec. All the names submitted, however, will be kept carefully filled and tabulated here, and in case a second army division should be required later the balance of the volunteers not chosen for the first contingent will be called upon.

The department states that there will be no trouble at all about equipment or arrangements, and that there are sufficient supplies available for practically the whole of the active militia in Canada numbering some 60,000 men. Rush orders, however, have been placed for tents and other necessaries, and contractors are working night and day to fill the orders. The dominion arsenal at Quebec is also working overtime on ammunition of all kinds and thousands of Ross rifles have been ordered for quick delivery from the factory at Qubec.

BRITISH CRUISER CONVOYS CEDRIC KAISER TRIED TO AVERT WAR, HE AND MAURETANIA INTO HALIFAX TELLS IMPERIAL PARLIAMENT

Bulletin—Halifax, N. S., Aug. S.—Steamers Mauretania and Cedric, convoyed by the British cruiser Essex now anchored in Halifax harbor. Halifax, N. S., Aug. S.—The British ship Mauretania arrived in Halifax under escort at ten-thirty this morning followed this afternoon at even-fifteen by Cedric escorted by the British cruiser Essex.

The Mauretania while on her way to New York was warned by the Iritish cruiser Essex late Wednesday night to change her course and team full speed for Halifax. At that time the Cunarder was 380 miles om New York, and 140 miles from Halifax. Somewhere lurking in the arkness and fog, ready to pounce upon her victims was a German cruiser, but watching guard over the lanes fo travel along which her comerce was speeding were Britain's ships which warned the liners of eir danger by wireless.

The fastest time ever made by the Mauretania to New York was four days, ten hours and forty-five minutes from Liverpool to New York. Under pressure the Mauretania made the marvellous run of 27 and a half knots during the early hours of yesterday morning. The average speed was 26.06 knots. When it was learned aboard the liner the purpose of the change of course, there was great excitement among the passengers. In the first class there were five hundred passengers, many of them prominent in the business professional and church life of both continents. Mr. Franklyn. head of the International Mercantile Marrine, was one of the passengers; Bishop Courtney, of New York, formely of Halifax, was another. There were a number of German Jews in the first saloon, but it is supposed they were American citizens, or at least, said one of the officers, they chipped in and sang "God Save the King." Twenty-three of the passengers will be here in Halifax prisoners of war and handed over to the proper authorities. These passengers are of all classes.

There was a sensational report going the rounds of the ship that late last night a fiash of light was seen over the stern of the cruiser followed by a report of a gun, and it was believed by many that they had approached too close to some ship which had fired. None of the officers could substantiate this as they were on the bridge, but several of them believed it to be true. It is the opinion of the officers of the Mauretania that the several German cruisers in North Atlantic waters know they are doomed, and that they intend to destroy all British ships possible before they are attacked and wiped out by Brit-lish warships.

LIEGE ATTACK RENEWED, BELGIAN GUNG PLAY HAVOC WITH GERMANS

In renewing the attack the Germans concentrated their forecs against Fort Barchon northeast of Liege. At 11,30 o'clock the German troops moved forward under cover of the heavy artillery, but the Belgians reserved their fire until the enemy came to close quarters, and were preparing for their first charge.

Then the Belgians let loose a terrific hail of lead from their machine guns, causing great havoc in the enemy's ranks.

The ground around the fort resembled a shambles as the Germans were mowed down. In the meantime Fort Chaudfontaine bombarded the enemy and forced them to withdraw. One Belgian shell fell in the centre of the German column and caused heavy losses.

The Germans also battered away with their artillery at all the forts on the right bank of the Meuse. Heavy fire was poured on the Belgian fortifications.

Belgian cavalry sent out to attack the Germans suffered heavy losses. One whole squadron of Belgian lancers, was annihilated after killing 160 Uhlans in a desperate encounter. The captain of the lancers was instantly killed as he led his men in a charge.

England by whipping Jem Ward in 1827, was then a butcher who followed fighting only as a side line, and the same was true of his opponent. In those days it was the custom of candidates for office to employ fighting men to look after their interests on election days; and Crawley and Sutcliffe were employed by opposing candidates. This association led to a quarrel, and their gattle was the result, both butchers having carefully bottled up their wrath until they could get a purse for loosing it. A great crowd of sports witnessed the bout, which lasted fifty minutes before Crawley triumphed over his rival. Feter won many battles in the succeeding years, and also conducted a butcher shop and a boxing school in the same building, His defeat of Jem Ward for the title came as a great surprise, but Crawley refused to fight again, and retired from the ring shortly after receiving the belt. He opened a public house in London, and as a sporting bonface enjoyed great popularity until his death, at a ripe old age, in 1865.
