





Mr. Pugsley's organ, the Times, is still of an enquiring mind. It brings up the question of increasing the British Preference and The Standard is challenged to state why this concession, which Canada grants to the Mother Country, should not be increased. Mr. Pugsley's organ puts the question as follows:

"The Standard says: 'The object of Tariff Reform, with a proposed two-shilling duty on foreign wheat, is not to keep out overseas supplies but to en-courage wheat to come from the Dominions and Colonies of the Empire instead of from foreign coun-

"But let us take The Standard's statement and apply it in another way. Thus: 'The object of an increase by Canada of the British Preference is not to keep out oversea supplies, but to encourage manufactured goods to come from the Mother Country instead of from foreign countries,

"How does this application of its own argument strike the organ of the high protectionists in Can-

What the Times wants to know, to put it briefly, is "Why the British Preference has not been increased?" To satisfy the Times on this point we cannot do better To satisfy the filmes of this point we cannot than give the explanation of the Leader of the Liberal party, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who for many years controlled the Dominion's policy on this question. On this point Sir Wilfrid Laurier was consistent. At each Imperial Conference he stated the policy of Canada and pleaded eloquently with the British Government to reciprocate and grant Imperial Preference. An extract from his speech, made before the Imperial Conference on May 7th, agreed, made before the line ingest question. After quoting figures showing the increase in British trade with Canada under the preference, Sir Wilfrid said to the representatives of the British Government:

"We give you a preference of 33 1.3 per cent, ch is certainly A VALUABLE CONTRIBUTION ON OUR PART TO BRITISH TRADE. Not only geography. If we were to follow the laws of nature and geography between Canada and the United States the whole trade would flow from South to North and from North to South. We have done everything possible by building canals and subsidizing railways to bring the trade from West to East and East to West so as to bring trade into British channels. All this advantage of forcing trade within the Empire. principle we recognize. He took the ground, and presumably would take it today, that he would not go further into the subject and endeavor to increase the advantages of the British manufacturer UNTIL THE BRITISH GOVERNMENT ACCEPTED THE PRINCIPLE OF IMPERIAL PREFERENCE, a principle which he strongly advocated. The enquiry of the Times, as to when the preference will be increased is answered, as far as its own party is concerned by the ex-Prime Minister.

I believe that the policy would be a good one, better for Canada and for the Empire as a whole. . . . The question of increasing the British Preference is not an issue. A point, however, which seems to call for some explanation is the present attitude of the Telegraph and Times. Under these circumstances it is pertinent to enquire where Mr. Pugsley, who is supposed to be a staunch supporter of Liberal policies, stands on this question. TURKEY IN ARMS.

Despite the war with Italy, Turkey appears to have been making full preparation for time outbreak now threatened by the Balkan States. Her effective fighting forces are estimated at 400,000 men. All the military depots are reported full of stores, and the army equipment complete. It is instructive to note, as the Vancouver News-Advertiser points out, that during the last three hundred trans Turkey has been at war percently than any other. the last century. Twice she was at war with Greece, twice with Egyptian revolters, many times with one or more of the Balkan States, while the number of suppressed rebellions, including those of the Janissaries, annot be told. In these wars, and especially in resistng the superior forces of Russia, the Turks frequently ex cited the admiration of the world by their courage and determination. The names of Kars and Plevna are notable in the record of brave men and brave deeds.

The feeble resistance that Turkey has made to Italy

is partly due to the fact that she is powerless at sea. If is partly due to the fact that she is powerless at sea. If Italy had landed troops on Turkish soil the campaign would have been more even. There is reason to sup-pose that the combined force of Bulgaria, Servia and Greece, supporting the Macedonian insurrectionists, would find it hard to resist the armies of Turkey event in the Balkan strongholds. But from the past it may be assumed that such a war would be one of the most cruel on record. Turkish soldiers have earned a bad reputation by their custom of slaughtering women and children a rebellion . The story of the Bugarian atrocities habeen followed by Armenian and Macedonian massacres Nor is it the labit of the Balkan people to show quarter to captured or wounded Turks. This is one reason why the Powers deprecate a Balkan war.

Notwithstanding the fact that the Turks obtained their position in Europe by competition in arms with other peoples, they would probably long since have been driven back to Asia had it not suited the Powers of Wesern Europe that Turkey rather than Russia should hold the road between the Black Sea and the Mediterranean In the time of Suleiman the Black Sea was a Turkish lake. Now it is Russian, but Britain, France, Italy, Aus Russian aggression. The eyes of Russia are ever turne Never has there been a rebellion in Euro pean Turkey in the last century that was not supposed to have the sympathy of Russia. It is impossible that a war should now take place without Russia gaining some thing from a Turkish disaster. Nor can such a war oc cur without great anxiety in all the capitals of Western






