By the will of the late Mr. Wm. Magill \$1700 was left to the Missions of the Church ; and by that of the late Mrs. Huston \$300 was bequeathed to our Church, \$50 to the Bible Society, and \$50 to the Tract Society.

During the past four years there have been no changes in the Session either through death or removal, and the members have had health to discharge all duties. The usual changes have come in the congregation, some going, some coming, and the average number removed by death. It was deemed fit to strike sixteen members from the roll, as they had ceased to attend divine worship, through departure from the bounds of congregation, and three were removed because they failed to be present at any of the means of grace, although still residing within the limits of the congregation.

The members of Session unite with the rest of the congregation in thankfulness for the outcome of the renovations of the church, and rejoice at the full response of everyone in answer to the call for a liberal offering upon the Anniversary Sabbath.

In the list of our dead we find names which for years have been found among the active workers and contributors of our people. They are missed, but we realize that this is but God's way in finishing the course we have to run. We miss, too, the little children who were the centre of bright hopes, and youth and middle age have been called to the Eternal presence. We give thanks for all who labored in their own way to make earth brighter and to help men to bear the burdens of life. We sympathize with all mourners, and bear them in prayer to the God who rules over the affairs of men.

Our missionary offerings are not what they were last year, as we had three special offerings in 1897 which amounted to over \$600; and while our weekly givings are an increase upon those of 1897, we would impress upon the congregation the necessity of keeping in touch with this great work committed to the church by our blessed Lord, and to lay aside weekly or monthly what we should give in return for all that God hath given us.

The different organizations of the Church have had an average year, and all seem alive to their responsibilities, and see wider fields and greater opportunities calling them to renewed activity, and to a closer walk with Him who supplies strength adequate for every undertaking.

We would like to call attention to the Prayer-meeting, where we intend to take up the study of John's Gospel. This is, perhaps, the richest field of the New Testament, and is the pasture-ground of those longing for a deeper knowledge of godliness. Could we not have a larger attendance during '99 than in the past years? There are many who could easily be present at almost every meeting, if they so desired. To give one hour out of each week for study and prayer is but a little thing, and yet it is the fountain-head of untold outpourings of the Holy Spirit.

May this year be the very best of our Christian experience. May we search out and meditate upon God's truth, and may we so grow in the grace of Christ that we shall bear all the fruits of the Spirit, crowning the days with righteousness, peace and joy in the Holy Ghost.

MANAGERS' REPORT.

Once more we pause, as it were, on the threshold of a new year to glance at the things belonging to the one that is no more. Generally it is better to look forward, forgetting the things that are behind, but in respect to the financial concerns of the congregation it becomes our duty at this time to turn our faces to the past, while not altogether forgetting the things that lie before. In doing so there is good cause for mutual congratulation throughout the congregation with both pastor and people, but that the chief outgoing of our hearts may be in gratitude to God, the giver of every good and perfect gift, is our earnest desire.

It has been a year of material prosperity. At times, it is true, the weekly receipts were rather behind the regularly recurrent and incidental expenditure, but not long at any time. Under the circumstances we were very cautious about incurring any expense that could with fairness be avoided, especially because the new and repair work the congregation had undertaken involved quite enough of that for the time.

There is in sight the necessary outlay of upwards of \$200 this year, in addition to that of last, for interest on repair, loan and insurance.

Apart from the prospect of increased expense a slight increase in the regular revenue would be about right, not that we speak in respect of want, but that when anything requisite is wanted in any department of the church work, there may be enough on hand to pay for it. We have been obliged, possibly, to be a little close just here, not altogether on account of sparing the Congregational Fund, although as Managers we fully realize our re-

sponsibility on that ground, but especially because we are opposed to spending money on anything outside of bare necessities before we have gotten it. All we wish for in this line is sufficient funds, freely given, to decently defray the expenses of the congregation, without leaving any room for a just charge of the least extravagance on the one hand, or of parsimony on the other.

As a reminder to all of us, "lest we forget," and in explanation to those newly joining the congregation, this opportunity is embraced to say that the contributions to the support of the Gospel amongst ourselves are voluntary in the best sense of the word, so no one need wait to be personally approached in this regard. Upon the Christian conscience of the congregation in its relation to Him who gave Himself for us, and to one another, is the levy made, and without doubt this is the only true method of adjusting this matter according to the principle of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and in practice it has fairly well supplied the needs of the congregation in the past, and with God's blessing it will do so in the future.

The small square envelopes in which the W. O. is made, and on which contributors are requested to mark amount enclosed, along with name, are placed on table of vestibule, where each one may supply himself or be supplied by speaking to one of the ushers.

The new and repair work anticipated at our last annual meeting have, as we all know, been fully realized to the satisfaction, on the whole, it is thought, of all concerned, and to those who had charge of this work the thanks of the congregation are due. At the opening of church, after repairs were completed, the call for \$1,000 was heartily responded to by a record-breaker of \$87.26 over the mark.

Near the end of the year, when the funds, so far as appeared, were short of paying all dues that the closing year would bring forth, our anxiety, or, shall we say, guilty fears? were relieved by the receipt of \$200, the amount bequeathed to the Church by the will of the late Mrs. Jane Huston. However, the increase in the W. O. on the last two Sundays of the year, and arrears, swelled the funds to a little over the balancing point, so, as far as the ordinary expenses are concerned, apart from the special repair work, the sum above mentioned is left intact, a state of things very creditable to the congregation in consideration of the special effort that had been made. However, neither to flatter nor to boast are we inclined, but to earnestly desire humble and thankful hearts and a more abundant outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon us as a congregation.

Fourteenth Annual Report of Brampton Auxiliary to the W. F. M. S.

Meetings have been held regularly during the year on the first Friday of each month, with the exceptions of the months of July and August.

While our active membership remains about the same, the number of "Scattered Helpers" has grown to 32.

Our total membership is 81. The average attendance is 33, a slight increase over that of last year.

The "Foreign Missionary Tidings" has a circulation of 95.

The total amount of money contributed during the year is \$108.46.

A bale of clothing valued at \$41.95 was sent to the Northwest Mission Schools in September.

In April the Rev. Dr. N. H. Russell gave an illustrated lecture on his work in India.

Our annual Thank-Offering Meeting was held in October. Mrs. Ross, President of the Ewart Training Home, addressed the meeting. The offering amounted to \$39.31.

While we have much to encourage us in this Report, on the other hand we feel that our membership is small compared with the number of women in our congregation.

We would again urge on ourselves the need of individual effort. It is only by each member being actively interested that we can hope to interest others to aid in the great mission of winning "The World for Christ."

Y. P. S. C. E. REPORT FOR 1898.

Our Society has, during the past year, practically ceased to exist as a "Christian Endeavor Society," according to that Society's constitution.

This has been owing to the decrease in number of its active members, some of whom have left our midst for other fields of labor, while some have engaged in other church work which fully occupied their attention.

Notwithstanding this, we have endeavored to be recognized as a band of young people ever open and willing to promote the cause of Christ and the Church.

By our request, our Pastor kindly consented to study with us, during the past term, "The Confession of Faith," a subject about which all true Presbyterians should be thoroughly concerned.

REPORT OF SABBATH SCHOOL FOR 1898.

1898 has been, we believe, a year of progress. There is to-day among officers, teachers and scholars a deeper interest in the work of the Sabbath School, and we would like to think among the congregation also. Our appeal at the annual meeting of a year ago was responded to encouragingly. Two special offerings were granted us : one in March last, when Prof. Robinson, then of Knox College, addressed the children, and whose services at that time were memorable indeed ; the other on Christmas Sunday, when Rev. R. P. McKay was present. These offerings, together with increased givings by the School itself, have at last freed us from debt and deficits, and we begin this year with a balance on the right side

The Missionary offerings to support a pupil in the Point aux Trembles School have amounted to a little more than the sum required ; and in regard to this work, we may say that we are informed from time to time by the Principal of the School and by the pupil whom we help, of the progress being made and of the gratitude felt for our support.

During the summer a very enjoyable and well-attended picnic was held at Island Park, and in December we had our usual entertainment, this time, however, in the church, and better and more interesting than any we have ever had before.

The work of instruction in the School is being faithfully pursued. The teachers have attended well. Out of a total number of officers and teachers on the roll of 23, we have had an average attendance of 18, or over 78%. The attendance of scholars, however, is not so good. We have 206 names on the roll, with an average attendance of only 114, or about 52%. We would urge the parents to give this matter their attention and to have their children attend with greater regularity. Let us also beg you to come yourselves sometimes. Your presence at the Sabbath School is encouraging to both teachers and scholars, and ought to be of helpfulness to you as well. Then would our appeals for teachers be better understood and better answered. And here let me say that we are of necessity increasing the number of classes in our school and are in urgent need of teachers. Will not some of you here to-night come to our help and volunteer for a service that will be fully appreciated and which will tend to your own soul's good and growth ?

Our Library will shortly have many new books added to it, and we have incorporated with it the Young People's Association Missionary and Reference Library, which has heretofore not been in general circulation. When our Library is ready we invite the freest use of it by the congregation.

1899 is faced by us with good heart. We are seeking to replace, with apparent success, the Lesson Leaves, so much abused, with the Bible itself. We are reviving our S. S. Choir, and in other ways endeavoring to make our School more profitable and attractive.

We look for the good help of the congregation and respectfully ask for a repetition of your generosity in granting us two special offerings during the year.
